Annual Junior Rodeo  
\$2,000 in prizes, to

be held nights of June 27, 28, 29 and 30 in Callahan County Sheriff's Posse Arena in that city, will again be sponsored by Baird FFA Chapter and Callahan County Sheriff's Posse.

Produced by Bobby Estes of the Baird-Clyde locality this year's rodeo promises plenty of fast action with the performances starting nightly at 8 o'clock and the bull riding event starting promptly at 10 p.m.

Age groups are: 16 to 19 and 13 to 15 with \$10 entry fee and jackpot. Age 12 and under entry fee is \$5.

Boy's events are bareback bronc riding with the first 60 paid; bull riding the first 60 paid; tie-down roping, breakaway roping, ribbon roping, flag race, barrel race, and steer riding.

Girl's events are barrel race, flag race, breakaway roping, pole bending and goat tying.

Boat race for cowboys and cowgirls age 8 under has no entry fee with awards presented each night.

Saddles will be presented to all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl. Buckles will go to all first place winners. Spurs and saddle blankets will be given to second and third place winners in age 12 and under events.

## Quarter Million Dollar Grain Harvest Near End

Approximately 4½ million bushels of wheat have been marketed in Cross Plains since the small grain harvest began about two weeks ago.

Two local buyers have pur-

chased an estimated 71,000 bushels of wheat in the past several days.

Price of the number one wheat has ranged from about \$2.30 to a peak of \$2.75, the

latter for only a brief period at harvest beginning, and Tuesday morning the top quality grain was selling for \$2.45 per bushel in Cross Plains.

Based on an average of \$2.40 per bushel, higher than in past years, that would mean that almost \$200,000 have been pumped into the Cross Plains area economy by the harvest. At harvest completion the economy could be boosted as much as \$250,000 to \$300,000.

Both local grain buyers, Glenn Winfrey at Cross Plains Grain & Peanut Co. and James Lawrence at Lawrence Farm & Ranch Supply, estimated Tuesday that the harvest is 75 to 80 per cent complete. Light, spotted rain showers Monday night slowed cutting Tuesday morning, but it was expected that barring more moisture during the day, that combines would resume full-speed harvesting in the afternoon.

Shortage of combines has slowed this year's harvest, however, one local producer said that that problem seems to be working itself out.

One Cross Plains buyer said that the 1973 crop is the best in at least three years. Four years ago somewhat more wheat was marketed in Cross Plains than has been brought here thus far this year. Yields are still averaging well above normal in the 20 to 30 bushels per acre range. Some of the higher yields have ranged up to 35 to 40 bushels per acre on wheat. That is considered extremely good for this area.

Oats are scarce this year, and only a few thousand pounds have moved to market here. Price ranges from about 75 cents to \$1 per bushel.

J. M. Greenwood reported last week that he harvested an eight-acre patch of oats which averaged 50 bushels to the acre. These were planted in an orchard, and complete harvest was not possible. "That is the best crop of oats I have ever raised," said the experienced grain farmer. He plans to store the exceptionally heavy crop.

The ex-local man, who is a veteran, is a graduate of Sul Ross University at Alpine.

Dallas, who was an assistant under Shirley Frazier at Eastland for three years and under Clyde Evatt last year, replaces the latter as head coach. Evatt resigned to go into business.

