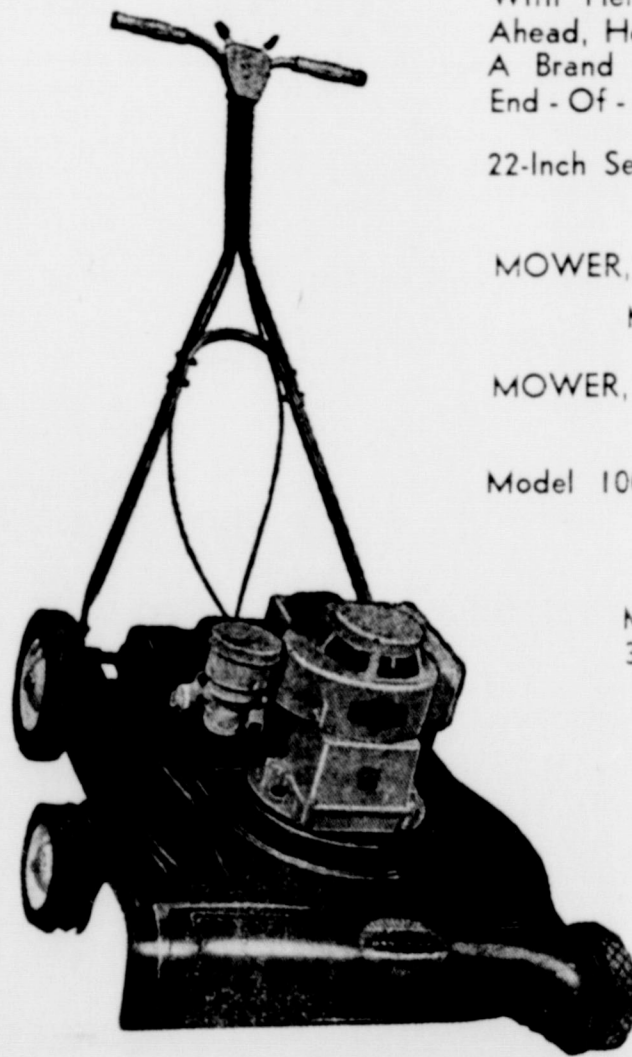

McWilliams is a trainer of thoroughbred horses and he will be ranching here with Mr. Bonner.

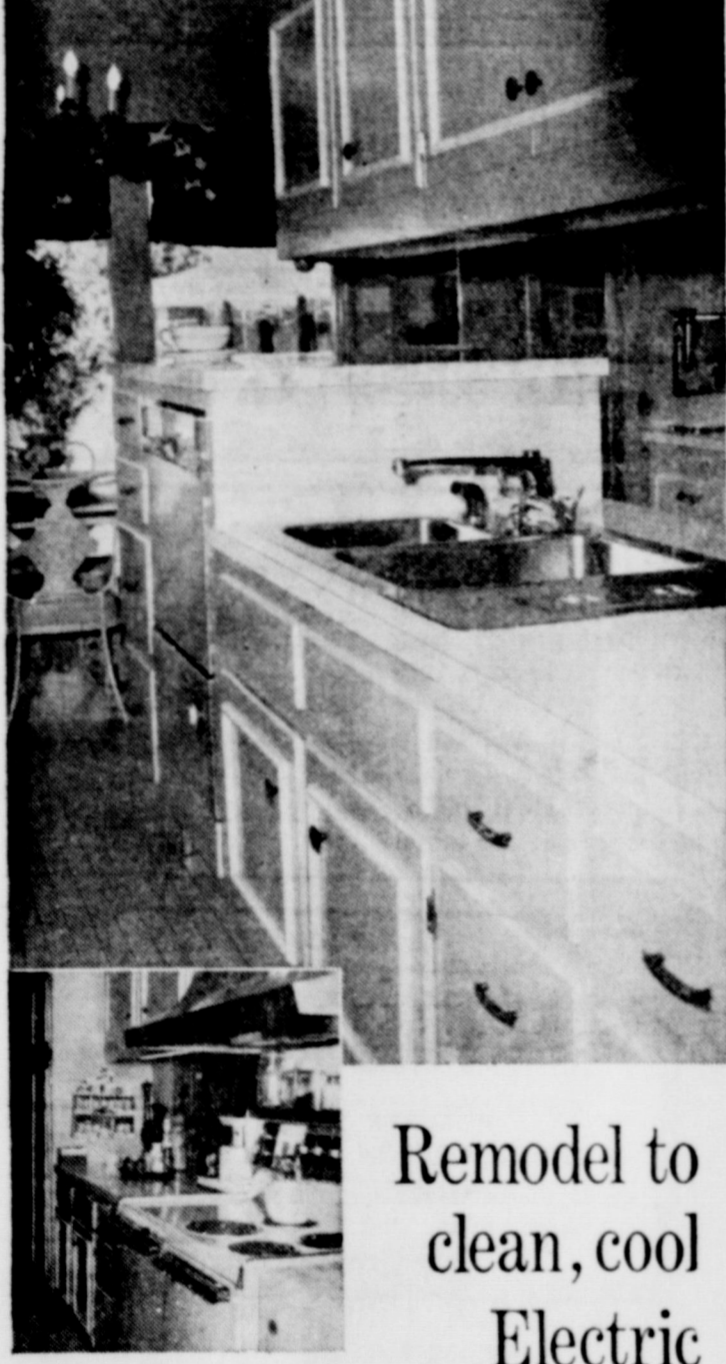
DE LEON PICKED TO WIN DISTRICT 19-A FOOTBALL

