## SSI Alert Is Seeking Qualified Area Persons

The Governor's Council on Aging has requested that Taylor County Chapter of Red Cross take the responsibility for the SSI-Alert program in the Abilene area which includes Callahan and 14 other nearby counties.

"Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is aimed at people whose Social Security or pension check is not enough to live on. It also is aimed to help those who for some reason are ineligible for Social Security," according to Darrell Carr state coordinator in Austin. Generally these will be individuals whose monthly income is less than \$160, he explained.

## Obscene Phone Calls Being Investigated

A rash of obscene telephone calls are currently being investigated in Cross Plains and the surrounding area.

Callahan County Deputy Sheriff J. H. Cox noted Tuesday that several complaints have been received from mostly single women and widows for the past two or three weeks.

Cox emphasized that making obscene telephone calls is a felony and the party or parties responsible will be prosecuted when caught. "We are currently working on some leads," the deputy said.

## Local Schools Host For 10-A UIL Meet

Cross Plains schools will be host for the District 10-A Spring University Interscholastic League Literary Meet on Saturday, April 6.

Superintendent Wayne Ford, Scot Edington and Arthur Boyle, principals, and Don Lee and Jack Orr, coaches, will attend a district meeting in Early Thursday to finalize plans on literary and athletic portions of the conference meets.

It was announced that the District 10-A all-district basketball teams will also be selected at that time.

## Predator Control Meet Slated At Baird March 6

Farmers and ranchers in Callahan County will have an opportunity to learn about an experimental coyote control program on Wednesday, March 6, at 9 a.m. at the District Courtroom, in the courthouse at Baird, announces Greg Gerngross, county extension agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The meeting will concern the safe use of the M-45 spring-loaded ejector which uses sodium cyanide capsules as a means of controlling predatory animals. The device has been approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for use in a 15-month experimental program in 44 counties in West, Central, and South Texas. The

Texas Department of Agriculture will direct the program. Cooperating agencies are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and the Texas Rodent and Predatory Control Service. The aim of the program is to determine the safest, least expensive and most effective means of controlling predators without harm to other wildlife and the environment, explains Gerngross.

The March 6 meeting will be conducted by a wildlife specialist of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and a representative of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Gerngross emphasizes that only those farmers and ranchers who participate in the training meeting will be certified to purchase the M-44 and capsules to use in the pilot program. Each participant will be issued a certificate by the Texas Department of Agriculture at the conclusion of the meeting.

Gerngross points out that a local supplier will be named in the county who will sell the M-44 and capsules to qualified producers. Those purchasing the predator control devices will be required to submit a monthly report to the County Extension office on the use and effects of the control system. This report will be used by representatives of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Environmental Protection Agency to evaluate the program.

## March 6 Deadline For School, City Vote Filings

With the filing deadline for school trustee and city council elections just a week away, no contests had developed in either the school trustee or Cross Plains council elections both slated for April 6.

Final date for filing in both elections is Wednesday, March 6. Candidates for the school board may file with Dr. Carl J. Sohns, and city council aspirants may file with City Secretary Mrs. Vernelle Bishop.

Three vacancies are occurring on each directorate. Three trustees will be elected, and two city councilmen and a mayor will be named.

Having filed previously for school posts are Edwin Schaefer, R. N. Tatom and Baylis Pope. Schaefer and Pope are newcomers, and Tatom is asking re-election. Trustees whose terms are expiring other than Tatom are Noah Johnson and Vernon Phillips. Johnson has said he will not be a candidate, but Phillips has not made a public statement.

Only incumbent Mayor Doyle Burchfield has filed for that post in the city balloting.

Seeking the two council seats are Alvin Hutchins, and T. T. (Nick) Nichols. The latter is

asking re-election, but Hutchins is seeking a first term. He formerly ran unsuccessfully for mayor.

Raymond DeBask has not said if he would seek re-election as alderman.

Councilmen and mayor are named for two-year terms, and trustees are selected for three-year terms.

Holdover members of the school board are Dr. Carl J. Sohns, Tommie Harris, Dick Koenig and Lewis Fortune.

Councilmen with a year remaining on present terms are Oscar Koenig, Gerald Bowden and Jimmie Payne.

## McWilliams Home Razed By Fire

The ranch home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McWilliams and family 10 miles west of Cross Plains was destroyed by fire about 3 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

The McWilliams family lost all possessions except one mattress and a small chair. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Cross Plains rural fire units responded to the call, but the large three-bedroom home was engulfed in flames when they arrived. The brick house had recently been extensively remodeled.

Mr. and Mrs. McWilliams and children, Terry, 12, and John, 7, are temporarily staying with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Bonner.

No one was at home when the fire was seen from the Bonner home and reported. Origin of the blaze was not determined.

## Higher Postal Rates Effective Saturday

Joe Hanke, Jr., Cross Plains postmaster, has reminded postal patrons that increased postage rates go into effect at 12:01 a.m. Saturday March 2.

A first class letter will take 10 cents per ounce or a fraction thereof instead of the 8 cent stamp presently used. Postage paid for post cards will be increased from 6 cents to 8 cents. Airmail letters advance from 11 cents for first ounce to 13 cents.

Hanke also noted there will be increases in second and third class rates and parcel post.

"New rates will be posted in the post office lobby," Hanke said. "Or patrons may phone us about the increases."

He pointed out that any mail dropped in boxes after the close of business Friday will require the new postage because postmarks will not be made until Saturday morning.

## Rain, Hail, Snow Falls Over Area Last Week

Hail, rain and snow fell in the Cross Plains area in less than 12 hours Wednesday and Thursday of last week.

