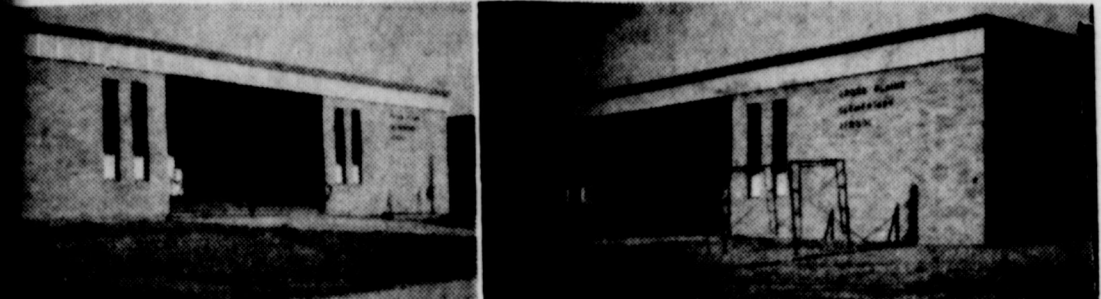

Program Will Open New Grammar School Sunday

More than 14 months of dreams, planning, evaluation and construction will be realized here Sunday when the new Cross Plains Elementary School will be formally opened.

The entire program, ceremony and tour is expected to last about two hours. Students will move into the

building Monday. All furniture is in the building, and most rooms had been arranged by Tuesday morning. Supt. Ford said that work-

men had assured him that remaining details would be finished by the week end.

The old local elementary school burned on Jan. 19, 1972, and planning for the new structure began just three days later. Patrons of the school district voted \$180,000 bond to finance the new structure by a 10 to 1 margin on February 16. Also approved was a 30 cent per \$100 valuation maintenance tax to retire the bonds. A \$213,325 contract was awarded Armstrong Construction Co. of Breckenridge on June 5, and actual construction was begun on June 10.

In the spacious new structure rooms are provided for kindergarten, grades one through eight, homemaking laboratory and science classroom and laboratory. A "media center" for use by Title I program projects is included, as is a conference room, offices for superintendent, principal, nurse and faculty room.

Storage rooms include one for books, science chemicals and supplies, equipment storage, custodial room and mechanical room housing heating and cooling controls and systems.

Girls and boys restrooms are provided for kindergarten students in its room, and segregated restrooms are provided for grades 1 to 5 and 6 to 8.

Ex-Local Man Establishes Rattlesnake Sacking Record

A former Cross Plains man is new world record holder for sacking rattlesnakes.

He is R. B. Dillard of Sweetwater, native and long time former resident of Cross Plains, who now works for the railroad at Roscoe.

He established a new world record for sacking 10 rattlesnakes at the rattle snakes hunt and exhibition at Brownwood last weekend. His time Sunday was 39 seconds flat, and that was with a five-second penalty for "free-hand sacking" one reptile instead of using a hook. Former record was just over 39 seconds.

Saturday he was second in the beginning class with a time of 46 seconds plus a five-second penalty.

His efforts won him a huge trophy. He also became a professional snake handler and is a new member of the Venomaires, a Fort Worth professional snake handling club.

Dillard praised his partner. He was Jackie Bibby of Rising Star, who held the sack. The new champ said the holder is a most important part of the team, and it is his responsibility to keep the snakes off the handler. Dillard and Bibby won over 23 other teams in the event.

Rain Here Friday Totals .68 Of Inch

Stormy skies Friday night yielded .68 of an inch of rain in Cross Plains Friday night, in Cross Plains according to the official gauge maintained by F. C. Newton.

The rainfall was accompanied by brief high winds, but no damage was reported. Vivid lightning also accompanied the cloud. This area escaped hail and tornadic winds which struck several cities and towns in this section of the state.

Friday's shower brought to 1.54 inches rainfall received here in March. Year's total to noon Tuesday was 6.76 inches, still above normal for this time of year.

7 DWI Cases Net \$1,200 In Levies

Seven persons recently entered guilty pleas of driving while intoxicated before Callahan County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr., at Baird.

Four of these charged were given probated jail sentences, but three were assessed a total of 19 days in jail.

Addresses were not available on any of the persons charged. All paid court costs of \$52 each.

Largest fine, \$250, was handed to Kenneth Aaron Notgrass who was also given three days in jail.

Lester Wilcox and David Louis Reese were each fined \$200. Wilcox was also sentenced to 10 days in jail, and Reese received a 90-day term which was probated for 18 months.