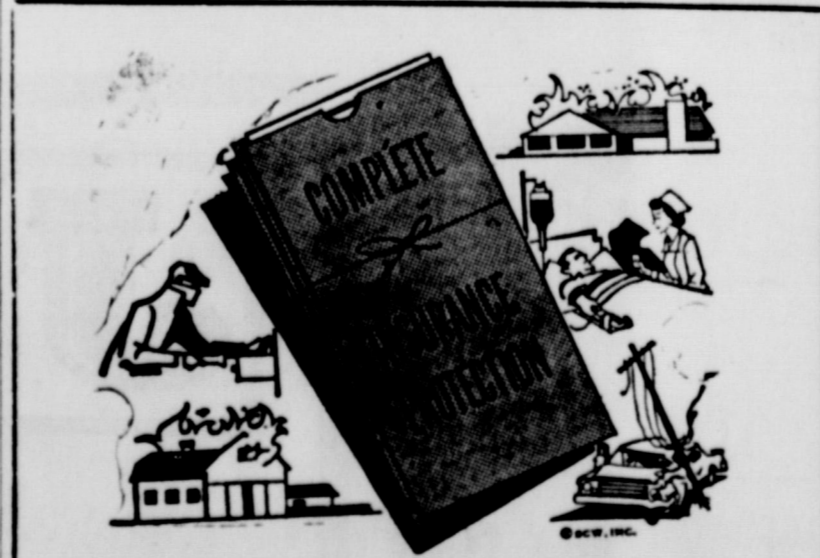

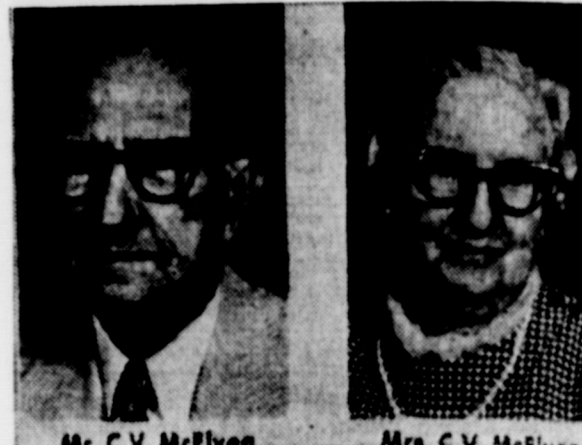

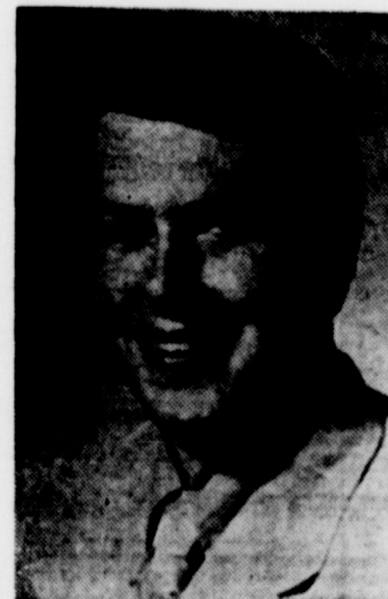
