Dry Weather Hurts Livestock Outlook

With only 1.02 inches of rain in October and just a faint sprinkle during the first 17 days of November, the Cross Plains area is experiencing the driest Autumn since 1956.

Small grain crops are suffering. Early planted fields of wheat and oats, particularly the latter, are said to be barely alive.

Around Cross Cut ponds are so low and boggy that farmers and ranchers must keep close watch to rescue animals mired in mud. "There is still plenty of stock water," said Mrs. Les Byrd, "but in some pastures the tanks are dangerous."

Absence of early Fall moisture has curtailed growth of wild rye and other winter grasses. Many herd owners, who customarily begin feeding livestock supplementary rations around Dec. 1, have already begun. Protein blocks, cottonseed cake and cubes, as well as liquid feeds are all in local demand, according to a check-up with feed stores late Monday.

The past several weeks have been ideal for peanut harvesting and with exception of a few early morning dews have suited

Ordinary letters require 13c postage for the first ounce and 8c for each additional ounce thereafter. Air-mail letters are 25c for each half ounce.

Oplin Man Draws 10 Year Prison Sentence For Cattle Rustling

Hal Dean Windham of Oplin was given 10 years in state prison Thursday upon conviction of cattle stealing. The case was tried at Baird.

Bill Thomas and Allen Glenn of Abilene were Windham's attorneys.

Criminal Dist. Atty. Ed Paynter had relied in testimony of an accomplice — the defendant's nephew — to win conviction, and Thomas repeatedly charged that the district attorney had made a "deal" with the accomplice's attorney in re-

turn for his testimony. The accomplice, Johnny Robert Windham, 18, of Lawn, is under indictment in the same cattle theft case, and also faces revocation of a five-year probation for burglary.

Paynter said Thomas' charges of "some kind of deals in smoke-filled rooms" were "talk, bunk, cheap, and not true."

Hal Windham, Johnny Robert Windham and R. L. Goble had all three been indicted for the late January theft of eight head of cattle from Goble's

uncle, Cecil Goble of Cross Plains. Goble plead guilty and is now serving a prison sentence.

Johnny Windham testified that he helped Goble and Hal Windham steal the cows and take them to a Waco cattle auction where they were sold for \$1,178 on Jan. 27, according to other evidence. Johnny Windham said he was paid \$50 for his part in the theft, the amount having been agreed on ahead of time.

Cecil Goble testified that he gave no one permission to take

his cattle, and D. T. Leggett, Waco auction owner, identified a seller's invoice showing that a "Hal Williams" sold him eight cows on Jan. 27.

He said he made out a check to "Hal Williams" for that amount. The check was among three deposited the following day at Abilene's Bank of Commerce, according to teller Mrs. Wanda Bevin.

R. A. Goble, father of R. L. Goble, testified that he loaned his pickup to his son around the last of January. The license

number of the pickup had been copied down by Leggett and placed on the seller's invoice for the "Hal Williams" cattle, evidence showed.

Johnny Windham also told of borrowing a trailer from Hollis Parmley of Abilene, having that trailer break down, then borrowing another one from William Elliott of Cross Plains to take the stolen cattle to Waco.

Hal Windham, who received a two-year prison term for cattle theft in the same court

in 1958, did not testify in his own defense.