About 10 p.m. Wednesday a spring-like cloud hit in Cross Plains featuring thunder, lightning, hail and rain. The hail was of about pea-size and was not heavy. The shower which fell during and after the hail was the first appreciable moisture received here since the latter part of November.

About 9 a.m. Thursday large snow flakes began floating earthward. Although the temperature was well above the freezing mark, the extremely large flakes and heavy snow covered vegetables and automobiles for some time. All trace of the snow was gone by mid-afternoon, and the sun was shining late that day.

The moisture was measured at a total of 1.05 inches by F. C. Newton, local official weather observer. He recorded the hail and rain as .65 of an inch and the snow, which was mixed with rain at times, was measured at .40 of an inch. It is the first moisture, other than traces, gauged here during 1974.

Farmers and ranchers considered the moisture beneficial, but all expressed the need for much more rain. Small grain crops, long suffering from lack of water, are greening, but opinions differ if the moisture came too late and of inadequate amount to be of much value.

Some grain producers have given up on harvesting wheat and oats this spring, but many say if additional moisture is received soon a harvest can be expected, although most agree that it could be less than normal.

Winter pasturage was enhanced by the moisture, but additional rainfall is urgently needed. Most area stockmen are being forced to feed livestock daily.

## SCHOOLS WILL RETURN TO REGULAR SCHEDULE FRIDAY

Cross Plains schools will return to regular time schedule effective Friday, March 1, according to Wayne Ford, superintendent.

Classes will begin at 8:30 a.m. and dismiss at 3:34 p.m.

The local school system has been operating on a delayed schedule of 30 minutes since January when Daylight Saving Time was initiated due to the energy crisis.

"We now feel that it is light enough at 8:30 in the morning to resume our regular schedule," Ford stated Tuesday.

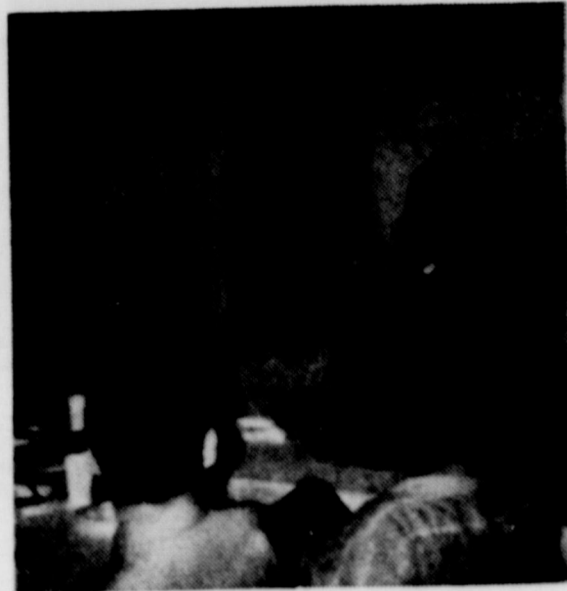

The bride was graduated from Lubbock High School and attended Texas Tech University. She has until recently been employed by McIngvale Associates at Lubbock.

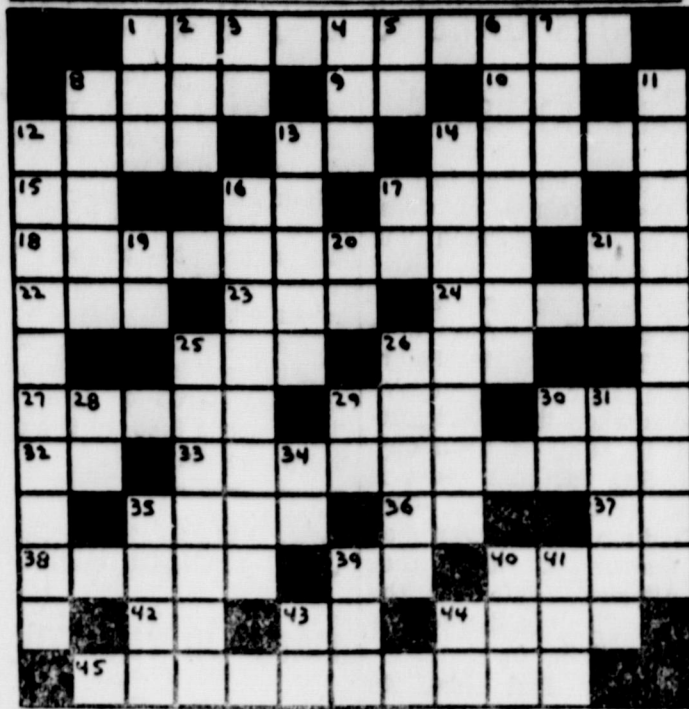

"The Petroleum Allocation Program has been changed three times in the past several months. The Federal Energy Office in Dallas is now in charge of the program. Under the new program, your distributor is the most important person you will deal with," says J. C. Earp, Jr., executive director of the Callahan County A.S.C.S. office at Baird.

The essential thing a farmer must do to help assure himself adequate fuel for agricultural production is tell his distributor how much he needs. Earp cautions. Unless a local distributor or dealer knows what his farm customer requires, that distributor can not take the necessary steps to get enough fuel for them.

Informing the distributor becomes even more important if a farmer intends to increase his acreage considerably, or if he wants to expand dairy poultry, or other farm operations. Local dealers will need this information to request additional fuel from their suppliers.

A small supply of the required forms are available at the ASCS office at the courthouse in Baird, for distributor and farmers as needed.


