## Buffaloes Test Wylie In Home Oppener Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will be seeking a second straight victory in the young 1972 football season Friday in the home opener against the Wylie Bulldogs. Game time will be 8 p.m.

Cross Plains defeated the Blanket Tigers 35-0 in the season's initial grid contest last week end.

Friday's visitors apparently possess a high-gear offense. The Bulldogs romped past the Rising Star Wildcats 46-7 in that squad's first action last Friday.

A prime cog in Wylie's offensive power is Fullback Joe Bob Stricklin, 190 pounder, who is both rapid and powerful. Dale Doby, a returning defensive starter, has moved to quarterback and is a talented signal

caller and passer. Overall a good nucleus returns from last year's squad for the Bulldogs. Included in that group are veterans End Sammy Day, 180 pounder; Tackle Donnie Nelson, 200 pounds; Jeff Woods, 170 pounder, center, and a top newcomer is Paul Hall, 160 pounder at end.

Buffaloes came out of the Blanket scrap without serious injury, and the starting line-up is expected to be changed little from the roll in the opener last week.

The Bulldogs defeated the Herd 14-6 last year, and an interesting contest developed between Wylie's Stricklin and the Buffs' Rodney Renfro in yards gained rushing. Another contest between the two seniors should evolve again Friday night.

## Music Festival Set For Pioneer Park

Bluegrass may grow best in Kentucky, but the best of Bluegrass Music will be flourishing this week end at the first annual Pioneer Bluegrass Festival at Pioneer. The three day event will be the biggest musical entertainment promotion ever in this section of Texas with the most well known Bluegrass talents in the nation performing Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Site of the three-day musical is Sharon Park, a recently developed park two miles north of Lakewood Recreation Center on Highway 36. Backers of the event expect attendance of several thousand people over the three days including attendance from neighboring states. The park will supply camping facilities, concessions and trailer spaces.

Heading the list of performers will be Bill Monroe, the "Father of Bluegrass", and his band, the Bluegrass Boys. Monroe has been the central figure in Bluegrass since he invented the music style in the early 1930's. He has been a star performer in the Grand Old Opry since it began and has headlined with the biggest names in country entertain-

ment. The talent-laden mandolin master is a member of the Country Music Hall of Fame, and he is regarded as one of the cornerstones of country music.

Also on the list of entertainment are Jim and Jesse McRenolds and the Virginia Boys, James Monroe and the Midnight Ramblers, The Goins Brothers and The Stone Mountain Boys, top names in Bluegrass style music. James Monroe, son of the senior Monroe, is said to be the talented and youthful mirror of his father's musical excellence, and is especially popular with younger generation Bluegrass fans.

Bluegrass music is a style of music involving expert use of banjo, fiddle, guitar and mandolin, without electrical amplification. It has a wide range of appeal for people of all ages, and is said to be one of the fastest growing styles of music in the country.

First day activities at this week end's musicfest will be primarily amateur day with contests for amateur bands, solo banjo and guitar picking with cash prizes and trophies being given to the top three

in each event. Featured on the twice daily stage shows will be The Stone Mountain Boys and all amateur bands with Bill Monroe appearing near the end of the day's program.

Saturday will be a full day of entertainment beginning at 10 a.m. with "work shops" which will feature members of the name bands showing their musical talents with the individual instruments. First stage show featuring all contracted bands is set for 1 p.m. and will also have Friday's amateur contest winners performing. Second stage show will be at 7:30 p.m. and will also feature the full lineup of talent.

Sunday will begin with a 9 a.m. worship service which is to include entertainers performing Bluegrass-style hymns and gospel music. Also on schedule for Sunday will be the afternoon and evening stage shows featuring all contracted bands. Prices of admission are set at \$3, \$5 and \$4 for each consecutive day. A special all week end ticket is \$10.

Local sponsors state they plan to make the event an annual affair with yearly growth of entertainment and facilities.

## Herd Rolls Blanket 35-0 In '72 Grid War Opener

A visiting capacity crowd of Buffalo backers witnessed the first opening season win for a Cross Plains High School eleven since 1965 last Friday night as Coach Don Lee's Thundering

Herd riddled Blanket Tigers 35-0.

The win was one which displayed a cross-section of what might be expected from the Herd throughout the remainder of the season, displaying fully

each of the Buffaloes big guns for this year's grid wars.

It took two-thirds of the first quarter for the Bisons to make their first score after having two drives thwarted. But with 4 minutes, 30 seconds remaining in first quadrant of play Back Rodney Renfro sped in from the 10 yard marker for the first touchdown of the season. The big toe of Tackle-kicking specialist Lynn Koenig netted the extra point following the 20 yard drive set up by Back Rick Kirkham's 20-yard punt return.

Second tally of the first period came two minutes later after Buffs gained possession at the Blanket four yard line following a fumbled Tiger punt attempt. Kirkham tallied the six-pointer on a middle drive, and Koenig's conversion made the score 14-0 as the first period drew to its close.

Quarterback Roger Crawford's passing arm proved valuable early in the second quarter as he passed to End Glen Phillips on a third down and 16 situation, and Phillips maneuvered his way for a 70-yard touchdown scamper. Koenig's extra point attempt was partially deflected and the scoreboard read 20-0. A fumble robbed the Herd of a quick follow-up tally as Kirkham, Crawford and Renfro each ran for long gains to penetrate to within 10 yards of pay, and the 20-0 score remained at half-time.

Third quarter found the Tigers still unable to impose any real scoring threat and the Buffaloes scored on another drive after taking possession on downs on Blanket's own 24. Renfro ran for eight, back Randy Pancake gained two yards and a first down and Renfro finalized the quick attack with a 12-yard bust through the hole supplied by the Bison front five. Koenig connected again on the kick after and the Buffaloes led 27-0.

Blanket came back with its only close threat to the scoreboard keepers with gutsy back Ronnie Schulze leading a running attack to the Herd's 20 only

## Coleman Gains Lead In Area Bond Sales

Coleman County has regained the lead in area U. S. Savings Bond sales among Callahan, Brown and Eastland counties.

Reports are for the first seven months of this year, through July.

Coleman County has attained 76 per cent of its 1972 quota of \$120,000, according to Robert I. Bowen, Jr., savings bond chairman. The county slipped to second place during June, but sales of \$26,876 in July put the county back on top in the four county area. Bowen reports an aggregate of \$91,902.

Brown County fell to second place with 67 per cent of its 1972 goal of \$330,000 attained. H. L. Evans, Jr., county chairman, reported that Brown county citizens purchased \$30,059 worth of the Series E and H bonds during the month of

July which gave a total of \$221,108.

Howard E. Farmer of Baird, Callahan County chairman, reports that this county has reached just 47 per cent of the 1972 quota. Only \$2,944 worth of the bonds were bought during July for an aggregate of \$61,687, less than half of the standard set at \$130,000.

Eastland County, which has no bond chairman, is in fourth place with 43 per cent of its goal of \$300,000 reached. July sales there amounted to \$9,582 for a total of \$142,338.

July sales in Texas were 810,210 during the same period last year. Year-to-date sales amounted to \$125,013,794, while 1971 sales totaled \$118,726,731, a 5.2% increase.

Nationwide sales during July totaled \$493 million. For the January-July period sales were \$3.7 billion, 15% above sales last year.
