Hail Storm Beats City Monday

Initial Estimates Of Damage Thought To Be Near \$150,000

A savage hail, wind and rain storm battered Cross Plains and some surrounding areas about 4 p.m. Monday.

An early estimate by one local insurance agent placed damage at least \$150,000. It was pointed out that the damage total could run much higher.

It is thought here that at least 90 per cent of the homes and businesses in Cross Plains sustained at least some roof damage. Broken glass windows were also numerous on west sides of

local businesses and residences.

Possibly the hardest hit was the Cross Plains High School Building Superintendent Wayne Ford estimated that 100 windows were broken in that building and old homemaking cottage, cafeteria, band hall and auditorium. Little damage was sustained by the new Elementary School. Only a bit of wind damage to panels in ceiling of front was reported. Teachers and custodians replaced glasses in windows in first floor of the

high school Monday night.

The local Higonbotham store also was hard hit. At least 61 small windows were broken on the upper portion of the building. Although sealed from inside, water still leaked in show windows.

Presbyterian Church had beautiful stained-glass windows riddled by the hail. The glass, most of which was originally installed when the church was built during the 1920's, will probably be replaced, according to one church spokesman, but cost will be high.

The Church of Christ also lost several smaller windows to the west side of the building to the hail.

Johnston Truck & Supply had severe damage from the hail. A company spokesman estimated loss at between \$25,000 and \$30,000. Three large plate glass windows were broken in the office building and every vehicle in stock had at least some damage from the hail. The company had 20 new units which sustained extensive damage.

Some older residents of Cross Plains said that Monday's hail was the worst here in at least 50 years, and possibly the worst on record. Hail stones of varying sizes, measuring up to golf ball size chunks of ice, were piled three to four inches deep against west and south sides of buildings.

Little wind damage was reported although it blew exceptionally hard for several minutes.

Many residences in the city had broken windows and water damage from the rain blowing through the openings.

Hail was reported about three miles east of town and extended to the north into the Sabanno community.

Heavy hail was reported at the W. B. Sooter farm about two miles south of the community. Heavy damage extended eastward for some distance, although only a little ice fell in the Pioneer region. Burkett, Cross Cut, Atwell, Rowden and Cottonwood communities apparently escaped hail damage.

The accompanying deluge of rain measured 1.32 inches in Cross Plains, according to F. C. Newton, official weather observer here.

Up to four inches was reported in the Cottonwood sector, and Cross Cut, Sabanno and Pioneer recorded two inches. Atwell got an inch, and at Rowden just .50 of an inch fell.

Rainfall in Cross Plains totaled 3.52 inches for April at mid-morning Tuesday, according to Newton's records. Total for the year now stands at 10.43 inches, far above normal.

Gardens and other unprotected vegetation were beaten into the ground. Trees were stripped of leaves and it is believed that all fruit is now gone, even that which survived the recent frost and freeze. A few birds were killed by the hail.

Turkey Creek was reported near bank full late Monday night, and the Pecan Bayou was also reported on the rise at Burkett and south of Cross Cut.

Local Post Office Sets Open House On Monday

Postmaster, Joe E. Hanke, Jr., has announced plans for "Postal Week" to be celebrated in Cross Plains April 29, through May 5.

On Monday, April 30, the Cross Plains Post Office will observe a normal work day with the exception of inviting all customers to stop in the lobby for coffee and to take time to get acquainted with local employees. Personnel in the Cross Plains office, other than the postmaster, include Exal D. McMillan, L. D. Koenig, Morris Thomas, Willie Parr, J. P. McCord, Wayne Dennis and Bailey Wilson. These people perform very important roles as they help to move the mails. Simple as it is for you to drop a letter in the outgoing mail slot in the post office, it requires the personal handling of a number of people before it reaches its final destination.

Postmaster General E. T. Klassen said the Postal Week observances are "an appropriate occasion for recognition of the vital responsibilities assigned to the mail service and a valid time to take stock of the challenges which must be jointly met by postal people and by the millions of citizens throughout America who depend upon the mail as an essential part of their personal and business lives."

As part of the observance, the Cross Plains Post Office will join with the nation's 31,000 other post offices in issuing 10 special stamps honoring postal employees.

The Cross Plains Post Office will mark the occasion with special First-Day-of-Issue observances, simultaneous with similar ceremonies to be held in Washington by Postmaster General E. T. Klassen. Ten new Postal People stamps will be placed on sale

in conjunction with the local observance. The attractive new stamps, the first such comprehensive set specifically honoring postal people, will be on sale at the Main Post Office.

Other activities planned for Postal Week include group tours of the working operations of the local office. If you wish to make an appointment for such a group tour please contact your postmaster before Monday, April 30.

As the Postmaster General said in his message, "We need the informed understanding, cooperation and support of every citizen. I think that we have this to an exceptional degree in Cross Plains, and part of the purpose of Postal Week will be to show our appreciation." Postmaster Hanke said.

