Bufs Try Coyotes At Home On Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes hope more friendly faces will be the necessary ingredient to win a football game Friday night as the Herd opens the four-game home card against the Richland Springs Coyotes.

Game time at Buffalo Field is 8 p.m.

Twice this year Bisons have seen victory slip away. In the first game at Wylie pass interceptions helped the 7-A Bulldogs blunt repeated attacks by the Buffs by a 14-6 score. Last week at Santa Anna a late drive by the larger Mountaineers of District 18-B doomed Bisons to a second setback 6-0.

Cross Plains fans who do not follow the Herd on the road, can expect another tough battle for their first glimpse of the 1971 Thundering Herd against the visiting Coyotes.

Richland Springs defeated the Bison contingent 27-12, and earned a share of the 18-B championship, advancing to the playoffs on a coin toss. No less than 15 returning lettermen are expected to lead the charge against the Herd Friday night.

Little relief can be expected in giving away weight advantage by the Buffaloes. Size is a trump for the Coyotes, but no more so than is experience. Rich-

land Springs can field a team manned at almost every position by a player with at least one monogram.

Three talented Coyotes are back at end position including seniors Doug Gibson, 190, and Nelson Smith, 150, and junior Joe Hardman, 155. Tackles can be manned by letter winners Thomas Gibson, 175, Lynn Johnson, 180, and Mike Maxcey, 190, all seniors.

Real strength in the Coyote line-up is found in the backfield. At least six rapid and powerful runners are in the pack, all seniors or juniors. Some of them are well remembered by the small band of brave souls who traveled the long distance to Richland Springs last year. Some of the stand-out names which ripped Buffalo defense from the wishbone T cue: Tommy Teal, 160, senior; James Gibson, 165, senior; Rickey McKinney, 155, junior.

Richland Springs is expected to be at full strength as last Friday was an open date for the Coyotes. Buffaloes have battle scars from two grueling fights the past two week ends.

The Coyotes have been picked to finish second, behind Santa Anna, in District 18-B this season, however last year the squad was rated third behind both Santa Anna and Rising Star and ended up sharing the crown with both.

3 Sites In Callahan Due For Historical Marking

The Callahan County Historical Survey Committee met Sept. 18 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Windham of Oplin, with Mrs. Tommy Johnson, also of Oplin, as co-hostess.

Mrs. John Berry of Clyde, chairman of the committee, presided for the business session. It was voted to place a marker at the home of Mrs. Ethel Anderson at Cottonwood. This house built in 1909 by the late Dr. Griffin, father of Judge Meade Griffin of Austin, was later occupied by the late H. S. Varner, a pioneer school teacher of the area.

Markers also will be placed at the Admiral Baptist Church, built in 1898 and organized in 1831; and at the Cedar Bluff School built in 1812 between Cottonwood and Admiral, and said to be the only one room school building still standing in the county.

A committee was appointed, composed of Mrs. C. B. Snyder

and Mrs. Michael Young of Baird and Joel C. Holmes of Clyde to make plans for encouraging history appreciation in the schools of Callahan County.

Mrs. Snyder displayed a map of the old part of Baird Cemetery which was prepared by James C. Ashbury of Baird. The committee hopes to secure maps of all the old cemeteries in the county.

Announcement was made that the State Historical Survey Committee meeting will be held in Del Rio on Oct. 29-30.

Rainfall Still Below Normal In Area

Showers over the area last week end still left the Cross Plains area below normal moisture for this time of year.

The light and scattered rains were considered beneficial to pastures and peanuts, many crops were again being irrigated since no moisture had fallen since the big rains in August. Ranchers of the area also considered the moisture a boon to pastures. It was thought by most that it would add additional late growing season grasses to winter pasturage.

Amounts of rainfall dumped in this section varied widely. D. C. Sanford, foreman of the La Reata Ranch north of Cottonwood reported the largest total, 1.40 inches. On the other hand just 20 of an inch was gauged at Cross Cut by Les Byrd. Cross Plains received .50 of an inch, according to the official weather bureau gage maintained by C. F. Newton. Other area measurements include: Atwell, M. A. Tatam, 1.00; Rowden, N.V. Gibbs, .80; Sabanno, Edwin Erwin, .70; Pioneer, J. T. Beggs, .70, and Cottonwood, Norman Coffee, .90.

