

In addition to the increased number of housing starts, the industry spokesman cited the following reasons for the continued rising lumber prices. (1) The lack of export controls have increased the volume of log exports from 430.6 million feet through September of last year to 512.7 million board feet through September of this year. and (2) the lack of price controls on federal timber and the federal government's policy of selling logs to the highest bidder are consistently raising the log prices which are passed on in the finished product. It is estimated that the Federal government owns over 65% of the nation's forests. "If the government's policies and regulations are continued, the American people can expect their future housing to be stamped, 'Made in Japan' at the expense of the American public," Butler said.

"The Price Commission's regulations rather than increasing the supply of lumber have been counter productive' in that they have restricted the nation's lumber supply on many critical lumber items. 


