Score came on a first and ten situation at the Wildcat 17 where Crawford passed to Kirkham in the end zone. Kick for extras was short and Buffs were within one point of their visitors, 15-14, but not for long.

Following kickoff fell to Rising Star deep man Rickey Schaefer, who raced for an 87-yard kickoff return tally. After point try failed, but the Wildcats lead 21-14.

Editor's Note: Here are analyses of Amendments No. 3 and No. 4 to the Texas Constitution, which will be voted on in the General Election to be held Nov. 7. These brief analyses are intended to be unbiased.

You will vote FOR or AGAINST:

Amendment No. 3, amending Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, to require the commissioners courts in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis beginning Jan. 1, 1973.

Proponents say the proposed amendment would promote integrity and better justice by removing the possibility of conflict of interest which might exist in a court where compensation of the justice of the peace is dependent on fees he collects.

They point out that the proposed amendment would provide uniformity in compensation thus remedying the situation now existing whereby justices compensated on a fee basis in some areas actually get two or three times the compen-

## Amendments 3 And 4 Explained

Proponents feel there is a real need for a more workable basic law such as that of the proposed amendment, which would require less periodic revision, and they point out that since the legislature has always been entrusted with proposing constitutional changes, the legislative body is the logical choice for preparing a new or revised constitution.

Opponents say that constitutional reform cannot and should not be effected through an entirely new document, which is one of the alternatives open to a convention. They believe that constitutional revision is not a legislative function and think that a constitutional convention should stem from the people, and if the state needs a new constitution or a thorough revision of the basic law, then members of the convention should be elected by the people and subject to them.

### 3 Fire Companies To Practice Here Friday

Members of the Fire Departments of Cross Plains, Baird and Rising Star will practice skills they hopefully will never have to use in fighting liquified petroleum gas fires at a demonstration on Monday, October 9 at the teenage ball park at 7:00 p.m. here.

The public is invited to witness the demonstration which is being held by firemen by Ranger-Pan American Insurance Companies of Houston and sponsored by the LP-Gas dealers in this area and Texas A&M Fire School.

This training session will be an actual exercise in dealing with a liquified petroleum gas fire. The LP-Gas industry is relatively new; suppliers and dealers have already had special training in handling the fuel and the safety record has been sufficiently good that few firemen have had occasion to gain

experience in combating this kind of fire.

Ranger's fire safety instructors will provide a 500-gallon LP-Gas tank and a multi-pronged "Christmas tree," each of which will be ignited and then extinguished by the participating firemen, who will be using their regular fire fighting equipment. About 1,000 gallons of LP-Gas are expected to be burned during the two-hour session. Purpose is to give local firemen, under the close supervision of Ranger instructors, an opportunity to gain experience and confidence in their own ability to quench an LP-Gas fire.

Firemen will experience the noise and heat they would face in such an emergency situation, and at the same time practice the techniques of approaching the fire, maintaining a protective cover of water from fog nozzles, and shutting off the fuel source.

## Eula Voters Approve School Bond Issue

Residents of the Eula Rural School District Saturday passed a \$425,000 school bond issue.

The residents voted 190 to 126 to approve issuing of bonds to build a new high school, new gymnasium and new vocational facility to house homemaking and agriculture courses.

School Superintendent Mac Coppinger, native of Cross Plains and former local school principal, said that he was very pleased with the voters turnout. "The school board felt like the people were ready for the election because they realized the need for new facilities," Coppinger said.

He said that construction should begin in February or March, and that it should take less than a calendar year to complete the buildings.

Coppinger said that the new high school will house 250 students from grades 7-12. He said the present facilities will be used for students in kindergarten through grade 6.

Eula, with an enrollment of 280 students, is located 15 miles southeast of Abilene. The district contains an area of 130 square miles in Taylor and Callahan Counties. The school district encompasses area near Abilene.

The B Buffs will host Early in a 7 p.m. contest Thursday. Local unit will be seeking a fourth straight triumph.