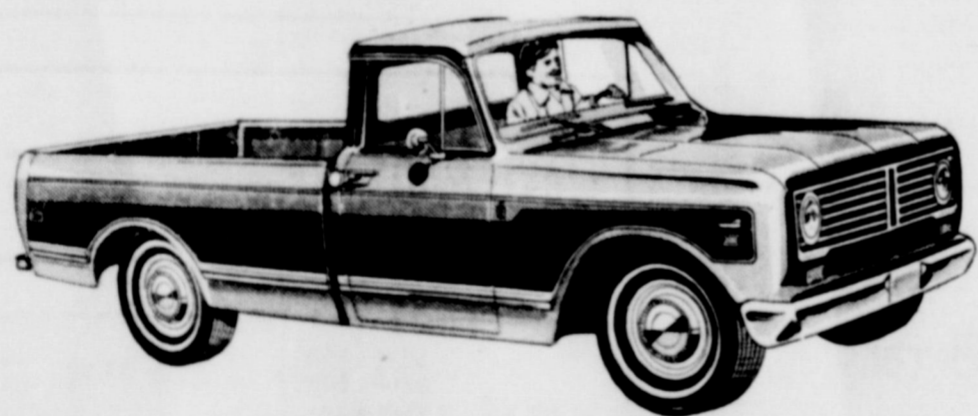

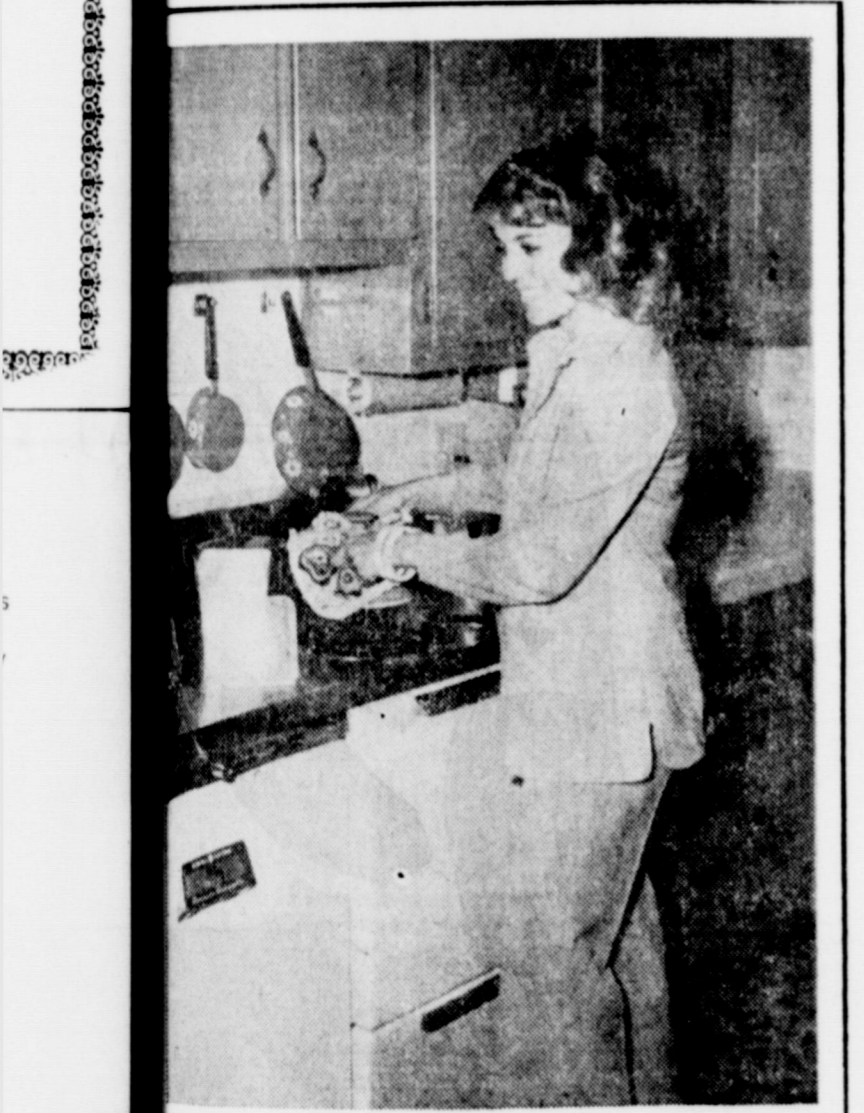

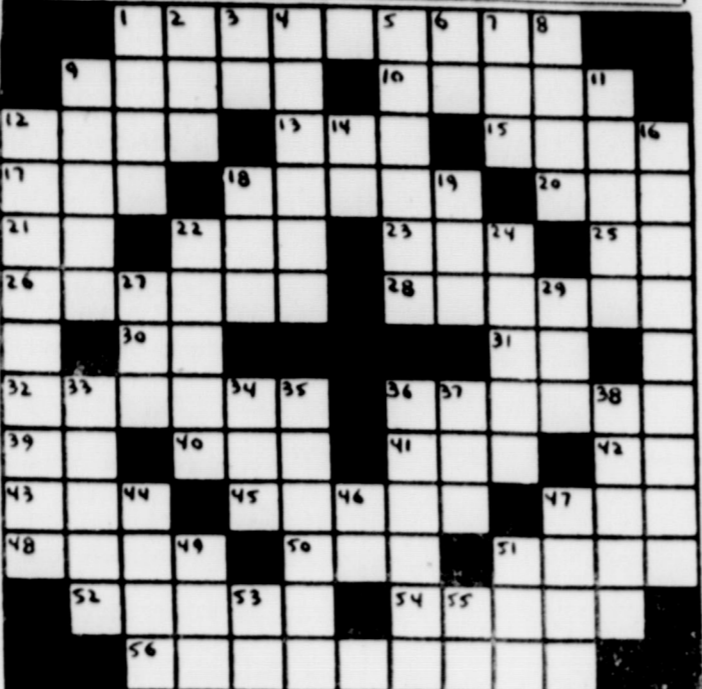

