Change In Review Ownership Is Told

Monday, June 10, Jack McCarty, of Glenwood, announced his three-quarter interest in the Cross Plains Review to Benny Glover of this city.

Both papers have yet to be sold and the deal completed. McCarty, who has been publisher of the newspaper since August 1, 1971, since he has served as editor since that date, verbally agreed to sell the newspaper to Glover last week end. McCarty has owned a quarter interest in the Review since 1968. He bought into the home newspaper when former publisher, Jack McCarty and Jack McCarty, who had been the Review and Glenwood publisher, bought the Rose paper, and Scott McCarty, who had been the Review, selling to Glover. In 1971 McCarty acquired the interest in Cross Plains News sheet from Scott's son.

Personnel changes in the printing plant is planned. V. (Esthly) Dickson, Cross Plains will remain printer and bookkeeper. Other responsibilities will be handled by John and Dick Wilhelm of Brownwood and Glover. Glover stated this week that he will remain in Cross Plains in association with the paper but laments McCarty's departure as occasioned by business and other commitments at Glen Rose. He will continue as publisher, in partnership with his son, Dan, of Glen Rose.

Vote Count Leaves Cash School Victor

A re-count last Friday of the votes polled in the race for Callahan County School Superintendent in the run-off Democratic Primary on June 1 showed that incumbent L. C. Cash was still the winner.

The three-man panel which re-counted the ballots adjusted the total vote each received. Challenger E. L. (Chief) Reese, who requested the re-count, received three additional votes, bringing his total to 695. Cash was given one more vote for a 705 total.

Cash, therefore, won the election by a 10-vote margin. Initial results gave the victor a 12-vote advantage, 692 to 704. The victor has held the county school post for more than 20 years.

The three-member panel charged with re-counting the votes was composed of Noah Johnson of Cross Plains, Curtis Sutpen of Baird and Roy Plemister of Clyde.

It was pointed out by Reese and county Democratic officials that when the margin of votes is less than five per cent of the total balloting, a re-count may be requested.

Reese, a Baird businessman making his first bid for county office, requested the count "without offense to friend or foe". He said upon asking the vote count that he believed he owed that action to the persons who worked and supported him for the office.

Cash will face no Republican opposition in the November General Election.

Callahanians In Good Shape Credit, Debt Wise

In Callahan County, how important a role does installment credit play in consumer spending for goods and services?

How large a debt load are local families carrying? How well are they managing it?

The great majority appear to be in good shape. Because of their concern over inflation, fuel conditions, unemployment and other aspects of the economy, they have been keeping their expenditures within bounds lately while watching developments.

As a result, their debt has stayed at a manageable level and their credit in good shape.

Nationally, according to the latest figures from the Federal Reserve Board, the American Bankers Association and others, the amount of installment debt outstanding is over \$147 billion, with more than one-third of it consisting of automobile loans.

What this means for the overall population, is that its consumer debt represents, on average, approximately 16 per cent of its net, after-tax income.

In Callahan County, one the basis of local income and spending figures, its outstanding debt load comes to an estimated \$1.150 per family.

That is the local average. Some families owe considerably more than that and others considerably less. Many buy for cash and have no installment debt at all.

For the Callahan County population as a whole, the debt adds up to approximately \$3,639,000.

In addition to the amount owed for cars, which is the largest single item, it covers personal loans, loans for home repair and modernization and other consumer purchases. Excluded are charge accounts, home mortgage debt and single payment loans.

To pay off this debt within the course of a year would require about 16 per cent of net earnings, on average, or about \$95 per month per local family.

Is there concern over the ability of most Americans to handle their debt? Very little, although the American Bankers Association recently reported that 2.69 per cent of such loans were 30 days past due, as against 2.53 per cent a year ago.

