A nursery will be provided for all services.

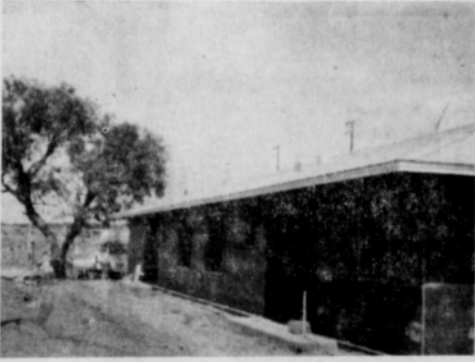
Gary Lawrence is pastor of Southside, and he and his congregation extend an invitation to everyone in the area to attend these services.

Construction 40 Per Cent Complete On Baird's New Housing Project

BAIRD — Construction on the 22 dwelling units and Management Community Building is now 9 percent ahead of schedule for completion of these much needed houses in the City of Baird. Scheduled completion date is set for Feb. 11, 1973. As of Sept. 15th, the project is 40 percent complete, according to Inspector R. L. Smelser. If weather conditions permit and material delivery is continued, the completion is estimated by early January.

The project Tex-197-3, owned by the Baird Housing Authority, is the third such project for Baird and will bring the total of dwelling units to 50. The first one to be built is located on North Eugenia St. and Girard St. Second project is located near the downtown area on W. 2nd and Arch.

The project now under construction is located on Girard St. West 7th, near the Baird High School, and Poplar St., which will stand 12 one and two bedroom units. Ten other units

are under construction on East 4th and Spruce, and East 4th and Chestnut. The Community House is located at 4th and Chestnut, on Business 80 East. Porter & Rhodes Construction, Inc., of Lawton, Okla., are the builders. Construction superintendent is Joe Heald, Architects and Engineers are Fitch, Holdredge, Bisons & Holcomb of Houston.

The Construction has progressed real good and things are beginning to take shape as forms have turned into frames for houses in the past few weeks. This will certainly be an added attraction to the town since so many "eye-sores" were eliminated where the projects are under construction.

Claud Holley, manager of the Baird Chamber of Commerce, has been highly responsible for the promotion of the Housing Projects. Open House and dedication plans are now underway with the Chamber directors, along with Mr. Holley, in preparing a program for this date, which will be early next year.

Clyde Bulldogs, Hamlin Pied Pipers Struggle To 6-6 Tie Friday Night

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs tied Hamlin 6-6 here last Friday night, with defense being the keynote of the game. Hamlin capitalized on a Bulldog fumble in the 1st quarter to set up business on the Clyde 8-yard line. Three plays later, Hamlin led 6-0. The run for 2 points fell short.

The Bulldogs threatened just before the half when Ruben Ramos passed 35 yards to Jackie Fleming at the Hamlin 1-yard line, but the play was called back on a penalty.

In the 2nd half, the Bulldogs put together a 65-yard drive with Gary Barr blasting over from the one. Tommy Bailey's attempt for extra point was blocked by Hamlin. The Bulldogs camped on the Hamlin end of the field throughout the 4th quarter, but the Pied Piper defense held.

The game ended with Ricky Loper intercepting a pass and returning it 28 yards to the Hamlin 9 yard line, but time had run out.

Clyde's defense was tenacious through the game, allowing only 14 yards as the longest run for the Hamlin speedsters. The secondary allowed only two completions for 25 yards, and intercepted two passes. John Bo-

nine, John York, and David Edwards recovered fumbles while Loper and Fleming gathered a stray pass each. Fleming received the tackling award this week, while Robbie Tucker picked up blocking honors.

Defensively, York, Fleming, and Timmy Payne stood out, while Tucker, Iky Akers and Kinny Mitchell looked good blocking. Bobby Everett caught 3 passes for 21 yards.

Sophomores Johnny Arms, James Stevens, Jimmy May and Bobby Evans, a junior, showed promise as they filled in one-way for injured and limited starters. Mike Bennett, Jarrell Hurst and Selan Canada had a good night, and Alan Holcomb punted five times for a 34-yard average.

This Friday, the Bulldogs travel to Jones County to take on perennial power Stamford, who were District 7AA champs last year. Clyde's Bulldogs have shown real character in the last two games in their willingness to come from behind and never give up. Conditioning has paid off as the Bulldogs have shut out opponents in the second halves, and gathered momentum on offense. A real battle is expected to take place at 8 p. m. in Stamford Friday.
