**COLA DRINKS, COFFEE, CREAM, FRUIT JUICES, MILK, TEA, ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, SOFT DRINKS, INK, CANDY, CATSUP, VOMIT, EGG, MUSTARD:** Blot and/or scrape up excess. Sponge with detergent solution; blot with tissue. Sponge with water; blot with tissue.

**BUTTER, CANDLE WAX, GREASY FOODS, FURNITURE POLISH (SOLVENT BASE), GREASE, OIL, SHOE POLISH (PASTE):** Blot and/or scrape up excess. Sponge with drycleaning fluid; blot with tissue.

**CHOCOLATE MILK OR COCOA, FOODS (GENERAL), FURNITURE POLISH (WATER BASE), ICE CREAM, SHOE POLISH (LIQUID):** Blot and/or scrape up excess. Sponge with detergent solution; blot with tissue. Sponge with water; blot again. If stain persists, sponge with drycleaning fluid; blot with tissue.

**CRAYON, IODINE (TINCTURE), MERCUROCHROME:** Blot up excess. Sponge with alcohol; blot with tissue. **SALAD DRESSING:** Blot up excess. Sponge with drycleaning fluid; blot with tissue. If spot persists, sponge with detergent solution; blot with tissue. Sponge with water; blot with tissue.

**GLUE (PLASTIC BASE), NAIL POLISH:** Sponge with acetone (nail polish remover); blot with tissue.

**CHEWING GUM:** Sponge with drycleaning fluid; blot dry. **PAINT OR VARNISH (OIL BASE):** Sponge with paint thinner; blot. Sponge with drycleaning fluid; blot.

**Medicare Changes Noted In SS Act**

Editor's Note: this is the sixth in a series of nine articles on the new laws that have been prepared by R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security's district manager at Abilene.

The new amendments extend Medicare protection to persons in receipt of social security or railroad retirement disability benefits for at least 24 consecutive months and who are still disabled. This provision becomes effective with the later of: (1) July 1973, or (2) the 25th consecutive month of an individual's entitlement to disability benefits; Medicare protection will end with the month following the month in which a notice of termination of disability benefits is mailed to the beneficiary, no matter what the month in which the disability is held to have ended.

Medicare coverage is extended to persons who are either insured or entitled to monthly benefits and to their spouses and dependent children, if hemodialysis or renal transplantation is needed due to chronic (renal (kidney) disease. Eligibility for such coverage begins with the 3rd month after the month in which a course of renal hemodialysis begins and lasts through the 12th month after the month in which an individual had a transplant or dialysis terminates. This provision will be effective July 1, 1973.

Persons eligible for Medicare, either for supplemental medical insurance or for birth hospital and supplemental medical insurance, may choose to have their covered health care provided by a Health Maintenance Organization (HMO), a prepaid group health or other capitation plan that meets prescribed standards. This becomes effective July 1, 1973.