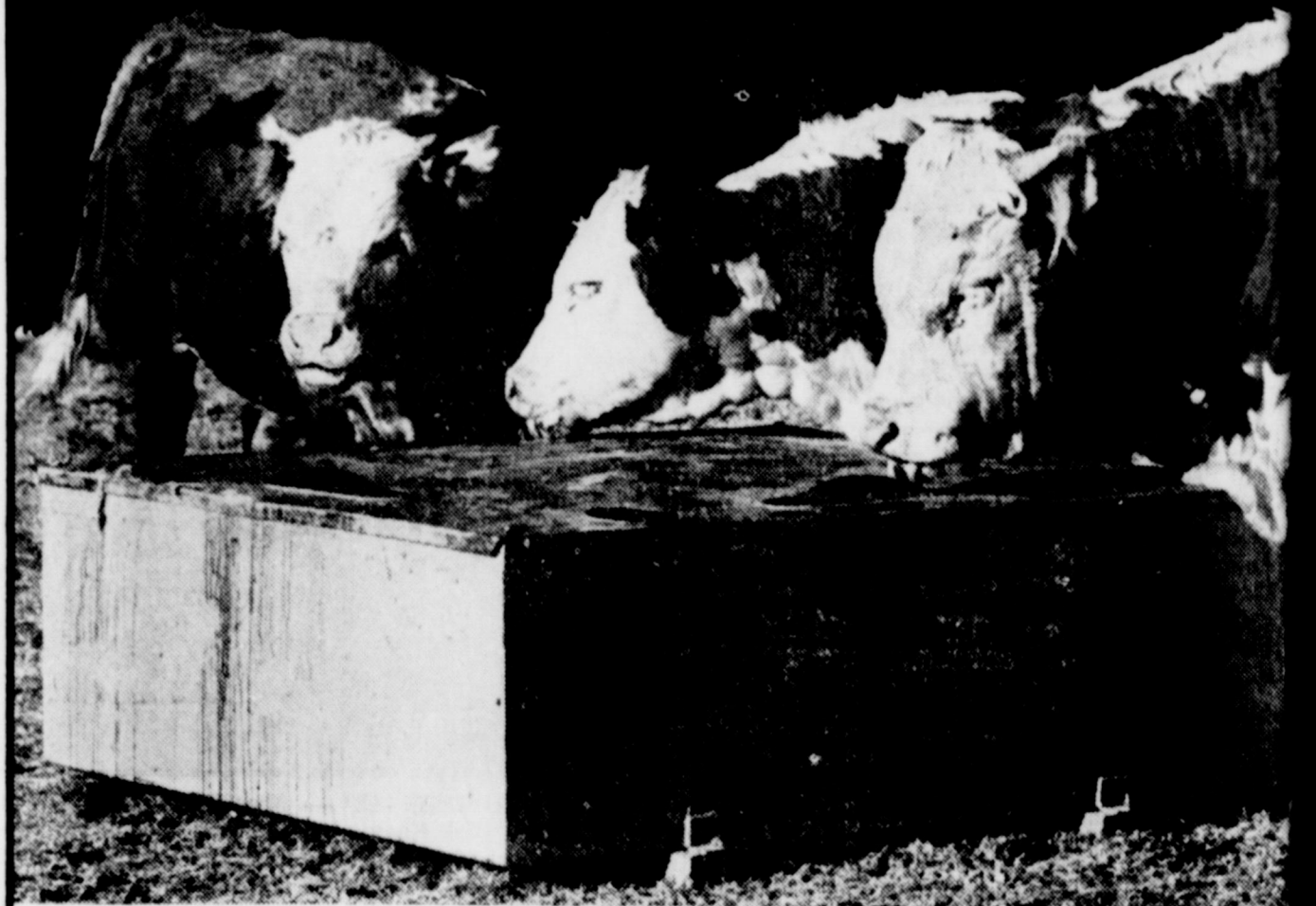

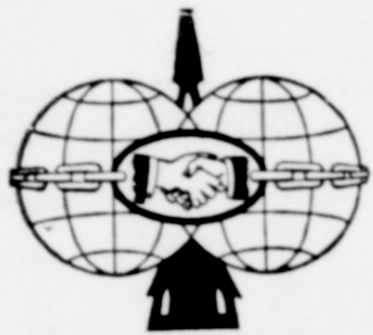

Dublin Claws Buffs In Cold 10-A Grid Finale

Dublin Lions mauled Cross Plains Buffaloes 52-6 in 1970 football season finale Friday before a sparse crowd on the cold, windy, damp night.

The visitors completely dominated the game, except for one long bomb that accounted for the Herd's touchdown. It was a 43-yard pass and run from Robert Lewis, then at quarterback, to Left End Tommy Merryman.

Cross Plains netted only 44 yards rushing, and got 36 of that in the last half. Dublin ran for 196 net yards and 15 first downs. Only statistical advantage the Buffs earned was in yards passing. The Herd got 71 on three completions while Dublin netted 70 on five receptions.

The visitors got three tallies in the first period, and sported a 22-point advantage before the Herd rallied for its lone touchdown.

A Buff lost fumble led to the Lions' first counter, coming on a three-yard sneak by Quarterback Mike Boucher with 7:42 left in initial period. Buffs lost possession on downs at their 29 and six plays later Halfback Rocky Ford scampered the last four yards. A two-point pass to End Rickie Green upped the lead to 14-0 with 3:20 left in first canto. Two minutes later, after another Bison bobble, Halfback Garry Couch hit paydirt around end from 14 yards out, and Ford got the two bonus points.

Bisons Score

Buff Don Scott recovered Dublin's only lost fumble, and five passing plays and 69 yards later Cross Plains had six points. Two completions accounted for the yardage. Quarterback Roger Crawford's 26-yard toss to Right End Lewis and Lewis' long throw to Merryman with the latter out-running defenders the last 20 yards. An aerial failed on the two-point conversion try.

From then on it was all Dublin. Ford got the first of two scores in the second quarter on a nine-yard end run after a fumble recovery, and Couch went the same route after a Lion stole a Bison pass.

A 28-yard screen pass from Boucher to Halfback Floyd Murray got the visitors' third quar-
