## Gorman Due On Friday In Herd's Rebound Try

Gorman Panthers will furnish opposition for the Cross Plains Buffaloes in the Herd's second home game. Kickoff is scheduled for 8 p.m. Friday in the non-conference contest.

Gorman comes into the clash with an 0-1 record, having dropped a close decision to the Dublin Lions in the Panthers only outing of the season. Buffaloes tangled with the Lions in a pre-season scrimmage, battling to a deadlock. On that basis the two units appear to be about even.

Gorman has long been a power in Class B conferences, and last year compiled a 7-3 season mark. This year the Panthers are members of District 6-B, an eight-school loop. One pre-season poll rated the Gorman 11 as a fifth place finisher, immediately behind Rising Star, next week's opponent, and ahead of Blanket. Buffs defeated the latter squad 35-0 in the season opener.

Six regulars return to the Panther lair this year, headed by such quality as two-year

letter winner Jim Jackson, 205-pound tackle. The offense will be guided by a masterful signal caller Kelly Henderson, a six-foot, 160-pounder, who was an all-district selection in 1971.

Size is a trump for the Panthers as it was for the Wylie Bulldogs. Other returning monogram winners include Marshall Roberts 180-pound back, Rodney Warren, 170-pound lineman, Bill Baze, 150-pound back, and James Michael, 216-pound lineman.

Buffaloes are expected to be in near top physical shape for the contest with the possible exception of Lynn Koenig, tackle, who was injured in last Friday tilt.

Gorman and Cross Plains have not met on the gridiron for the past few years, but in the past the two schools have been fairly evenly matched.

Again Cross Plains will have to overcome a slight weight disadvantage, which the Herd did not do last week. Gorman will also have the advantage of having a week's rest.

## Ex-Local Man Given College

Editor's Note: The following article appeared in a recent edition of an Odessa paper. It concerns a man who is well known in Cross Plains.

Dennis Beeler has the kind of military assignment most soldiers dream about.

The 28-year-old Chief Warrant Officer's regular assignment is to attend classes full-time at Odessa College.

The 1961 Cross Plains High School graduate is a freshman studying electronics.

He is a career Army man who has served nine years in the military. Once out of high school, Beeler worked two years in the oil patch near Kermit before enlisting in the Army when he was 19.

Since then, he has been working in electronics-related fields and anti-ballistic missile work in the Army. He has been stationed in Germany, Florida, and Kwajalein, Marshall Islands, which are some 2,000 miles south of Hawaii.

Last January the Army initiated the officers undergraduate degree program for warrant officers and enlisted men so they could study for associate college degrees.

Beeler, who had been hoping

there was some way he could go to college, immediately applied for the program. He was among the first group accepted.

The Army gave the young officer three colleges from which to choose — Odessa College, the University of Texas at El Paso or New Mexico State University.

Odessa College was his choice, he says, because he wanted to live in West Texas and his wife, children and mother already were living in Odessa while he had been stationed abroad.

The Army required that Beeler study a field related to his work in the military, so he is majoring in electrical technology at OC and plans to complete his associate degree in May of 1974.

He is required to attend college full-time — summers and all — and must maintain at least a "C" average.

Even though it has been 11 years since he was in school, Beeler is eager to meet the challenge of studying. He admits he is a little "rusty" with his study habits. "But I'm really serious about going to school," he says. "I've wanted to go to college for so long."

When he enrolled for 13 semester hours in English, math,

## Wylie Attack Halts Herd In Home Tilt

Second play from scrimmage last Friday night set the stage for visiting Wylie Bulldogs 27-0 humbling of the Cross Plains Buffaloes.

It was the home opener for the Thundering Herd, and the loss evens the unit's season record at 1-1.

The second play from scrimmage saw Wylie's rapid Halfback Kenny Kelly, a 170-pound-ramble 58 yards for the touchdown. The score came only a minute and four seconds after Bisons kicked off to the visitors. Kelly then added insult to injury by toeing the pigskin between the uprights for a 7-0 lead. That tally was all the Bulldogs needed to gain the win, and it was all they got for some time.

Wylie completely dominated the first quarter, allowing the Herd just 15 net yards and eight offensive plays. Wylie also controlled the second quarter of play, but got into trouble on a lost fumble.

Buff Donny Dillard's long punt was bobbled by the Wylie receiver, and they again lost the oval upon being tackled.

Buff Jerry Fortune smothered the ball, and Cross Plains had a first just outside the Bulldog 10. Two running plays lost four yards, and a pass fell incomplete. Quarterback Roger Crawford netted two yards on a broken fourth down play. Wylie's defense continued to control the game through the first half, not allowing the Herd's attack even one first down. Buffalo defenders also buckled down and limited Wylie to just sporadic thrusts.

Early in the second half the tide momentarily changed to the Buffs when Chuck Pennell recovered a Bulldog fumble at the Wylie 26. Halfback Ricky Kirkham netted 13 yards in two plays and the Herd's first down of the night. Fullback Rodney Renfro counted seven, and Kirkham gained another six to the Wylie line. Crawford netted a couple of feet before

two consecutive penalties shoved the Herd back 20 yards, and Wylie gained possession after a 10-yard gain by Renfro.

Wylie quickly assumed command again and moved the 89 needed yards in 11 plays to paydirt. Fullback Joe Stricklin gained the last three yards over right tackle. Kelly's perfect placement made it 14-0 with 21 seconds left in the third quarter. During the drive the Bulldogs repeated several times, and in later drives, the identical and similar plays which each time suckered the Herd's defense.