Rainfall in Cross Plains is still below the norm for 1971. New-

ton's records indicate that 16.57 inches has been received here through noon Tuesday, and traditionally the latter three months of the year yield little moisture. Normal rainfall here

for 12 months is 24.54 inches, and the average for the past 23 years has been .30 of an inch less.

Wettest month of the year was August when 6.78 inches were

gauged. It far surpasses the next wettest, May with 3.75 inches. At least some moisture has been received here each month this year except March when only a trace was recorded.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Facts Concerning Re-Recording Of Brands In Texas

All brands and marks on Texas livestock must be re-recorded with County Clerks after August 30, 1971, according to a new law passed during the last session of the Texas Legislature. Producers will be given a six-month period (August 30, 1971, through February 29, 1972) in which to register these brands and marks and the location on the animal which they are currently using, after which time any unrecorded brand will be available for use on a "first-come" basis.

The law further states that all such brands and marks must be re-recorded every 10 years. Each County Clerk records for his given county only, so many producers may need to record their brands in additional counties if their operations are extensive.

The owner shall have the right during this six-month period to file the mark and brand now recorded in his name. In the event it cannot be determined from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such marks and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

It should be noted that it is illegal to brand livestock without first properly recording the brand with the County Clerk in the county in which the livestock are held.

When the brand or brands are recorded, the location on the animal on which the brand is to be applied must be designated. If the brand is to be applied to more than one location on the animal, it must be so recorded and each additional location for the brand on the animal shall constitute a separate recording of that brand.

There is no limit to the number and or marks which may be recorded in a county by a person as long as requirements of this law governing the recording and re-recording of livestock brands are met. Minors may have marks or brands separate from that of the father or guardian, which must be recorded or re-recorded as provided by the new law.

HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

By Barbara Williams

This is part 6 and the final article for your FURNITURE FIRST AID HANDBOOK from Higginbothams. Clip it and add it to parts 1-5. Remember to check Higginbothams first for your furniture needs.

INK STAINS

If the finish is worn or damaged so unsealed wood is exposed, ink stain will penetrate deeply and will be almost impossible to remove. When finish has been protected with wax, ink often can be blotted up immediately without leaving a spot. If a mark does show, try:

METHOD A — Blot ink and then try Jubilee according to the directions on the container.

METHOD B — Pat spot with damp cloth. Do not rub but keep turning cloth to a clean area. Repeat as many times as necessary.

METHOD C — Rub down with rottenstone and oil (see part 1).

PAINT STAINS

METHOD A — If the paint is fresh remove with a cloth saturated with furniture polish, or rub with 3/0 steel wool dipped in Beautiflor.

METHOD B — For old paint stains cover spots with linseed oil and let stand until paint is softened. Wipe with cloth wet with linseed oil. Remove remaining paint with rottenstone and oil (see part 1).

NAIL POLISH STAINS: Try rubbing with fine (3/0) steel wool dipped in Beautiflor.

CANDLE WAX: (Hold an ice cube on the wax for a few seconds to harden it, but wipe up melted ice immediately.) Crumble off as much wax as can be removed with fingers, then scrape gently with dull knife. Rub briskly with cloth saturated with furniture polish or Beautiflor, wiping dry with a clean cloth. Repeat until mark dis-

appears.

MILK SPOTS: When milk or foods containing milk or cream are allowed to remain on furniture, the effect of the lactic acid is like that of a mild paint or varnish remover. Therefore, always wipe up this spilled food as quickly as possible. (If spots show, clean with Jubilee. Then follow the tips under Alcohol Spots (part 5).)

The primary source for these tips has been consumer education material distributed by Johnsons Wax.

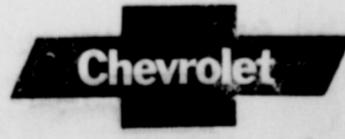

The two squads had battled scorelessly through 45 minutes and 30 seconds of play when the host Mountaineers pushed across the lone tally of the night handling a game, but outweighed Thundering Herd a 6-0 loss.

After first few minutes of the game Santa Anna held the upper hand in the non-conference contest. Statistics indicate that the clash between the 10-A Mountaineers was not that close. Bisons netted just 134 yards from scrimmage, 93 rushing and 41 passing, while the hosts amassed 291 yards, most of it coming on the ground, 259 yards in the air.
