Medicare Changes Noted In SS Act

Editor's Note: this is the sixth in a series of nine articles on the new laws that have been prepared by R. R. Tuley. Jr., social security's district manager at Abilene.

The new amendments extend Medicare protection to persons in receipt of social security or railroad retirement disability benefits for at least 24 consecutive months and who are still disabled. This provision be comes effective with the later of: (1) July 1973, or (2) the 25th consecutive month of an individual's entitlement to disability benefits: Medicare protection will end with the month following the month in which a notice of termination of disability benefits is mailed to the beneficiary, no matter what the month in which the disability is held to have ended.

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