Ran started falling midway through Wylie's second goalward thrust. Bulldog Tackle Donnie Nelson recovered a Buff fumble, but on the next play Buff Tackle Larry Tatom gobbled up a Wylie bobble. A 12-yard screen pass from Crawford to Renfro put the Herd on Wylie's 25, but Bisons surrendered the ball nine yards upfield four plays later.

From there the spirited Bulldog ground attack paid off. Wylie blitzed 66 yards in just five plays after trading 15 yard penalties with the Herd. Stricklin who began the drive with a 31-yard romp, got the final 16 yards up the middle with 5:35 left in the final stanza. Again Kelly's kick was good for a 21-0 lead.

Bulldog Guard Jeff Woods covered a third Buff lost fumble on the Herd's 22. Just five plays later after offsetting penalties nullified a 14-yard scoring jaunt by Quarterback Doby Doby, Halfback David Cochran circled left end for 16 yards and the tally with 2:02 showing on the clock. He was hit twice, but shook loose. Kelly's kick was partially deflected.

Buffaloes could do little right in a frenzied last-ditch effort, and the final score favored Wylie 27-0.

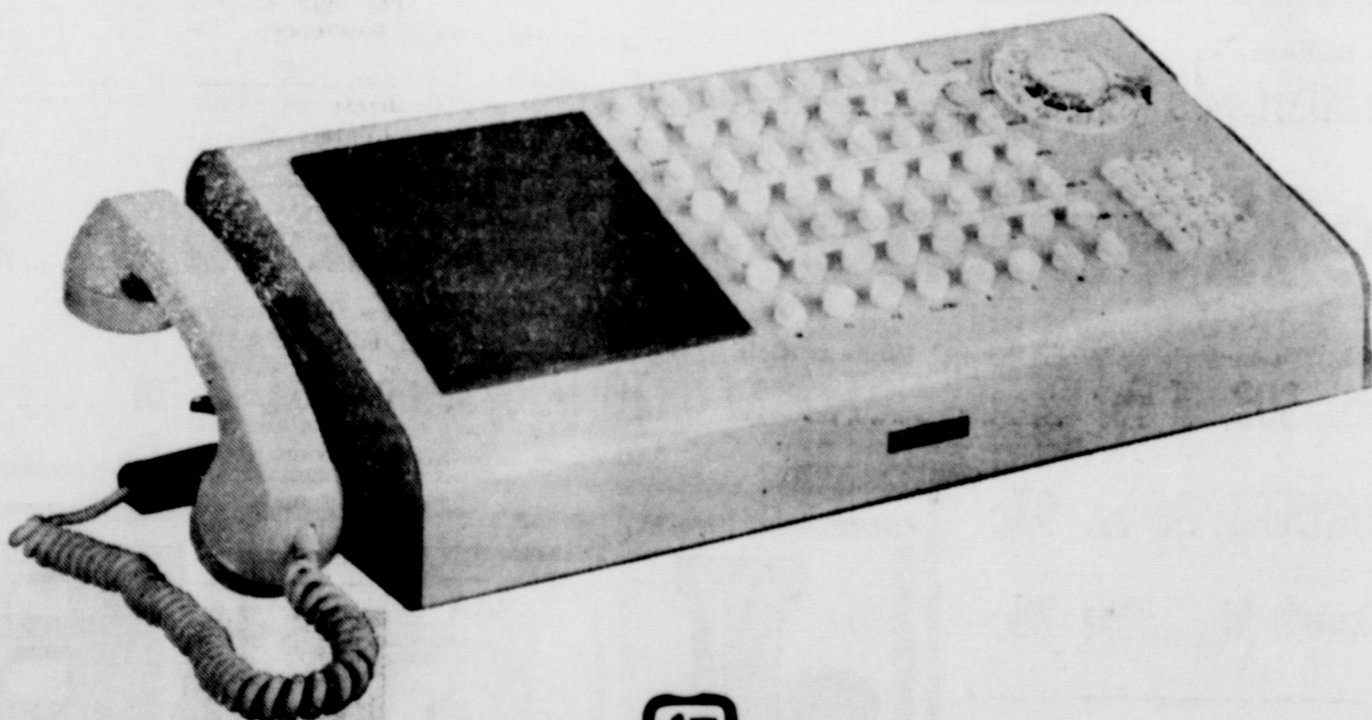

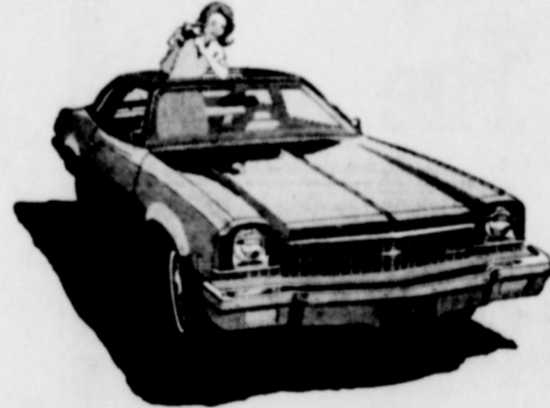

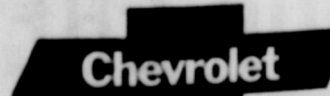
