Callahan County To Get About \$100,500 In Federal Funds

Callahan County will receive an estimated \$100,500 in federal funds under the new federal revenue sharing plan, according to word received by A. E. Dyer, Jr., county judge, from National Association of Counties.

It was noted that the funds are to be used on permanent improvements. It also explained that final figures are still being compiled.

First payment is due in December and another is expected before April 1, 1973.

Still no estimate on amount the City of Cross Plains will get has been received here. Word was given by the League of Texas Municipalities that a meeting is scheduled on the subject and a representative of this city was expected to attend.

City, Area Set For Festive Turkey Day

Cross Plains and area residents were busily readying first of the week for a festive Thanksgiving holiday Thursday, and in some cases stretching through the week end.

Majority of the downtown business houses in Cross Plains will observe Thursday as a full holiday, and some of the firms along major highways in the city will also close or operate on abbreviated schedules. Others will be required to remain open and conduct business as usual.

Cross Plains schools were to dismiss at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday and remain closed Thursday and Friday, thereby giving students and teachers a four-day holiday week end.

Most local businesses will re-open doors on Friday and follow regular schedules through the week end. Local schools will hold classes as usual on Monday.

A large influx of visitors is expected in Cross Plains and surrounding countryside and communities during the holidays. Many local residents are expecting members of their family or close friends to arrive during the holiday week end while many other local persons will be traveling to other cities to enjoy fellowship with family and friends.

Highway traffic is expected to be extremely heavy during the major portion of the week end. That will mean that local law officers will work longer than normal hours in an effort to prevent an accident from marring this year's Thanksgiving celebrations. All persons are being urged to drive friendly and defensively to insure each gets to his destination and back home safely.

No special religious services for Thanksgiving in this city or the area had been learned of by the Review Tuesday at noon.

A joyful, safe and bountiful Thanksgiving, punctuated by a sincere thanks for all blessing received, is hoped for in the Cross Plains area.

School Reminds Of Truant Laws

Editor's Note: Cross Plains schools were deprived of a teacher for this school year because of poor average daily attendance during the 1971-72 school year, and in an effort to prevent a repeat of that, officials and members of the school board are reminding students, parents and guardians of the laws concerning compulsory attendance. The following paragraphs were taken from the Texas Education Code, Bulletin 721, dated 1971. The first paragraph may be found on page 308, and the second may be read on pages 49 and 50.

Compulsory Attendance
Unless specifically exempted by Section 21 033 of this code or

under other laws, every child in the state who is as much as seven years of age and not more than 17 years of age shall be required to attend the public schools in the district of his residence or in some other district to which he may be transferred as provided or authorized by law a minimum of 165 days of the regular school term of the district in which the child resides or to which he has been transferred.

Thwarting Compulsory Attendance Law

(a) If any parent or person standing in parental relation to a child, within the compulsory school attendance ages and not lawfully exempt or properly excused from school attendance, fails to require such child to attend school for such periods as required by law, it shall be the duty of the proper attendance officer to warn, in writing, the parent or person standing in parental relation that attendance must be immediately required. If after this warning the parent or person standing in parental relation willfully fails to comply, the attendance officer shall file a complaint against him in the county court, or in the justice court of his resident

precinct. Any parent or person standing in parental relation convicted of willfully violating this section shall be fined not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for the first offense, not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for the second offense, and not less than \$25 nor more than \$100 for a subsequent offense. Each day the child remains out of school after the warning has been given or the child ordered to school by the juvenile court may constitute a separate offense.

(b) If any parent or person standing in parental relation can prove that he is unable to compel his child to attend school, he shall be exempt from the penalties provided in this section and his child may be proceeded against as a habitual truant and committed to a state juvenile training school or any other suitable school agreed upon between his parent or person standing in parental relation and the judge of the juvenile court.

(c) At the trial of any person charged with violating the provision of this section, the attendance records of the child or ward may be presented in court by any authorized employee of the school district.

A I Rating was necessary for the band to be in contention for a sweepstakes award in concert and sight-reading contest later in the school year.

Five band majorettes earned I ratings in twirling contest. Misses Terry Edington and Paula Wright earned the top award in a duet, and in a trio Misses Sandy Weiss, Dorothy Reed and Barbara Smoot also won a I rating.

Taking a II rating was Miss Melissa Pancake for her twirling solo.

Charles Chesshir Wins College Ag Scholarship

Charles Chesshir, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Chesshir of Cross Plains, has been awarded one of six agricultural scholarships given by Cisco Junior College Agriculture Department. It is the first year that the scholarships have been awarded.

