FRANK RUNDRELL ACCEPTS SUPERINTENDENT'S POST

Frank Rundrell of Austin has accepted the position of Superintendent of Schools at Cross Plains. Board of Trustees hired Mr. Rundrell Thursday night. He accepted the post. Contract calls for a one-year tenure starting July 1 and running through June 30, 1975.

Many Cross Plains residents will remember Rundrell. He was head coach here during the early 1950's, resigning in 1953 to accept a place in the athletic department of Austin schools.

He currently is assistant principal at Hayes Consolidated School at Austin. Trustees are hoping that he may begin duties here as early as June 15, but Rundrell stated Friday that he would have to check with his school at Austin before making firm commitment on his starting date here.

Other details concerning Rundrell will be published in later edition of the Review.

Second Demo Vote Is Slated Saturday

Democratic Run-Off Primary will be held across Texas Saturday.

Voters of Precinct 4 (Cross Plains and surrounding area including Cottonwood and Atwell communities) will have two races in which to decide nominees. All other Callahan County voters will have only one race in which to make a choice.

The Precinct 4 race for County Commissioner pits incumbent Duke Mitchell and challenger E. F. (Franzel) Odom.

The only county-wide office at stake is that of Callahan County School Superintendent in which incumbent L. C. Cash and newcomer E. L. (Chief) Reese are pitted.

Alton E. Hornsby, Precinct Chairman, said Tuesday that another heavy vote is expected in Cross Plains. In the first primary 690 ballots were cast at the local polls. Hornsby said that about 600 votes are expected here Saturday.

Polls will again be at the Cross Plains City Hall. Voting will begin at 8 a.m. and continue through 7 p.m.

Hornsby emphasized that all persons wishing to vote should have registration in hand. "It will make voting process go faster and be easier on clerks if registrations are presented," he pointed out.

The run-off for the nomination as Precinct 4 County Commissioner was necessary when Mitchell failed to gain a majority in the initial election. He led the six-man ticket with 223 totals votes. Odom and Nathan S. Foster were tied with 44 votes each. A re-count of the ballots found one more vote for Odom which put him in the run-off slot opposite the incumbent. This race has stirred considerable interest locally, and is expected to be a primary factor in the expected heavy vote Saturday.

Cash and Reese were forced into a run-off when the third party in the first contest, Robert F. Joy, Jr. polled 345 votes in the county which limited the incumbent to plurality of 187 votes, not a majority.

The Review will post election results as soon as returns from over the county and this precinct are available. Interested persons are invited to drop by the newspaper office to get results of the election's races from window posters.

Brush Control Does Pay County Agent Explains

Editor's Note: The following article was authored by Greg Gerngross, Callahan County extension agent at Baird. In it he describes herbicides allowed and in mesquite control and results of pastures in the county treated some time ago. His item follows.

Brush control is a subject of much importance to many Callahan County ranchers. In 1974, landowners have a choice of three herbicides for mesquite control. These are 2,4,5-E alone, 2,4,5-T: Picloram mixture (Tordon 225 mixture) and 2,4,5-T: Dicamba mixture (Banvel 2 plus 2) Tordon 225 must be applied by an applicator approved by Dow Chemical Co. Also site must be inspected and approved by a Dow Chemical Company representative.

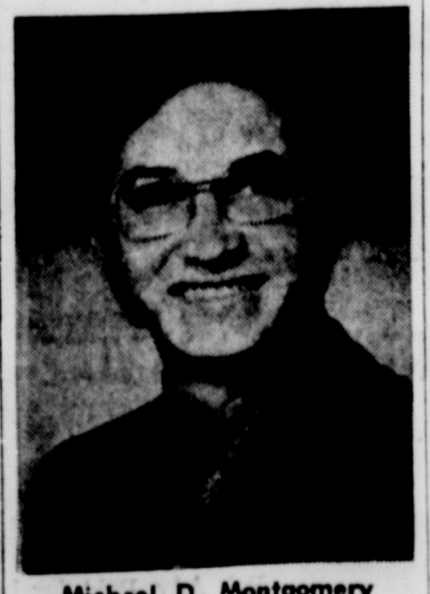
Mike Montgomery Will Receive M. D. Degree

Which Product Should You Use?

