





More Social Security Changes Are Told

Editor's Note: This is the fifth of a series of nine articles on the new laws that have been prepared by R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security's district manager at Abilene.

Nondisabled widowers may be paid as early as age 60, as has been the case for widows. Widowers must have been dependent on their wives at the time the wife died.

Heretofore, an amount equal to 1 per cent of all disability benefits in a year could be spent for rehabilitation of the beneficiaries. The amount is being increased to one and onefourth per cent for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1973, and to one and one-half per cent for following years. It might be mentioned that rehabilitation has been so successful that the costs of the service have been considerably less than the savings from termination of reha-

billitated beneficiaries.

A child who is adopted by either a retirement or a disability beneficiary may be due social security benefits if: (1) the adoption was in a court of competent jurisdiction in the U. S.: (2) the child was living with and receiving at least onehalf support from the bene ficiary for at least one year before entitlement to retirement or disability benefits; and (3) the child was under 18 when he began to live with the adoption parent.
