Apollo Energy, Ltd. of Abilene plans to drill a 3,500-foot wildcat in northeast Callahan County, 6 miles east of Baird. Designated the No. 1 R. L. 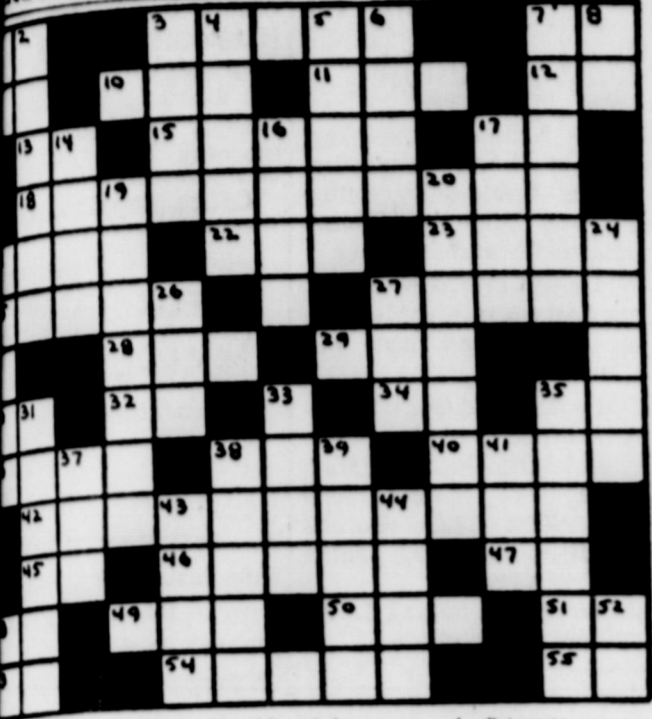
MRS. ETHEL ANDERSON IN ABILENE HOSPITAL