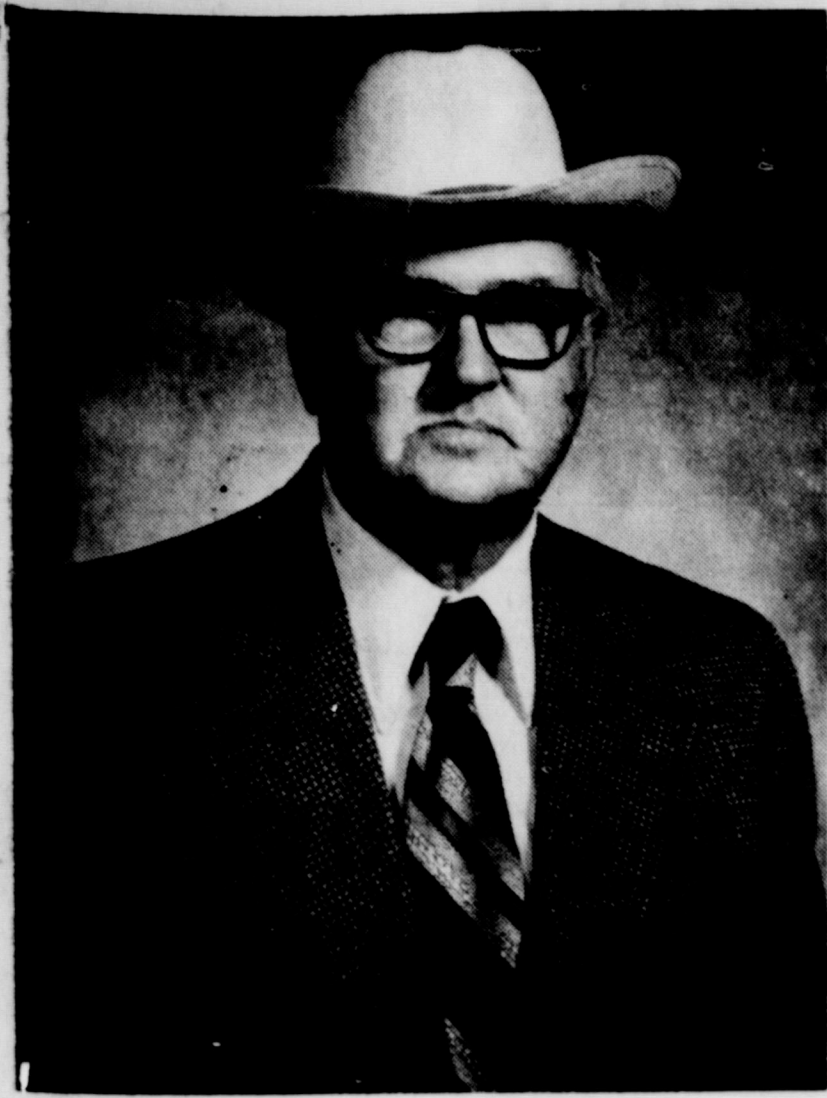
Which product should you use? This is a broad question that could have several answers.

A study of one pasture evaluated in 1972 showed a mesquite kill as high as 43 percent using Tordon 225. In this same plot 83 percent of the mesquite was controlled. 2,4,5-T plus Dicamba also showed good results that year with one plot registering a 42 percent kill. Plots sprayed with 2,4,5-T alone showed a 29 percent kill. All of these plots were sprayed in 1970 and evaluated in the fall of 1972.

In general where mesquite foliage is heavy and pear control is desired, the foliage should be knocked off one year and the 2,4,5-T-Picloram mixture sprayed the following year for pear control.

Complete results of these demonstrations over the past few years are available from the county extension office at Baird.

