Stock Show Re-Set Here For Friday And Saturday

Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will be held at the show barn north of Cross Plains Friday and Saturday. The exhibition was originally scheduled last week end, but the inclement weather forced postponement of the show. Approximately 250 entries are expected from county 4-H Clubs and four Future Farmers of America chapters at Cross Plains, Clyde Baird and Eula. Judging of goats, rabbits and poultry will begin at 9:30 a.m. Friday. Bryan Wilson of Abilene will judge the rabbit division. J. I. Moore, retired agriculture teacher of Abilene, will judge the poultry. Chuck Threet, Brown County Extension Agent, will judge goats. Threet will also judge breeding sheep at 10:15 a.m. with the Brown County agent doing the placing. Fat lambs will be judged at 11 a.m. Swine show will start at 1:30 p.m.

Mike McCravey, Coleman County Extension Agent, will judge the cattle on Saturday. Dairy judging will kick off the day's events at 10:30 a.m. followed by beef heifers at 11:00 a.m. The steer show will begin at 1:30 p.m. with McCravey doing the judging. C. Lee Smith, Clyde area rancher and farmer, is general superintendent and chairman of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Assn. which is sponsoring this event. Other officers include: chairman—Lloyd Barr, Jr., of Eula, Treasurer—Doug Ford of Clyde, Secretary—Greg Gergross of Baird. Vocational agriculture teachers supervising chapters activities are O. B. Edmondson of Cross Plains, James Trammell and Tim Stone of Clyde, Dick Vestal of Baird and Claude Rock of Eula, Greg Gergross County Extension Agent, supervises the county 4-H activities.

Superintendents for each division are, as follows: beef, Don Harris; swine, Jimmy West; goats, lambs, breeding sheep, Edwin Schaefer; dairy cattle, Lloyd Barr, Jr.; poultry, Les Ethetton, and rabbits, Jimmy Ropolo. Ribbons will be presented in all classes, rosettes will be awarded to all grand champion, reserve grand champion, breed champion and reserve breed champions. Prize money will be paid to ribbon winners in all classes. The prize money was made possible by local businessmen and individuals. 8-Inch Snowfall Paralyzes Cross Plains Area Last Week

A savage snow storm which some say yielded a record amount of the fluffy white stuff paralyzed the Cross Plains area last week. It brought business and travel to a virtual standstill in this area and forced postponement of several events. Already under a coating of ice which began on Saturday, Jan. 6, with little thaw except on heavily traveled thoroughfares, the Cross Plains area received light snow early Wednesday morning. Late that afternoon and night snow covered this area with up to 10 inches reported in some areas.

School was closed all week because of the extremely hazardous driving conditions. The Callahan County Junior Livestock Show which was scheduled in Cross Plains Friday and Saturday was postponed until this week end. The inclement weather also forced postponement of the annual beauty contest at the school. It has been re-set for Saturday, Jan. 27. The bad road conditions also slowed mail service in and out of

Cross Plains, but did not stop rural carriers.

Although the snow covering was extremely hard on livestock, some say it was a blessing in disguise. The moderately wet snow gave needed moisture to small grain crops and winter pasturage.

Some thawing of frozen roadways began late Thursday, but most of the highways and country roads remained extremely slick, especially at night and early in the mornings until mid-morning Saturday. Tuesday morning after three days of warming temperature only small traces of the snow remained in shaded areas.

Although measurements of the snow varied from 7 to 10 inches in the immediate Cross Plains area, most believed that about 8 inches fell here.

An accurate measurement of the snow and ice were not available. F. C. Newton, local official weather observer, said that his gauge showed only .38 of an inch of moisture, but he believes that much more water was yielded by the snow. Total moisture to noon Tuesday for January, according to Newton's records, was 1.60 inches, well above normal.

There were no major traffic accidents reported to the Review during the ice and snow periods.

A seige of sub-freezing tem

peratures were recorded in this area during the wintry blast.

Lowest readings were reported early Friday morning when many area thermometers dipped to below zero. There is no official weather thermometer in Cross Plains, but most hovered at the zero mark, while others slid to as much as six below.

The frigid temperatures caused mains to break, and workmen spent many cold, wet hours repairing the lines to keep water flowing to homes and businesses. Water pipes in many businesses and households also were frozen and burst.

Mike McClure Fights 58 Of 74 Fires In Cross Plains Past Year

Mike McClure answered more fire alarms in Cross Plains and the surrounding countryside than any other local fireman during 1972, according to figures released Monday by Alton E. Hornsby, chief.

McClure helped fight 58 blazes during the past year, 24 within the corporate limits and 34 in rural areas. Runner-up was Bill Hedrick who battled a total of 38.

An aggregate of 74 fires were reported last year, slightly less than in 1971. Thirty-one calls were responded to in Cross Plains, and 43 came from surrounding areas.

