## Buff Buffs Ready For Grid Season; Meet Dublin Friday

Candidates have been practicing sessions and starting positions on the Cross Plains Buffalo team the past week. These 48 Herdsmen will take the first taste of action in a side competition at Stadium Friday when they will take on a controlled session. Head Coach Lee said that the team will run about 20 offensive plays and defend for 40 defensive plays. The team is reported to be strong with about 10 starters.

returning Buffaloes are lettermen, and six of those have at least part-time starting experience. C. B. Cross Plains schools began the 1973-74 year Monday with a full days schedule. Superintendent Wayne Ford said that the day went well with few delays.

### Proposed Port-To-Plains Road May Come Here

A proposed "port-to-plains" highway might come through Cross Plains if the people of this city and area want it more than the citizens of Coleman.

That was the way the situation was left when a group of about 30 representatives from cities along the proposed route of the super highway met in Austin Tuesday of last week.

The group organized into a "Port-to-Plains Highway Action Committee" and agreed to use Abilene Chamber of Commerce as headquarters to work on the project. Bob Bailey of Abilene

is permanent chairman of the group. The super highway has long been proposed, but not much prior action has been taken on the project. The committee's first action is reportedly to be to get the Texas Highway Commission to designate the route as a project, then apply pressure to have it planned and constructed.

The port-to-plains highway backed by the group will basically be a four-lane road, with no stop lights or stop signs, a minimum number of grade crossings and probably no continuous number of designation.

Although specifics of the route would be worked out by the Highway Commission, the committee envisions a road from Amarillo through Lubbock, Snyder, Sweetwater, Abilene, Brownwood, Lampasas, Austin, La Grange, and connecting with Interstate 10 at Columbus, on into Houston.

The major controversy along the proposed route is expected to be over whether it will go from Abilene to Brownwood by Highway 36 through Cross Plains or by U.S. 84 through Coleman to Brownwood.

Apparently that decision would rest with Marcus Yancey, an assistant state highway engineer, who said that "junior interstates" are the type of road that is the key issue in Texas now. That is the type road the proposed new highway is supposed to be.

It apparently boils down to which town wants the highway more. Cross Plains or Coleman. In any case the new busy State Highway 36 will carry only a trickle of traffic if it goes to Coleman or Cross Plains. Cross Plains could move to the route from Abilene to Brownwood if the highway comes through here. Many other area towns have had to move to the highway when interstates bypassed the section, as will the proposed new road.

Overall the first-day enrollment is down by 15 students over closing figures last Spring when 434 were on rolls.

Opening day last year high school had 175 and elementary and kindergarten classes totaled 456. High school students numbered 166 at closing last year.

Boyle broke down his enrollment for the first day as follows: kindergarten 28, first grade 25, second grade 21, third grade 19, fourth grade 23, fifth grade 23, sixth grade 30, seventh grade 34 and eighth grade 43.

Edgington reported the following class breakdown: freshmen 45, sophomores 37, juniors 39 and seniors 45.

Ford said that a few more students are expected to enroll in the next few days.

Primary delays in the first day's operations was result of students arriving late. The Burkett bus had mechanical trouble and the approximately 20 riders were delayed in arriving at school.

Burkett students have a new bus on the afternoon returning trips. That vehicle, purchased with state money at a cost of \$6,294, is employed in shuttling high school students to vocational classes at Cisco Junior College in the mornings. Ford went after the bus an International-Carpenter with 48 student capacity, at Mitchell, Ind., last week. He arrived back here late Sunday night, and it made the first run to Cisco Monday morning.

Ford said that Cross Plains schools operates 10 route buses with 14 drivers. Oldest of the route buses is a 1963 model. The local system tries to purchase an average of one and one-half buses per year, two new vehicles every other year.

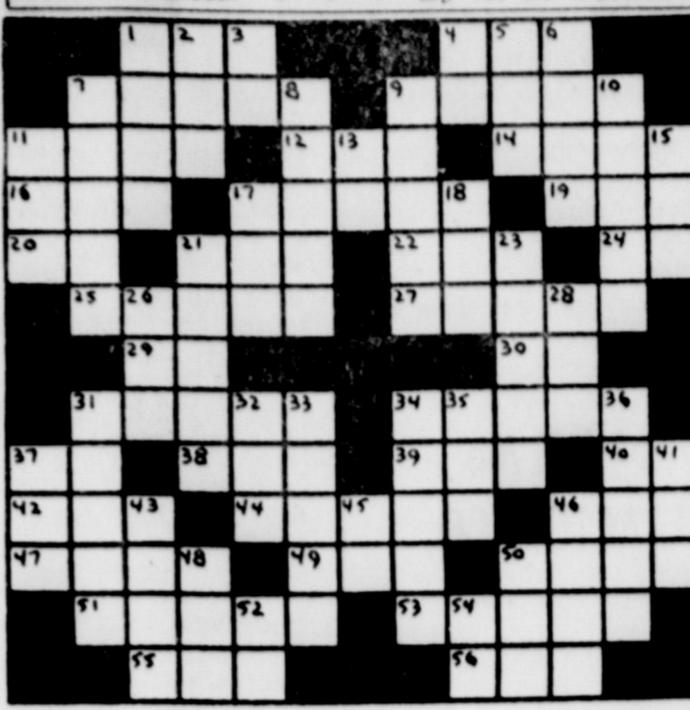

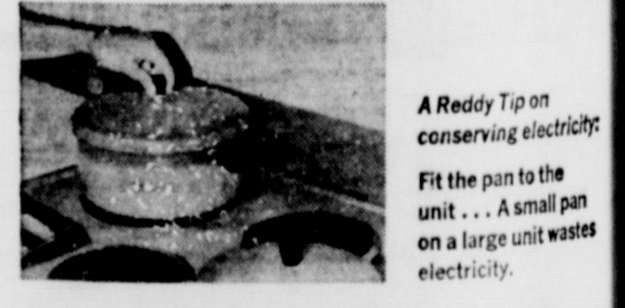