Attractive free souvenir envelopes will be available in a limited quantity on a "first come" basis at the local post office on April 30.

protect themselves by entering into home improvement jobs with an understanding of what is involved. The following questions, while not all inclusive, are suggestive of what should be:
 1. Is the company with which you are doing business an established firm, or is it composed of itinerants who "just happen to be in the area?"
 2. Do you know, or have you investigated to determine before signing a contract, that the company under consideration enjoys a good reputation for performing satisfactorily?
 3. Have you checked with a few homeowners in the general area who have dealt with the firm a year or two ago — to determine their satisfaction? Any reputable contractor will give you the names of satisfied customers in your area, if he has some.
 4. Was any "high pressure" used to induce you to sign a contract immediately, without giving you an opportunity to investigate?
 5. Was any "bait" practice used to induce you to respond to an offer, that is, did the firm quote a low price in an advertisement and then "knock" the product advertised and try to switch you to something higher-priced?
 6. Does the contract contain the name and address of the company?
 7. If any guarantee is given, is it included in the contract, clear and specific as to what adjustment will be made in the event of dissatisfaction?"



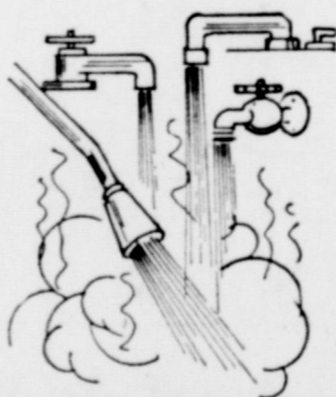

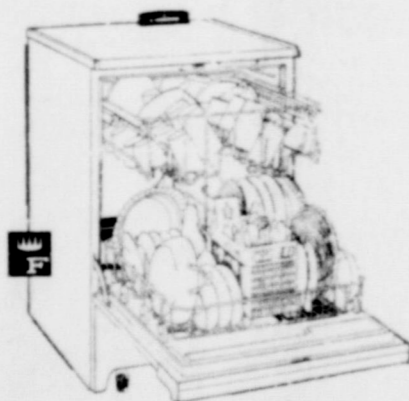

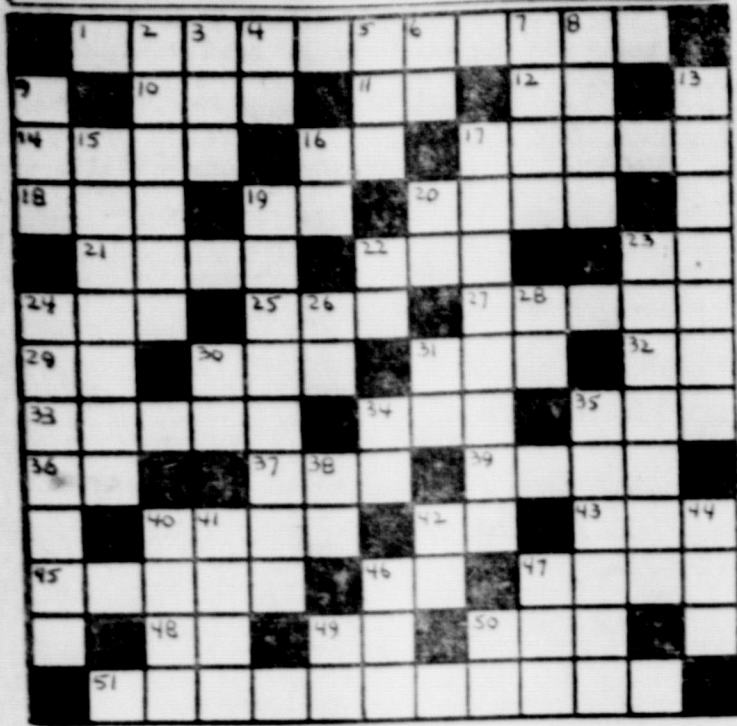

CAPITOL REPORT

By Lynn Nabers

I have received much mail concerning H.B. 787, the "Kindergarten Bill" by Rep. Wilson Foreman of Austin. Under present law a free public kindergarten program would begin in September for all 5-year-old children whose birthdays are prior to February 1. Those whose birthdays are after that date will not be included although they will begin the first grade at the same time as the older group. Originally H.B. 787 would have provided a full year of kindergarten for all 5-year-olds beginning next September 1st. However, because of excessive costs and lack of space, the subcommittee amended the bill to provide two one-half day sessions for all 5-year-olds. This action had to be reconsidered due to the burden on teachers and problems with transportation. Thus after consultation with the TSTA and the TEA, the bill was replaced with a substitute which contains several options under complete control of the local school boards: (1) The school districts now operating a full day program supplemented by local funds may continue to do so; (2) school districts that wish to operate two half-day sessions for the school year may do so; (3) school districts that wish to operate a full day program with two separate four and one-half month semesters allowing each of the 5-year-old groups to attend one semester may do so. If passed into law, H. B. 787 would provide some type of kindergarten for all 5-year-old children, would cost no additional state monies, and would not require any school districts to construct additional facilities.

H. B. 1374 by Rep. Nichols has been passed out of the Committee on Labor and will be considered on the House Floor