It was pointed out that 287 firemen were involved in the 31 city blazes, taking 250.8 hours for an average of .8713 hours per man. The 43 rural blazes required 291.58 hours from 195 men, an average of 1.4952 hours per man.

New Law Changes SS Disability Rules

Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of nine articles on the new law that have been prepared by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security's district manager at Abilene.

Several changes were made in the disability insurance part of social security. One would reduce the "waiting period" from six months to five, letting benefits start with the sixth full month of disability instead of the seventh such month as in 1972 and earlier years. Blind persons will now be insured for disability benefits if they are fully insured whether or not they meet the usual recency of employment provisions.

Childhood disability benefits will now be payable if a son or daughter becomes totally disabled before age 22 rather than before 18 as in past law. Also, if the disability terminates, benefits can be reinstated if the son or daughter again becomes disabled within seven years of the recovery.

A change is made in the manner in which receipt of workmen's compensation benefits affect social security's disability benefits which will often enable social security payments to be increased.

If a disabled person dies before getting a disability application filed, his widow may now do so on his behalf if she takes such action within 3 months of her husband's death. Any retroactive benefits due him could be paid to her.

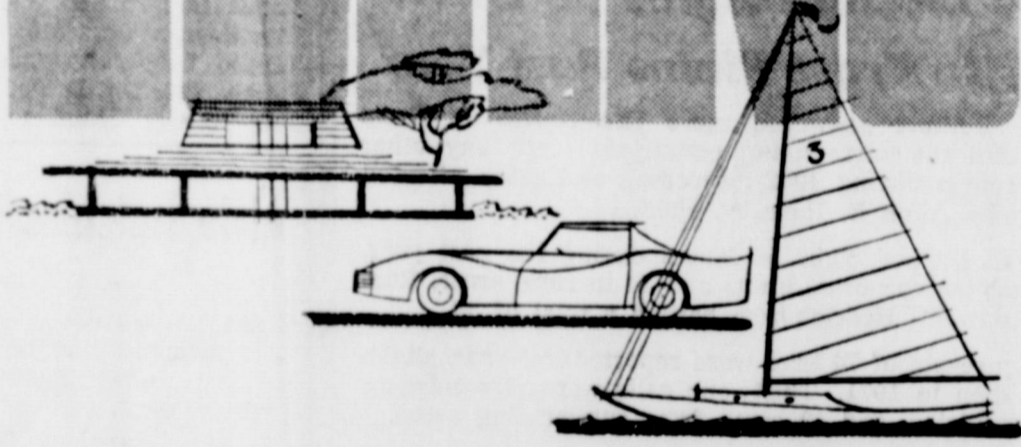

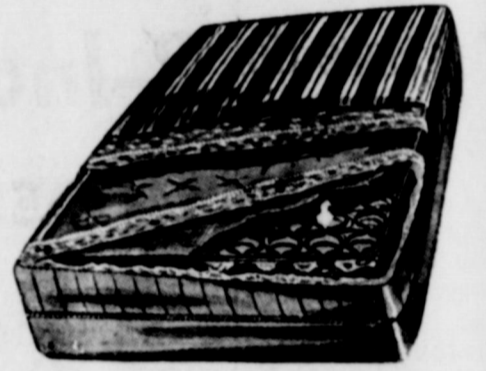

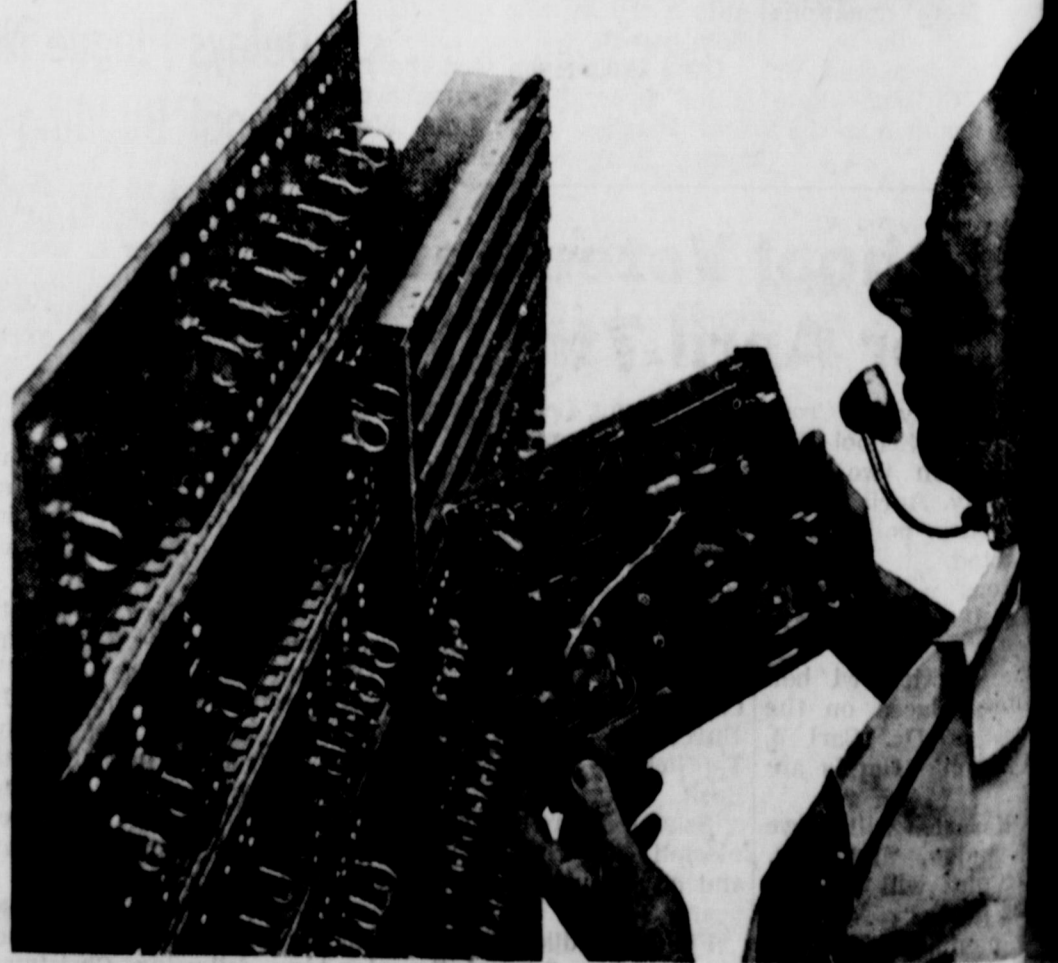

New Law On Outdoor Advertising Explained

The Texas Highway Commission has extended the license and permit filing deadline for owners of signs along Interstate and primary highways.

The Commission extended the filing deadline from December 31 to June 30, 1973. Advertising industry and individual sign owners requested the extension because the previous deadline did not permit sufficient time to comply with the Texas Highway Beautification Act.

The Act requires a permit for each existing or planned sign. Also, anyone erecting or maintaining signs within 660 feet of an Interstate or Federal-aid highway must have a license to engage in outdoor advertising.

Sign owners are advised to apply for a license and all necessary sign permits as soon as possible since no further extension of the deadline is contemplated.