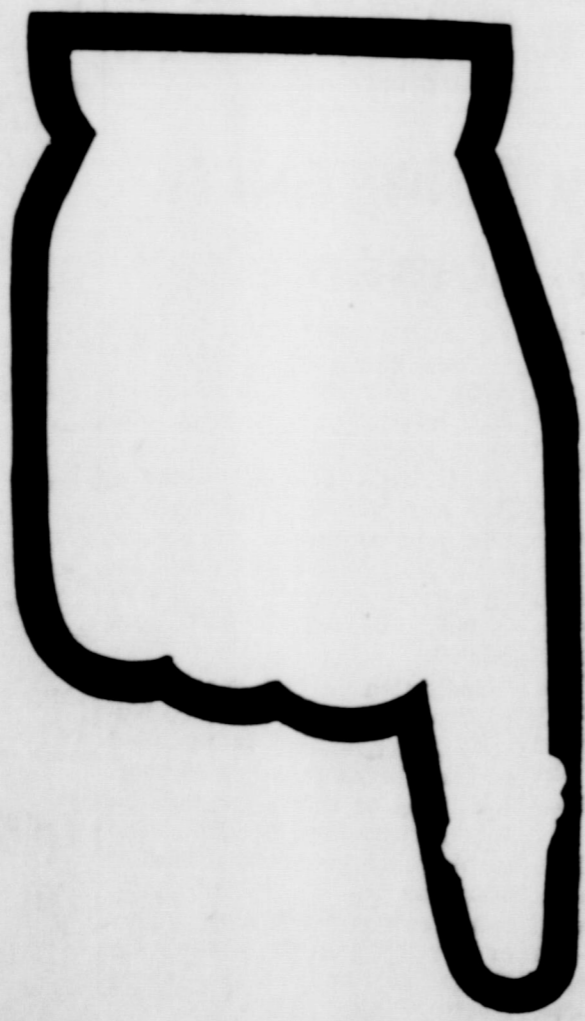

## 3 ASCS Programs Sign-Up Dates Told

Callahan County ASCS office at Baird has revealed sign-up dates for three programs for this year. Period began Monday and will continue through March 16 for cotton, wheat and feed grain.

Several changes have occurred in the programs since last year. Listed below are simple explanations of the programs. Additional information may be obtained at the ASCS office.

**Wheat**—Everyone with an allotment should sign-up this year under one of the three options available. (1) Sign-up with no set-aside. (2) Sign-up with set-aside (3) Sign-up with set-aside, take a reduction in payment and graze.

**Cotton**—If you plant cotton you should sign-up. If not you should sell, lease, or release your acreage. Out of county transfers by lease is permitted this year. There is no set-aside under this year's cotton program.

**Feed Grain**—There are three options under the feed grain program. (1) Sign-up, set-aside 30% of the base with no planted acreage limit and at the higher rate of payment. (2) Sign-up, set-aside 15% of the base with a limit on acreage to be planted and at the lower rate of payment. (3) Sign-up, set-aside either 15% or 30% of the base and take a reduced payment and graze the set-aside acreage.

**Rep. Lynn Nabers** would like to take the opportunity in this week's column to discuss some of the legislation that will be sponsored during the next legislative session. As you know, I welcome any questions concerning the times and conditions that a prisoner may be eligible for parole in capital cases. The greatest punishment available to our courts is the death penalty. The Supreme Court decision making the death penalty unconstitutional is a tragedy. Perhaps the sentence for crimes such as murder, kidnapping, robbery and rape might be abolished when the death penalty was abolished. We can pass legislation making the death penalty a life imprisonment, providing no possibility of parole. It is our only deterrent to capital crimes.

**2 Blacks Given Prison Terms In 42nd Court**

Two men were given a total of 17 years in prison last Thursday in 42nd District Court at Baird when both pleaded guilty to "robbery by assault" in the October 25 holdup of a service station at Clyde.

Both Lawrence Manning, Jr., an airman stationed at Dyess AFB at Abilene, and Charles Barr, also 23, of Shreveport, La., a former airman at Dyess pleaded guilty to the charges.

Barr entered his plea before District Judge Don Lane and received a seven-year prison term with prospective jurors excluded from the courtroom.

The seven years was the same as had been given a third Dyess airman, Larry Edward Kime, by another Baird jury Monday of last week.

A typographical error in the indictment against Manning could have delayed his hearing until another grand jury convened. However, the airman decided to plead his case before a jury in hopes of obtaining a probated sentence. The jury assessed his a 10-year prison term after deliberating about an hour and a half.

Warren Bailey of Clyde, the station attendant, told jurors that three blacks and Kime had robbed him of about \$100 on Oct. 25, and that Kime had kicked and slugged him.

The fourth man charged Willie Douglas, also of Shreveport, is also charged in the case, but no trial date has been set because he is in a Fort Worth jail on a narcotics charge, according to District Attorney Ed Paynter.

Abilene Highway Patrolman Jack Shields captured the quartet only minutes after the crime in east Abilene after Bailey had alerted lawmen of the license number of the car in which the four men were riding.

Manning and Kime will be formally sentenced by Judge Lane on February 8.
