## 16 Teams In Local Cage Tournament

Sixteen varsity teams from eight schools will participate in the annual Cross Plains High School invitational basketball tournament scheduled to unfold in Buffalo Gymnasium Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Boys and girls squads from Albany, Bangs, Eula, Putnam, Rising Star, Santa Anna, Talpa-Centennial and host Cross Plains will vie for three team awards, championship, runner-up and consolation victor, in each division. Trophies will also be given selected players of all-tournament teams, six girls and five boys.

Both defending champions are back. Santa Anna won the feminine bracket last year, and Cross Plains captured the male diadem. Both are expected to find rough competition in efforts to repeat as kings and queens.

Local school officials would not forecast a favorite in either division, saying that the best-balanced tourney in years is expected.

Host squads will play the last two games of the first day's competition. Buffettes will take on the defending champion, Santa Anna, with a 7 p.m. tip-off slated. Buffaloes will follow immediately, at 8:30, with the male Mountaineer contingent.

Local Head Coach Mack McConal noted that play will begin at 1 p.m. Thursday and Friday, earlier than normal, to allow an earlier finish each night. An hour and a half has been allowed for each game. Six games are on tap each of the first two days, and eight contests are carded Saturday. Four clashes Saturday morning beginning at 9 o'clock will end second round eliminations. Finals, starting with the girls consolation tilt, will begin at 4 p.m. the last day. Boys consolation will follow at 5:30. Girls championship game is scheduled for a 7 p.m. start, and boys championship game is slated for an 8:30 p.m. tipoff.

First round matches will be held Thursday with conclusion coming in first games Friday. Eula and Putnam girls will be initial contest at 1 p.m., followed by male squads of the two schools. At 4 o'clock Bangs and Rising Star girls collide, immediately after which male units of the same two schools will battle. Cross Plains girls and Santa Anna sextet tangle at 7 p.m., and the Buff-Mountaineer clash will follow at 8:30.

Albany and Talpa-Centennial girls open action Friday at 1 p.m., and the two schools' boys teams complete first round play at 2:30. Second round bouts will begin with girls at 4 p.m. Friday and continue through early session Saturday.

### CHAMPIONS OF LAST 17 TOURNAMENTS

Eula girls have won more titles than any other team in Cross Plains High School's annual basketball tournament since 1953. Cross Plains boys claim the same honor in the male division. Eula sextets have captured six championships, and Cross Plains Buffaloes have emerged victorious four times in the last 17 meets. The 1967 tournament was canceled because of a severe ice storm, and two meets were held in 1956, one in January and the following December. Champions have been:

### Area Passes 40th Day Without Rain

Cross Plains has recorded only .03 inches of moisture in the past 40 days. Effects of the drought are becoming acute.

"It has been dry too long and is barely alive," he explained. Most farmers and ranchers still have sufficient stock water, however, many ponds are becoming dangerously boggy around the edges. Winter grasses are virtually non-existent.

### Peanut Allotments Go In Mail Friday

Friday is deadline for mailing 1971 peanut allotment notices to producers.

The national allotment of 1,610,000 acres — same as for 1970 — has been announced by the Department of Agriculture. In general, peanut farmers who grew their full allotments this year can expect about the same acreage for 1971.

Authorization which permitted the sale and lease of peanut acreage in 1970 has expired. Legislation to enable continuance of these practices is expected to be passed by Congress.