In a time of student enrollment decline in many area colleges, the Cisco Junior College Agriculture Department increased their enrollment to an all time high of 232 this year. In an effort to attract quality students as well as an increase in number, six scholarships based on leadership, student participation and academic achievement were awarded to outstanding agriculture students in the area.

In order for Chesshir to apply, he first had to have the recommendation of his high school Vocational Agriculture instructor. Documentation of leadership, individual participation, and academic achievement were also required.

A screening committee made up of college agriculture instructors and outstanding college agriculture students made the six selections from numerous applications.

Chesshir is a 1972 graduate of Cross Plains High School, and is a freshman agriculture

major at the Cisco college. He is also active in agriculture, having farmed land for some years. He served the Local Future Farmers of America chapter as an officer during his high school days.

Funeral for Thomas A. (Tom) Minton, 86, of Brownwood, was held at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 14, at Brownwood funeral home.

Mr. Minton, former longtime, prominent resident of the Pioneer community, died at 8 a.m. Sunday, Nov. 12, in a Bangs Nursing home following a long illness.

Burial was in Byrds Cemetery.

Born on Sept. 21, 1886, in Burnet County, he was a former school teacher and long-time postmaster at Pioneer. He lived with his parents for many years between Cross Plains and Pioneer. a business there many years. Mr. Minton was a member of the Church of Christ and served with the 36th Division during World War I. He married Effie Byrd at Eastland in 1926.

District 10-A King Downs Buffaloes In Year's Finale

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes were defeated here last Friday night 20-12 by District 10-A champions Santa Anna Mountaineers in the 1972 season finale.

Buffaloes finished the year with a 4-6 season record and a 1-4 district mark.

Eyes turned to basketball and hopes for a winning football eleven are delayed another season. A strong and experienced nucleus returns next year for the Herd which hopes for a strong contingent in the 1973 wars.

In the game Friday night, Santa Anna gained an unimpressive win which has been the story of the Buffaloes throughout the season. District 10-A has proven to be one of the most unpredictable loops in the state, with anyone and everyone having as good or as poor an aggregate showing as ex-tremes can possibly permit.

Santa Anna was bested on the statistic sheet by Buffaloes in nearly every category, which has also been a virtue of the losing Herd throughout the year. In three of the four district losses, the Buffaloes have led at halftime only to be buffeted in close losses in the second segment of the contests. Cross Plains led in first downs two to one in the Friday finale encounter, which shows ability to move the ball, but the lack of enough pointage speaks for the scoring inability of the 1972 season's contingent.

Buffaloes Rodney Renfro and Jerry Fortune lead the local offensive ground attack, and the combination of Quarterback Roger Crawford and End Donny Dillard lead the passing game of the Herd which posted 160 total yards for the effort, the best passing game of the season.

Herd's first score of the contest was the most impressive of the 1972 season, it being a 97-yard drive. Five first downs and two of three pass completions in the drive gave promise that the night might belong to the Buffaloes. Score was made by Crawford from the one and Rex Mayes kick for extra point was partially deflected giving the Herd a 10 lead two minutes into the second quarter.

Santa Anna ruled the scoreboard from that point, though, scoring 13 points in the second quarter to lead 13-6 at the half. The first Mountaineer score was a 48-yard run by Quarterback David Horner off the triple option, and with the added kick conversion, Mounties led 7-6. With 1:40 left in the first half an unidentified Mountaineer picked off a deflected Buffalo pass at the Herd 15. Score came four plays later from the one by Back Rocky Dean.

In second half scoring the eleven exchanged scores, Santa Anna in the third period and Buffaloes in the fourth quadrant. Santa Anna's score again came off the triple option, this

time with Horner leaving the pigskin in the mid-section of Back Danny Valdez who turned in a 45-yard touchdown run. Dean's toe added the extra and with 3:05 remaining in the third period, Buffaloes were down 20-6.

Buffaloes were unable to turn in a scoring combination until only 5:35 remained in the fourth quarter. This score came on a 37-yard pass-run play from Crawford to Dillard. The try for two extra points were denied and the night's scoring was at its close.

Buffaloes entered the contest with three starters ailing from injuries. Missing action were Backs Rick Kirkham and Tony Winfrey and Guard Jackie Thomas.

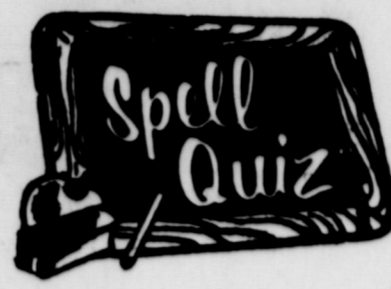
