Support Levels By Type Told For '73 Peanuts

Support levels by types for 1973-crop peanuts of average quality were announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The support program is required by law and the prices are based on the \$310.50 per ton. (Southwest Spanish \$301.45 minimum national average support level for peanuts (25.50 higher than for 1972-crop peanuts) announced April 5, 1973, according to A. C. Earp, Jr., executive director of Callahan County ASCS office at Baird.

The Agricultural Act of 1949 provides for peanut support at

a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity depending on the percentage which the total supply of peanuts is in relation to the normal supply at the beginning of the marketing year.

If a combination of the parity price and the supply percentage on Aug. 1, 1973, results in a legally-required minimum national average support level higher than \$310.50 the support level per average quality ton of each type of peanut and the values per percent sound mature and sound split kernels will be increased accordingly.

A deduction of \$15 for handling, storage and inspection will be assessed producers for each ton of farmer stock on which warehouse stored loan are made.

Farmers stock peanuts found by the Federal-State Inspection Service to have visible *A. flavus* mold will be discounted \$50 per ton; an offsetting amount of \$1.50 per ton will be added to the support value of all producers' peanuts. This, along with the other differentials, will maintain a national support level of \$310.50 per ton.

Otis Purvis Named City Judge Monday

Otis Purvis of this city was sworn in as Cross Plains City Judge Monday afternoon by Mayor Doyle Burchfield.

Purvis, a local businessman who moved here from the Atwell community about 30 years ago, assumed the duties immediately after being sworn in. He will handle only cases filed by City Marshal C. S. (Hoot) McGowen, falling within the jurisdiction of the city.

The city judge's post in Cross Plains is an appointive one.

Gasoline Shortage Causes Closings

Due to a shortage of gasoline, George Hutchins, Mobil consignee for the Cross Plains area, will close his bulk plant here on Saturdays until the energy crisis is over. He announced that he will now operate only five days per week.

J. W. Fore, owner and operator of the Mobile service station here also has announced that he will be closed each Sunday. He will supply needs of customers six days weekly.

None of the other local major company stations have indicated that they plan to shut down operations. They presently plan to be open the regular seven days a week. They include Grid-ton Gulf stations and wholesale distributing facilities, Koenig Exxon and Robertson Exxon stations, Dillard Texaco station, Wylie Shamrock station, F. C. Newton Premier has operated a six-day schedule for many years. Purvis Phillips 66 station had no plans to close, but gas supply was in doubt Tuesday.

Two independent gasoline outlets here, Lakeway Store and Bi-Rite Superette plan to continue regular operations as long as gas is available. Neither has plans to curtail gasoline sales, nor have they had trouble securing gasoline thus far.

Petroleum companies throughout the nation have been forced by the federal government to allocate quantities to jobbers and in turn wholesalers have had to ration gasoline and diesel to dealers.

Old Settlers Will Not Reune In 1973

There will be no Callahan County Old Settlers Reunion this year.

That decision was made in a meeting of interested persons at the courthouse in Baird last Friday afternoon.

Reason given for the decision not to hold a reunion of Callahan County Pioneers this year was a lack of interest.

Mrs. B. L. Boydston of Baird, secretary of the Callahan Coun-

ty Pioneers Association, had published a request for all persons interested in holding a reunion for old settlers this year to attend the meeting at Baird last Friday for the purpose of making proper plans for the annual gathering.

Only seven ladies showed up at the designated time and place. This group voted to not hold the reunion this year.

The gathering has been held

in Cross Plains at Treadway Park (City Park) for the past several years, and brought many former and present Callahan citizens to this city for a day. Three hundred and fifty old settlers registered last year, and at least that many more persons did not register.

The reunion has been plagued with inclement weather the past two years. In 1971 the gathering was postponed and then cancelled because of excessive rains which made the park grounds soggy. Last year the morning schedule was completed before rains again chased old settlers away.

In recent years interest in the event has been declining. Work of arranging and planning the reunion has been shovled on the shoulders of only a few. This year the seven ladies who showed up for the meeting to plan the event could not handle all the details required of holding a gathering of county pioneers.

It is hoped by the pioneers association officials that the event is not dead, but it will require much more interest in forthcoming years to revive the day for Callahan County early settlers.

Sales Tax Nets City \$6,825.55, 6 Months

The City of Cross Plains has received a total of \$6,825.55 from the one per cent city sales tax during the first six months of payments to the municipality.