The State license fee of \$25 is valid for an indefinite period. In addition, sign owners are required to post a \$2,500 bond in each county in which they have signs. Maximum bonds of \$10,000 are required of owners with signs in more than three counties.

Both license and bond appli-

cations are available through the Right of Way Division, Texas Highway Department, P.O. Box 5075, Austin, Texas, 78763.

In addition, owners must obtain a \$5 permit for each sign. Permits for new signs will not be issued unless they conform to the law. Sign permit application forms can be obtained from the right of way sections of Highway Department district offices.

Owners of signs who have questions about the program or the new deadline date should contact the nearest Highway Department district office.

For persons in Callahan and Eastland Counties that is in Abilene, J. C. Roberts, district engineer, P. O. Box 150, Old Anson Road and U. S. Highway 83. Coleman and Brown County sign owners should contact the office in Brownwood, E. M. Pritchard, P. O. Box 1549, U. S. Highway 183 Northeast.

Rotate Crops, Check For Nematodes - White

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White noted the increased interest in crop rotations in the peanut producing area of Central Texas and pointed out that crop rotations are of special importance where fields have been continuously planted in peanuts.

"Crop rotations help to reduce crop damage from diseases, insects and nematodes," he said. However, Commissioner White warned that it is possible new land being put in peanuts may be infested with crop-damaging nematodes. Research workers have proven that some kinds of lesion nematodes can live in land where sorghums, corn, and common coastal Bermuda grass have been grown.

Commissioner White urged all farmers who are putting in new land to have soil samples analyzed for nematodes before peanut crops are planted in 1973. He said that root-knot nematode may live in other crops besides peanuts. When peanuts are planted in land infested with certain kinds of root-knot nematodes, then damage to the peanut crop usually follows. On regularly cropped land it is to the farmer's best interest to have his fields analyzed for nematodes at least each two years.

For some unknown reason, nematode populations can practically disappear from a field that has a history of high nematode damage to crops. Conversely, fields with low

populations of nematodes may suddenly have damaging numbers of nematodes.

Nematode samples can be sent to the Texas Department of Agriculture, De Leon Research Lab, 301 West Navarro, De Leon, Texas 76444, for analysis. The samples should be received at least two months in advance of planting time. The samples must be moist, in plastic bags, and properly identified.