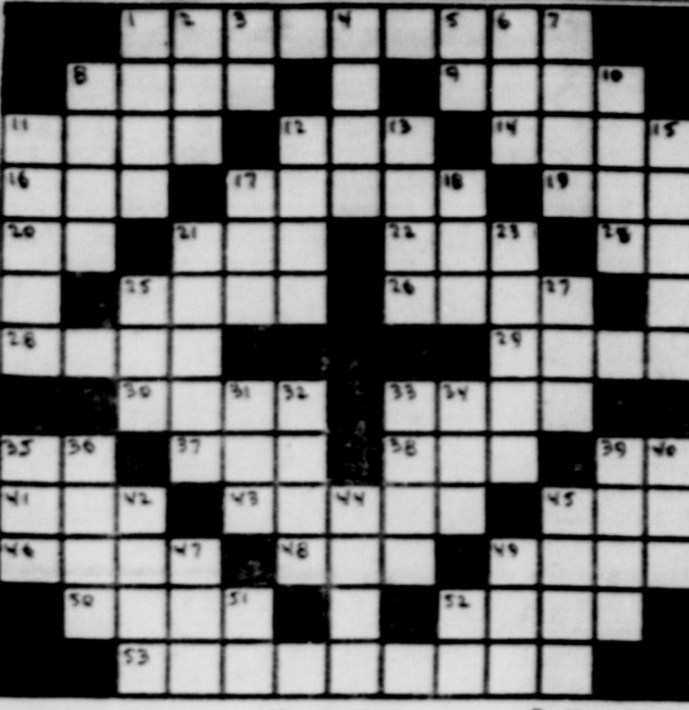

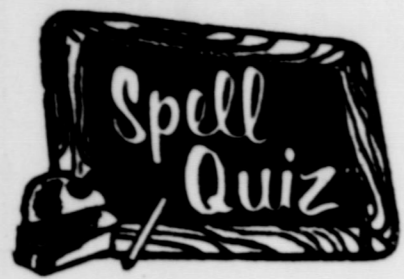
Rev. L. J. Helm Stays In Local Pastorate

Destruction of the family (the back-bone of America) therefore the necessity of nursery and child care programs being an extension of the public school system. Would you believe they are actually proud of our pre-school programs and plan to help extend it to younger children. Of course they never do it under the name they really serve.

There are around 40 groups pushing for the complete ratification and almost none trying to stop it. Since we have seen the type of people who originated ERA and support it can we really believe that it holds no harm to us?

As an example of how ERA already has started to destroy the family we can take a quick look at the Colorado law C. 160, Section 1, 43-1-1 which took effect on July 1, 1973. If a woman wants absolute assurance that she will be supported "during child birth and attendant illness" she had better NOT be married to the father! Now the legitimate "spouse" has no guarantee since she is 50 per cent liable for herself, child and husband. Do we really think our legislators are able to do any better when they have to fit Texas family law to fit the same federal law?

One of their newest lies and you can hear it from both Washington and Austin is that you cannot repeal a state ratification once it has passed. Don't let anyone tell you that! In the CONGRESSIONAL RECORD on May 8, 1873 page S8522 is Prof. Charles L. Black, Jr. (Luce Prof. of Jurisprudence at the Yale University Law School) statement:

"I warmly favor the Equal Rights Amendment. I'm strongly for it. But I'm opposed to such 'Mickey Mouse' tactics as claiming that, once a state has ratified the amendment, it's locked in forever, as in a lobster trap. Clearly, a state can change its mind either way before the amendment is officially declared to be ratified.

You can't tell me that it would be sound policy to tell those states, 'You're trapped. You can't get out.' You could then have a situation where a majority of states had turned against an amendment but were still counted as voting for it, and it could even be declared officially 'ratified.'

The crucial question is whether three-fourths of the states favor the amendment at the same time.

Parading precedents is a fallacy. The Supreme Court has reversed itself, sometimes, and it is Congress' responsibility to do the rational thing. The states may freely withdraw their ratification at any time before an amendment is officially de-

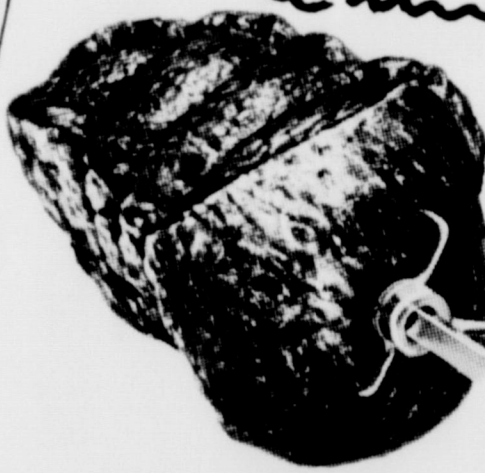