City officials revealed Tuesday that the amount re-paid to Cross Plains from the state for the first quarter of 1973, January through March, totaled \$3,258.57. That check was received this week.

Initial return on the sales tax for the fourth quarter of 1972, which was received earlier this year, totaled \$3,566.98.

It was noted that the city may dispose of that money in any way the administration deems necessary. It was pointed out that the funds go into the city's general fund.

Drive Launched To Pay For New Band Uniforms

The new uniforms will be black and gold in color, similar to the ones now in use, with gold stripes down the side of pant legs, gold braid and trim.

A spokesman for the booster club explained that donations of any size will be genuinely appreciated. Contributions may be taken or sent to the Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains, and checks should be made payable to the "Uniform Fund."

The Band Booster Club has initiated many activities to collect the money on hand for the uniform fund. The club is now asking the public to again help in purchasing the new attire for the band of Cross Plains schools.

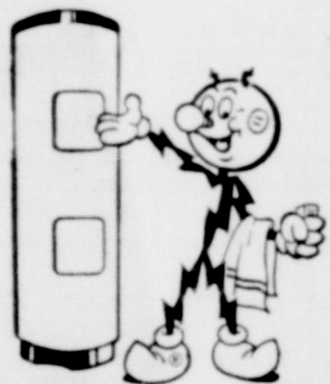

This year, traveling on an average scale. That is about \$8 more than in 1971, when a survey was made.

A two-week trip will cost the local couple a minimum of \$728. This assumes that travel at the rate of 300 miles a day and get 13 miles to a gallon.

The \$52 daily budget includes meals and snacks, \$19 for hotel and motel accommodations, \$10 for gas and oil and tips and miscellaneous expenses.

AA report also answers for Callahan County cars the all-important question of how much it is costing per year to own and operate their cars.

The current average is now \$1,700 a year for a standard car in the medium price range equipped with automatic transmission, power steering, power brakes, driven 10,000 miles annually.

The total includes fixed costs, depreciation, insurance, fees and such—add up \$172, or \$3.21 per day, regardless of the amount the car is driven.

Other costs are for gas, tires and maintenance. For 10,000 mile operation they amount to \$475, or 4.75 cents a mile.

On this basis, Callahan County residents are spending some \$10,000 a year on the 4,420 cars in use locally.

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Medicare Is Extended To Cover Disabled

July 1, 1973, will mark the seventh anniversary of the beginning of the Medicare program. It will also mark the first extension of Medicare coverage and benefits to Americans under age 65 who are receiving disability insurance benefits under the Social Security or railroad retirement program, according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., social security district manager in Abilene.

Disabled beneficiaries will be automatically entitled to the Hospital Insurance part of Medicare. Enrollment for supplementary Medical Insurance part will also be automatic unless the beneficiary files a written refusal request. The \$6.50 monthly premium for Part B will be deducted from the monthly benefit check, he added.

Another special provision in the Social Security Amendments of 1972 will provide Medicare coverage beginning July 1, 1973, for most individuals needing kidney transplantation or hemodialysis. This cannot begin earlier than the third month after the month a course of renal hemodialysis begins. Those eligible include a worker of any age who is fully or currently insured under social security, or a spouse or dependent child of such a worker.

Also, widows aged 52-64, in receipt of social security benefits, can get Medicare coverage if their impairments meet the disability requirements and have existed at least 25 months. Mr. Tuley urged such disabled mothers to get in touch with the social security office for more information.

The social security office for this area is located in the Post Office Building in Abilene and the number is 677-5262.

County Milo Fields Are Heavily Infested

Several milo fields in Callahan County have been found to be infested with heavy populations of corn leaf aphid and green bugs, according to Gus Gerngross, county agent of Baird. The aphids can cause considerable damage to grain sorghum especially in the younger stage. Counts of insect populations range from 200-1000 per one foot of row in field inspected in the Baird, Clyde and Denton Valley area.

Control of these aphids is generally not too difficult if the right insecticide is used, Gerngross explained.

Extension entomologists recommend the following material for the control of the corn leaf aphid: Carbophenothion, Demeton, Diazinon, Dimethoate, Disulfoton, Maltathion, Phodate.

For further information on restriction of these chemicals, Gerngross suggests you obtain a copy of Extension Bulletin, MP-339, Suggestions for Controlling Insect and Mites on Corn, Sorghum and small Grain from your County Extension Office.