Callahan's '72 Federal Tax Near \$5.5 Million

With the day of reckoning, April 16th, rapidly approaching, taxes are once again in the spotlight in Callahan County.

The big question among local residents who are busy doing their arithmetic is how much of a bite the government will be taking this time.

Will it be bigger than it was last April when personal income taxes from the local area, including employment taxes paid via withholding, added up to approximately \$4,988,000. All indications are that it will, because incomes were larger in 1972, on an average, than they were the previous year.

The size of the tax load borne by Callahan County residents is estimated from figures released by the Internal Revenue Service covering the State of Texas as a whole.

They show that individual income and employment taxes collected throughout the state last year came to \$7,126,000,000, with local residents producing some 0.07 percent of the total.

And this year, if the administration's expectations are realized, the receipts will be even greater.

Based on the budget it submitted to Congress recently, it counts on such taxes totaling \$11.9 billion more, nationally, than last April.

Because of the economic gains made in the local area in the past year, notwithstanding the fact that there was more unemployment than usual, local residents will be bearing their full share of this increase.

Their payments to Washington this year will total approximately \$5,412,000, it is estimated.

During the next fiscal year, which begins on July 1, 1973, the President plans to put the brakes on Federal spending in order to get the country into a sounder financial condition.

His expectation for the coming fiscal year, as projected in the budget, is for personal income and employment taxes reaching \$163.9 billion, which is \$11.3 billion more than is coming in this year.

For Callahan County taxpayers to meet their proportionate part of this increase, it is estimated that local incomes will have to advance by about 7.4 percent during 1973.

HOME AND FAMILY HINTS

Stainless steel has proved itself the most practical and economical flatware for constant everyday use. But proper care is still important.

The more time your stainless steel spends both clean and dry, the better looking it will remain. The key is to either rinse or wash it immediately after use; the Rinse and Hold cycle on your KitchenAid or Magic Chef dishwasher will be your stainless steel's best friend if you do not fill your dishwasher with every meal.

Stainless steel gets its name from its ability to resist staining and corrosion. Oxides of chromium and chromium nickel form an extremely tin protective film on the steel surface to fight corrosion.

Certain foods such as salt, vinegar, fruits, tomatoes, and milk can break this film, leaving pitted places. Dry dishwashing detergent poured directly on the surface also causes corrosion, so run your dishwasher immediately after adding the detergent.

When stainless steel is exposed to the oxygen in the air the breaks in the film heal themselves. This can, however, only be accomplished if food soil is rinsed or washed off immediately after use. Otherwise, corrosion will take place every time the steel is wetted.

Corrosion can also be caused by polishing with an abrasive cleaner, grinding, or sharpening, or by the mineral salts in hard water. Use of rinse agents such as Jet Dry in the dishwasher will help to prevent iron in the water from drying as pots of rust on your stainless.

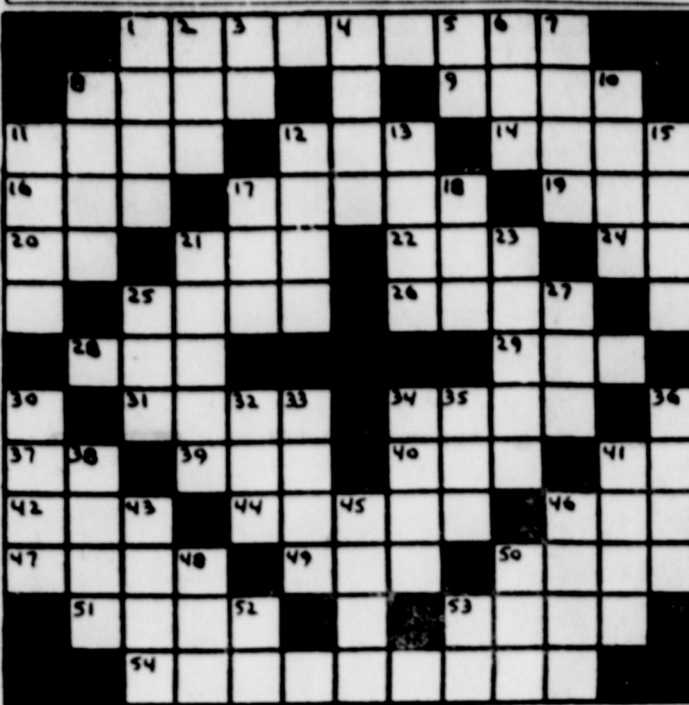
It was learned here Monday that their son is suffering of pneumonia and has been in intensive care unit for more than a week.
