City, Area To Honor 100-Year-Old On Friday

Friday, March 16, will be Fos Bond Day in Cross Plains.

Mayor Doyle Bruchfield has signed a proclamation issued by the city council officially denoting that day as Fos Bond Day.

S. F. (Fos) Bond will be honored at a program in the school cafeteria Friday night on his 100th birthday.

The family requests no individual gifts, please.

Tickets for the program are on sale at various Cross Plains businesses at \$1.50.

Once before the 100-year-old was honored, that was in 1953, on his 80th birthday.

He became cashier at the local bank in 1904 and remembers when the town moved lock, stock and barrel to its new location in 1911.

He was 58 and president of the Cross Plains Farmers' Na-

Mr. Bond came to Cross Plains, as he says, "Either on Friday or Saturday, Nov. 14 or 15, 1884," at the age of 11, with his father and family at the end of a 200-mile cattle drive which took 17 days on the trail.

In 1896 he and his father established the E. F. Bond and Son Mercantile Co. and Fos ran a freight wagon between Cisco and Cross Plains, hauling for his firm and other local businesses.

Burleson Introduces National Health Act

Congressman Omar Burleson, Representative of this district, and 29 co-sponsors have introduced the National Healthcare Act of 1973, legislation which Burleson said "uses the most efficient and least expensive methods" to cover the full spectrum of health care problems, including catastrophic illness.

Burleson said the bill includes a number of improvements over a similar bill introduced in 1971, adding that the essential thrust remains the same—to provide far-reaching and improved health care without creating a costly new government mechanism.

He said the bill has a first-year cost of \$8.1 billion in additional federal funds, a cost which is far below estimates for some comprehensive proposals.

Noting that catastrophic illness is a matter of special national concern, Burleson pointed out that the Healthcare Act of 1973 provides that anyone who incurs \$5,000 worth of medical expense in a given year can qualify for up to \$250,000 of benefits—even if he has been reimbursed by insurance for some or all of that \$5,000.

Another strong feature of the bill, Burleson said, is the fact that it phases in benefits on a time-table basis, thus assuring that the program enlarges benefits as manpower and facilities become available.

Under a state pool plan, a faster phase-in for the poor, near poor and previously uninsured, goes into initial operation by July 1, 1974. By 1980, the minimum standard benefits

Capitol Report

By Rep. Lynn Nabers

This past week the Texas House of Representatives completed their ninth week of work. The activity this week centered on committee hearings and considerable floor action and debate on proposed legislation.

Some of the legislation considered this week that might be of interest was the passage of H.B. 307 which provides for interest on judgments at the rate of 10% per annum. Current law providing that after a person has secured a final judgment in a court of law the interest rate on a money judgment will be figured at the rate of 10% per annum rather than 6% per annum.

Another interesting piece of legislation introduced recently was H.B. 748 by Rep. G. J. Sutton of San Antonio and Rep. Senfronia Thompson of Houston. This bill requires that no person or agency shall remove any tree in the state without replacing it with one or more trees which singly or together are of equal size to the original tree. The violation of this law will constitute a misdemeanor and will be penalized with a fine of no more than \$500. Although trees are removed for purposes of landscaping or land development are exempt from the provisions of this act, there are no exemptions for conservation programs. It would seem that problems will arise with the lumber industry and with soil conservation programs which spend large sums of money to eradicate mesquite trees. Perhaps this bill was introduced with the idea of promoting ecology in Texas, but a good thing can be carried too far. H.B. 748 has been referred to the House Committee on Natural Resources.

Last week I introduced a bill which relates to the use of aircraft for predator animal control in circumstances which are necessary to protect human and natural resources. This act will allow the Texas Animal Health Commission to issue permits for the taking of predator animals. The definition of predator animal does not include birds or fowl, but it does pertain to animals such as coyotes, wolves, bobcats, panthers, and the like. This bill has been referred to the House Committee on Environmental Affairs.

At the end of this week the Criminal Jurisprudence Subcommittee of the Penal Code, of which I am chairman, will have completed the hearing of eighteen hours of public testimony on the proposed revision of the Penal Code. Upon completion of the public hearings, a report will be made to the whole Committee on Criminal Jurisprudence before returning the bill for a vote in the House of Representatives.



national Bank when it failed during the depression. He then opened a grocery store and operated it until he retired in 1971. His wife, the former Miss Mabel Jones, of almost 64 years, died on Oct. 16, 1964. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wiley Jones of Cross Plains. Fos and Mabel were married on Dec. 19, 1900, in Cross Plains. Throughout the years he maintained his reputation as a weather prophet and farmers always came by to ask him if it were going to rain. When Bond was 93, citizens of this area pulled a surprise on him. Someone overheard him remark that he'd never flown in an airplane, so residents of the town got together, took up a collection and surprised him with a plane ticket to Dallas so he could visit his daughter, Paula. He has lived with his daughter since 1971, and they make frequent trips to Abilene to visit his sister, Mrs. W. E. Butler, who is 96. They live in the home built by his father, at

corner of Ninth Street and Ave. C. Mr. Bond's vision is diminishing and he is hard of hearing, but his daughter says his mind is still keen and his memory remains excellent. "He really enjoys visiting his sister and talking about things that happened years ago," she said.
