Schools Save Energy During Past Quarter

State of Texas asked public schools to save energy and report on savings at end of the first quarter of 1974. Cross Plains schools did show a big energy saving, according to Wayne Ford, superintendent.

Comparing the first quarter of 1973 to that period of 1974, a saving of 26 per cent was evident in natural gas, 10 per cent on electricity and 14 per cent on gasoline.

A total of \$685.83 was conserved. Breakdown follows: natural gas, 271,000 feet less, saving \$238.48; electricity, 3,273 kilowatt hours less, saving \$113.33, and gasoline, 1,081 gallons, less, saving \$334.02.

Singer will be Randall Purvis, music director of the First Baptist Church at Hurst.

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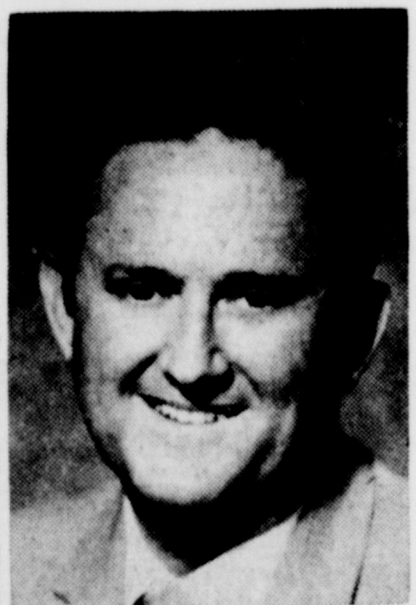

Ex-Local Snake Handler Witnessing For God

Editor's Note: Following is a story which appeared in the Brownwood Bulletin on Sunday, April 7, concerning R. B. Dillard, formerly of Cross Plains, who has gained fame as holder of the world's championship rattlesnake sacking champion.

"R. B. (Cotton) Dillard hunts and handles snakes not for sport but in his words, 'to witness for the Lord.'"

"This is my way of witnessing for the Lord," he said. Dillard's feats with snakes attract thousands of spectators. While he demonstrates how to handle snakes, Dillard tells his audiences that he has God's protection. He tells them how God came in his life and showed a way to witness for Him.

"Dillard wants to use his knowledge of snakes and their handling for educational purposes.

"People die needlessly every year from non-poisonous snake bites," he said. "This happens because of shock, heart attack or even improper treatment," he said.

"At a large protected area near his mobile home at Lake Brownwood, Dillard has over 100 rattlesnakes, some of which he uses for educational lectures.

He says it's important that the average person knows how to recognize a rattlesnake and other poisonous snakes from the harmless varieties. He also advocates that everyone should know first aid when and if bitten by a poisonous snake. Dillard also has a large number of the non-poisonous varieties. "Dillard, a former Cross Plains resident, is making a name for himself as far as feats with snakes are concerned. He is the world's sacking champion after having bagged 10 snakes in 31.7 seconds. He did this several weeks ago at the Brownwood Jaycee Rattlesnake Round-up.

"This is all in answer to prayer," he said. "God came into my life two years ago and I prayed that he would show me how to find a way to witness to more people," he said.

"Before he handled snakes as witnessing for the Lord, he said it was for money. 'God gave every person a measure of faith and everyone a talent. This is my talent and since I seem to have the ability to handle snakes, I want to use it to witness for God,' he said.

"Among the rattlers who

slither around the snake pit near Dillard's home are the western diamond back, an albino rattler, a red diamond back rattler and one with an odd shaped tail.

"In another section the non-poisonous snakes are the Central Texas whip snake, which is 77 inches long, a garter snake, a hognose snake variety, a racer hatchling, ribbon and bull snake.

"Feeding time for the snakes is once a month.

"He even has some snakes named. Among the bunch in the rattlesnake pit are Long-fellow and Tex.

"Dillard hopes to be able to put on educational shows in the area and demonstrate the do's and don'ts of snake handling. He wants to turn money he earns for these demonstrations to charitable organizations.

"In this way he will be accomplishing two of his goals, one to teach how to protect oneself when confronted with a poisonous snake, what to do if bitten and the other, to help support a charitable institution."

Cottonwood Native Retiring At Cisco

C. R. Hightower is retiring from the Cisco Fire Department after 37 years. He has served as fire marshal in Cisco for 35 years.

Mr. Hightower was born in Callahan County near Cottonwood in 1891, and the 82-year-old fireman moved to Cisco in 1937.

He has seen the fire department grow from a force transported by a 1933 Chevrolet pumper and booster and a Breckway truck to a 31 man force with five emergency vehicles equipped with modern emergency equipment.

Mr. Hightower lives with his daughter, Laura Edna Hightower, in Cisco. His wife died in 1963.

He plans to "do as little as possible" upon his retirement.

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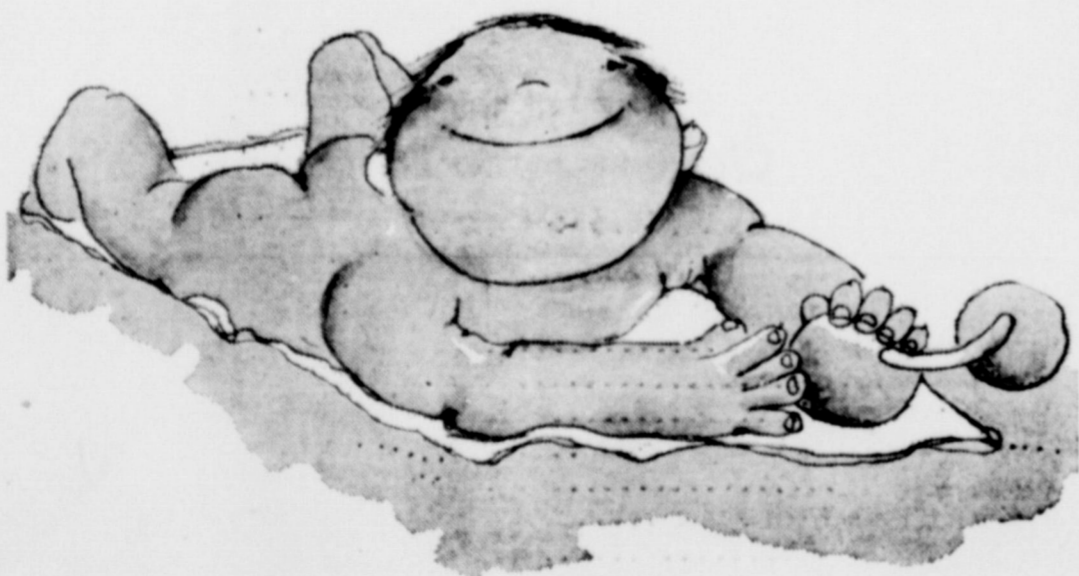
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