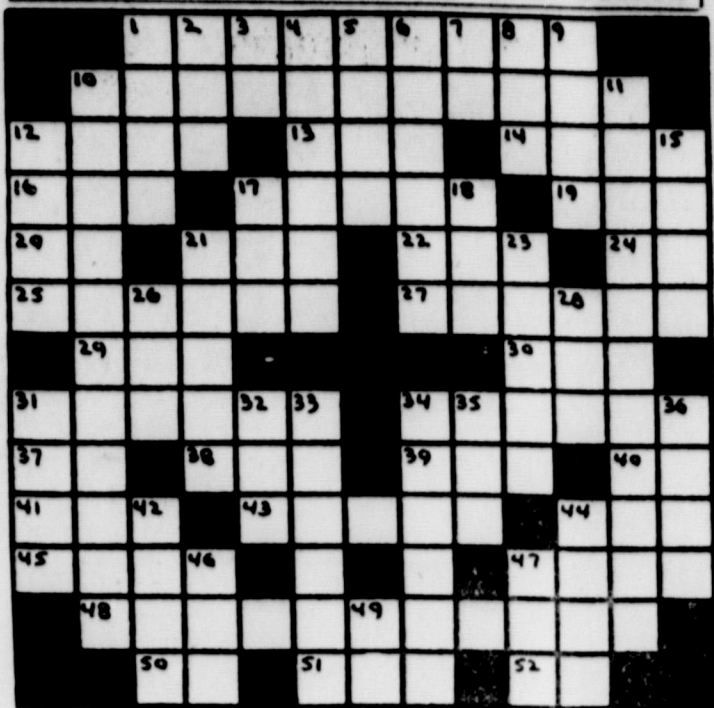

Contaminated Peanuts To Be Charged \$50 Ton

Growers offering peanuts for loan with visible *Aspergillus Flavus* mold will be subject to a \$50 per ton discount under the 1973 Peanut Support Program, so they will want both to minimize the risk and to provide for separate handling of peanuts with the mold, according to Tommie Harris of Cross Plains, county farm program official.

Significance of *Aspergillus Flavus* mold is that it produces Aflatoxin, a cancer-producing substance. Aflatoxin peanuts or meal produced from crushing such peanuts cannot be sold in the United States for consumption by humans, livestock or poultry. A quality control program has operated in the peanut industry for years to insure that peanuts with Aflatoxin are not used for food or feed.

However, until this year the federal price support program for peanuts did not provide a discount for peanuts contaminated by the Aflatoxin-producing mold. Now, peanuts offered for loan and found by the Federal-State Inspection Service to have visible *Aspergillus Flavus* mold are subject to a \$50 per ton discount.

The *Aspergillus Flavus* mold commonly occurs in the soils of the South. Peanuts, while still attached to the living plant, resist entrance of the mold. After the plant is dug, this resistance is lowered. If the peanut does not dry rapidly but remains at high moisture for prolonged period, then the mold spreads and increases and can produce Aflatoxin in the peanut kernel. This can happen, for example, if a spell of rainy or damp weather comes along while peanuts are still in the windrow.

The mold most often attacks the plant after it has been dug and while still on the vine in the windrow. However, during the past season, peanuts in some areas of the Southeast were found to be contaminated with Aflatoxin when dug. This unusual circumstance was associated with rather severe drought which slowed plant growth and apparently lowered resistance of the peanut shell while still in the ground. This instance of Aflatoxin during 1972 was abnormally high with 9 percent of the peanuts infected, however, the average occurrence of the mold in previous years was 2 to 3 percent.

Generally speaking, peanuts that contain moisture in the range of 9 to 25 percent and are held at temperatures above 60 degrees Fahrenheit are subject to mold attack of *Aspergillus* and to contamination by Aflatoxin.

To help avoid such problems and for latest recommendations on harvesting, handling and storage practices to prevent or minimize Aflatoxin losses, growers should get in touch with the Office of Extension Service Agent, Gregory Gerngross, Courthouse, Baird, Texas, the local ASCS official said.

Webworm Threatens Local Pecan Trees

The webworm has returned for its annual picnic in home owners' pecan trees, confronting owners with the threat of its unsightly silk webbing and foliage destruction.

"If pecan tree owners want to have a productive yield, now is the time to act," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White advises.

