Edwin Baum, 61, Buried Here Friday Afternoon

Funeral services for Edwin Baum, president of the Citizens State Bank here the past three years, were conducted at Higginbotham Funeral Chapel at 2 p.m. Friday. A victim of an apparent heart attack, he died at the breakfast table at his home here Wednesday about 8 o'clock.

The Rev. Gordon Dennis, a former pastor of the local Methodist Church and now serving as District Superintendent for the United Methodist Church in the Brownwood District of the Brownwood District of the Herrington, pastor of the local church.

A native of this city, he was born here April 2, 1910, a son of the late T. E. Baum of this city and Mrs. Baum who now resides in Brownwood. He was married to Zora Mae Webb here on December 25, 1932.

Having been associated with the local bank for many years, he succeeded Fred Tunnell, who passed away Sept. 17, 1968. Mr. Baum was vice-president for many years and then elevated to Executive Vice-President and then to president at the annual stockholders meeting Jan. 10, 1969. He served as president until the time of his death. Before becoming president he was associated with the bank for 32 years. He was an active stock farmer and had been active in civic affairs and had served the community on the school board and the city council, among numerous civic endeavors. He was a member of the local First United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Jack Webb, a student in Baylor Dental School in Dallas; one daughter, Terry, who is a teacher in the Houston School system; his mother, Mrs. T. E. Baum of Brownwood; one sister, Mrs. R. C. Browning of Brownwood and two grandsons, Jeb and Kevin Baum of Dallas. He was preceded in death by his father and a brother, Parker Baum and one son, Tommy, who died in 1946 at the age of 6 years.

Callahan Rates Second In Area Traffic Mishaps

Only one fatal accident was reported by Texas Department of Public Safety Sergeant Jerry Mathews, supervisor of District 4B2, including Callahan, Eastland, Shackelford and Stephens counties.

The one fatal accident happened in Eastland County, which also led the four-county area in total accidents, 20, persons injured, 10, in five accidents, and property damage accidents, 15.

Callahan was second in most categories with an aggregate of 14 mishaps in which four persons sustained injuries in two crashes and nine wrecks in which four persons sustained injuries in two crashes and nine wrecks in which there was property damage.

Stephens County reported nine persons hurt in two accidents and property damage resulted in nine of a total of 11 accidents.

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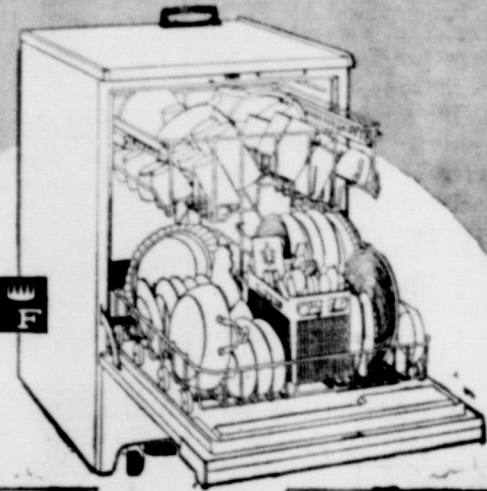
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HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

FROM HIGGINBOTHAMS

Did you know that the first known Christmas card was made in London in 1843? In 1846 1000 copies were lithographed, hand-colored and sold by Felix Summerly's Treasure House in Bond Street.

The cards attracted immediate attention, though it was not the type of attention one might expect a Christmas card to receive. The puritans of the day were aroused by the central illustration of the card, which showed the alcoholic merrymaking of the season. However, two narrow side panels pictured clothing the poor and feeding the hungry and offset some of the criticism. By 1860 the custom of sending Christmas cards was well established in the British Empire and Europe.

In the beginning English cards sold on design alone and contained only the simple greeting, "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year." However, poems by famous authors were often inserted or New Testament passages quoted. Most of the popular cards of the time were not religious but pictured landscapes, Kittens, flowers, and other things of a general nature.

By the early 1870's Louis Prang of Boston was producing a line of deluxe Christmas cards that were in stiff competition with British publications. It was not until 1875, however, that Prang introduced the first complete line of Christmas cards to the American public. His line included elaborate "hanging cards" with silk cords to be hung on parlor walls, cards

edged with silk fringe and decorated with tassels, and even more elegant cards encrusted with blown glass frosting.

In the early 1890's foreign competition introduced cheap imitative imports of Christmas cards and brought the custom to the common people. After 1906 the sentiment or message of the cards became more important than the art work and cards evolved into what we know today.

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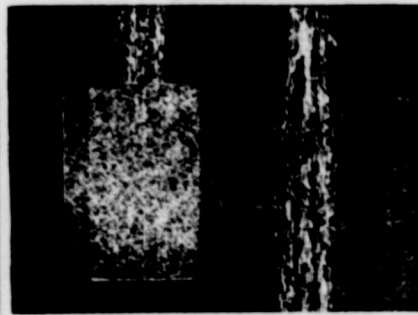