## City Gauges Only .05 Rain Monday

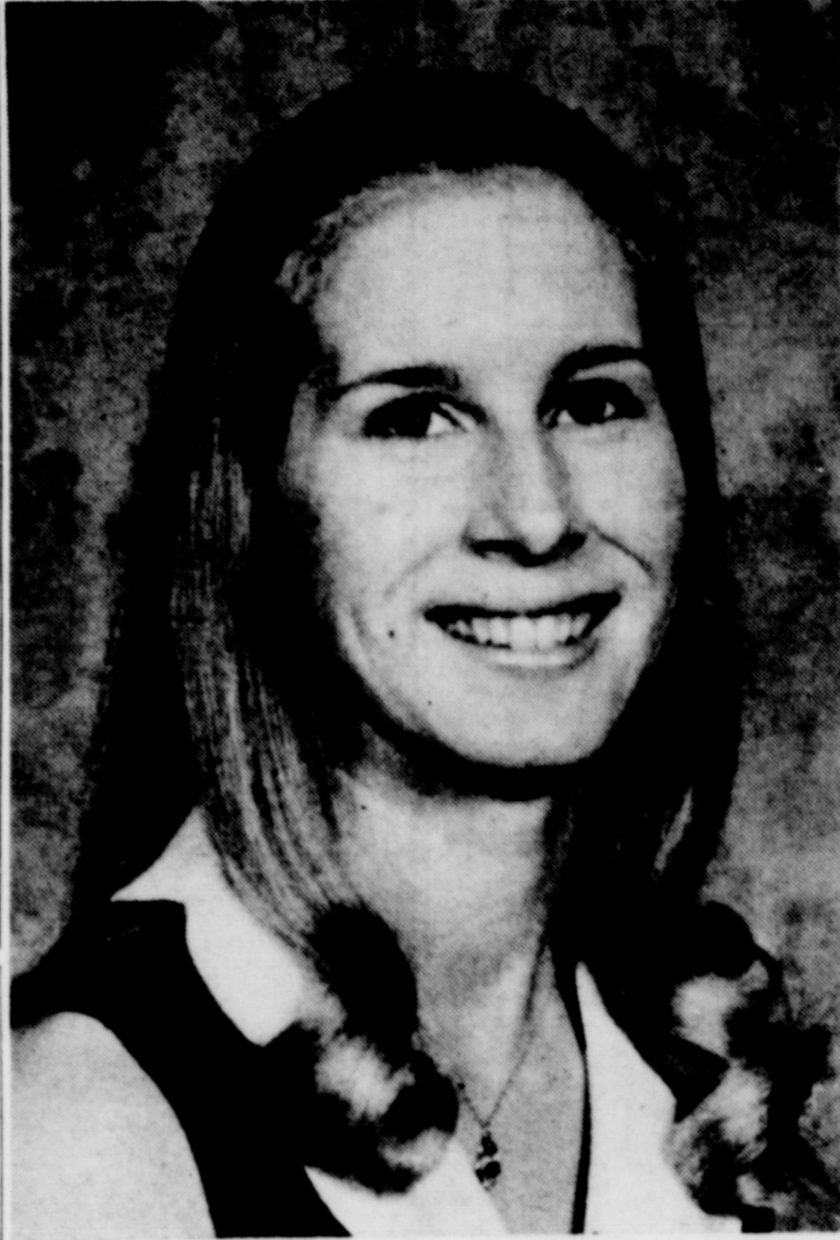

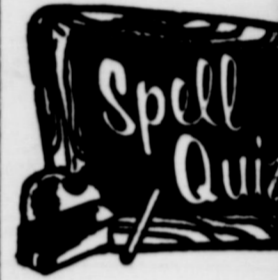