The web worm can stay indefinitely if not burned off or the branch cut off. While the webworm is not feeding on the leaves of the tree, the webbing it spins acts as its home. "It can completely defoliate a tree if not kept under control," Commissioner White stated.

Some successful insecticides can be used to combat this pest. They are lindane, toxaphene, chlordane, and sevin. Directions for use of these insecticides are printed on the product label.

"It is vital that home owners use the insecticides in the quantity specified because misuse could be dangerous to other wildlife," Commissioner White warned.

"The Federal Environmental Pesticides Act of 1972 set out firm rules on how they are to be applied in pest control. It's a matter of federal law this year," Commissioner White added.

During its life cycle, the webworm goes through four definite stages of development with each cycle lasting approximately 45 days.

The adult fall webworm deposits its egg on the underside of the leaf in clusters of 500-900 which hatch in seven days. The larval stage is the destructive stage of the webworm's existence. The larva feeds for three to four weeks on the leaves, which supply nutrients to the pecan.

Other deciduous trees also fall under the webworm's attack, such as the cottonwood, mulberry, sweet gum, and the Arizona ash.

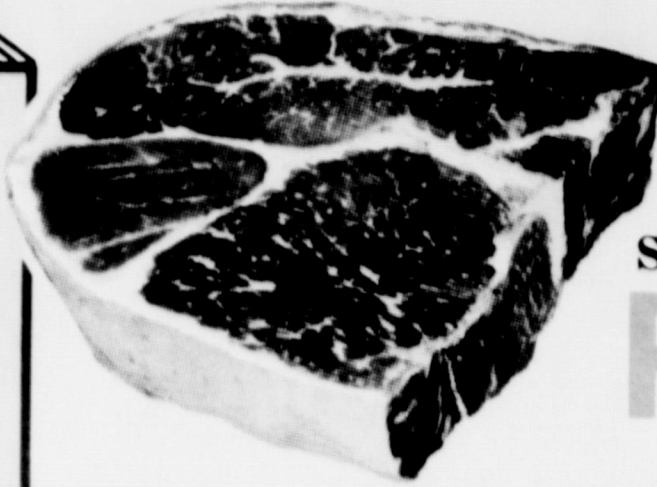

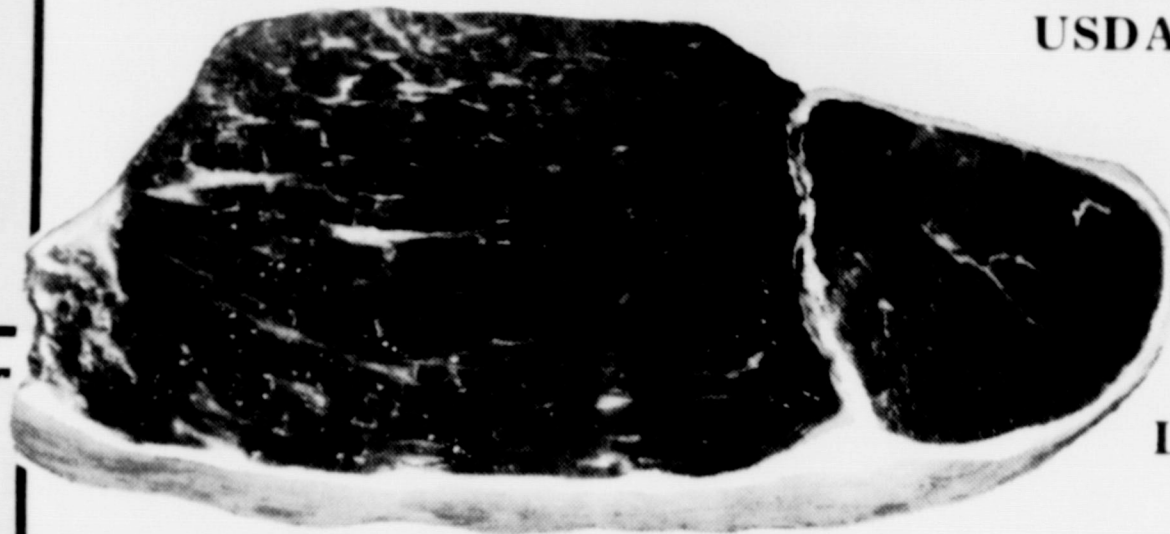