Dale Bishops Back Home After Hawaii, Tahiti Tour

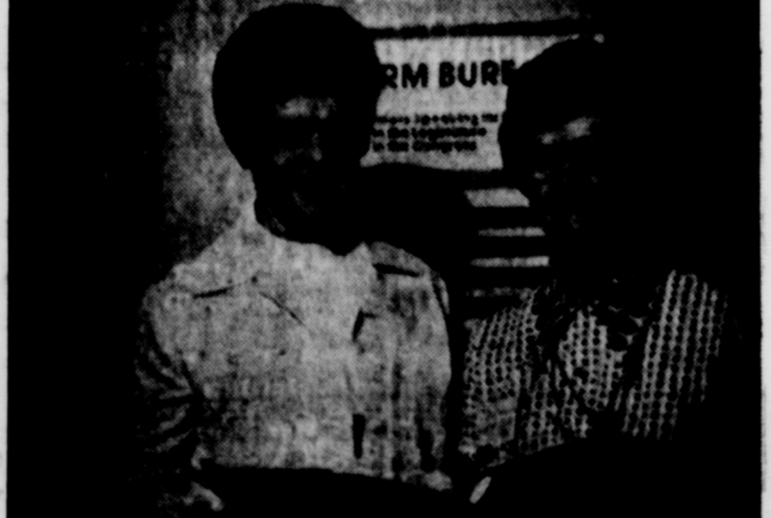

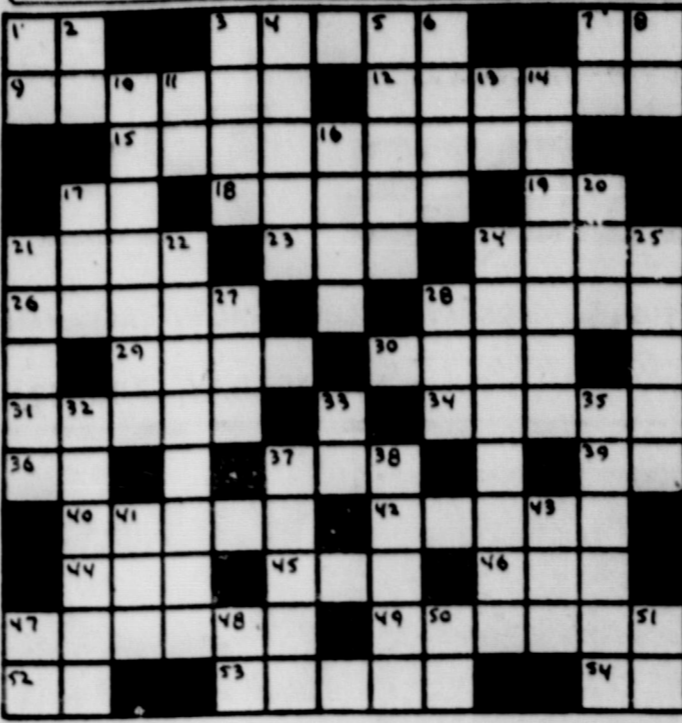

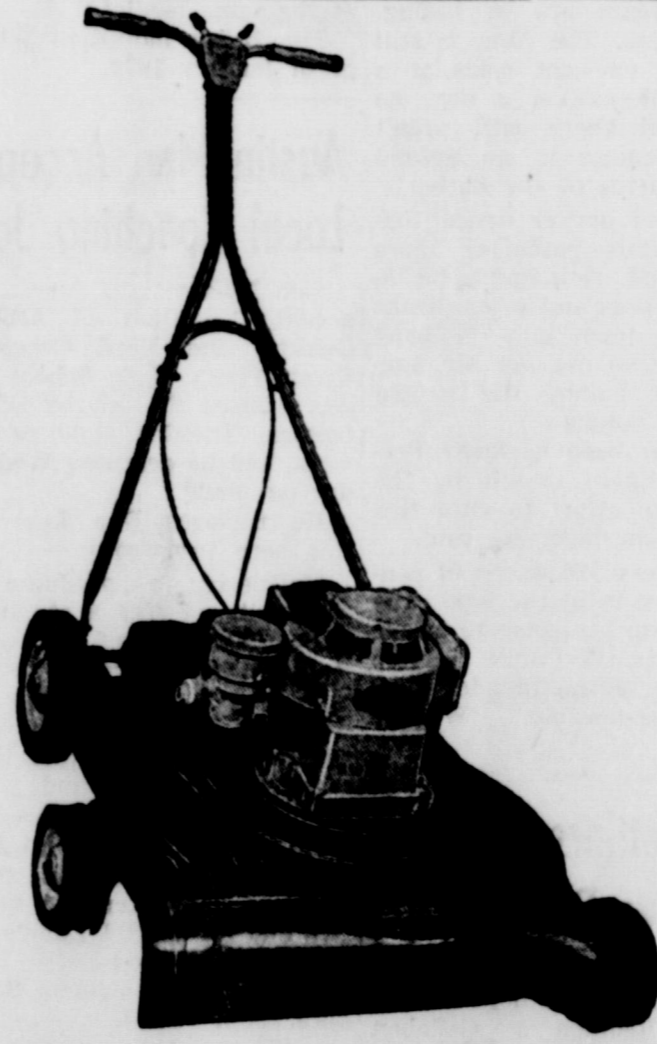

Judge Meade Griffin Expires On June 3

Retired State Supreme Court Justice Meade Griffin, 80-year-old native of Cottonwood, died at his home in Austin Monday of last week, June 3.

Judge Griffin had strong ties with his birthplace, and was instrumental in organizing and chartering the Cottonwood Historical Association which has successfully raised \$10,000 to insure permanent care of both the old and new cemeteries at Cottonwood.

Funeral and other personal details were not learned here, but the following was found in an area daily paper a few days after his death.

Griffin had the distinction of serving on both of Texas' highest courts. He served on the Texas Supreme Court from 1949 to 1968 and was later a special judge on the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

He was born in 1894 and moved to Tullia in 1914 after completing a bachelor's degree at the University of Texas. He received a law degree in 1917 from UT.

A World War I army veteran, Griffin returned to Tullia and was elected mayor and Swisher County attorney. After moving to Plainview, he was chosen Hale County judge twice and district attorney twice.

On July 27, 1942, Griffin returned to the army as a lieutenant colonel in 1945, he was detailed to the Judge Advocate General's Department and helped establish the Trial Section of War Crimes Branch and was named chief of the prosecution subsection of the War Crimes Branch in Wiesbaden, Germany.

Griffin was released from active duty in December, 1945. Gov. Beauford Jester appointed Griffin Associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court in March 1949. Griffin subsequently was elected to three full six-year terms, 1950 to 1962.

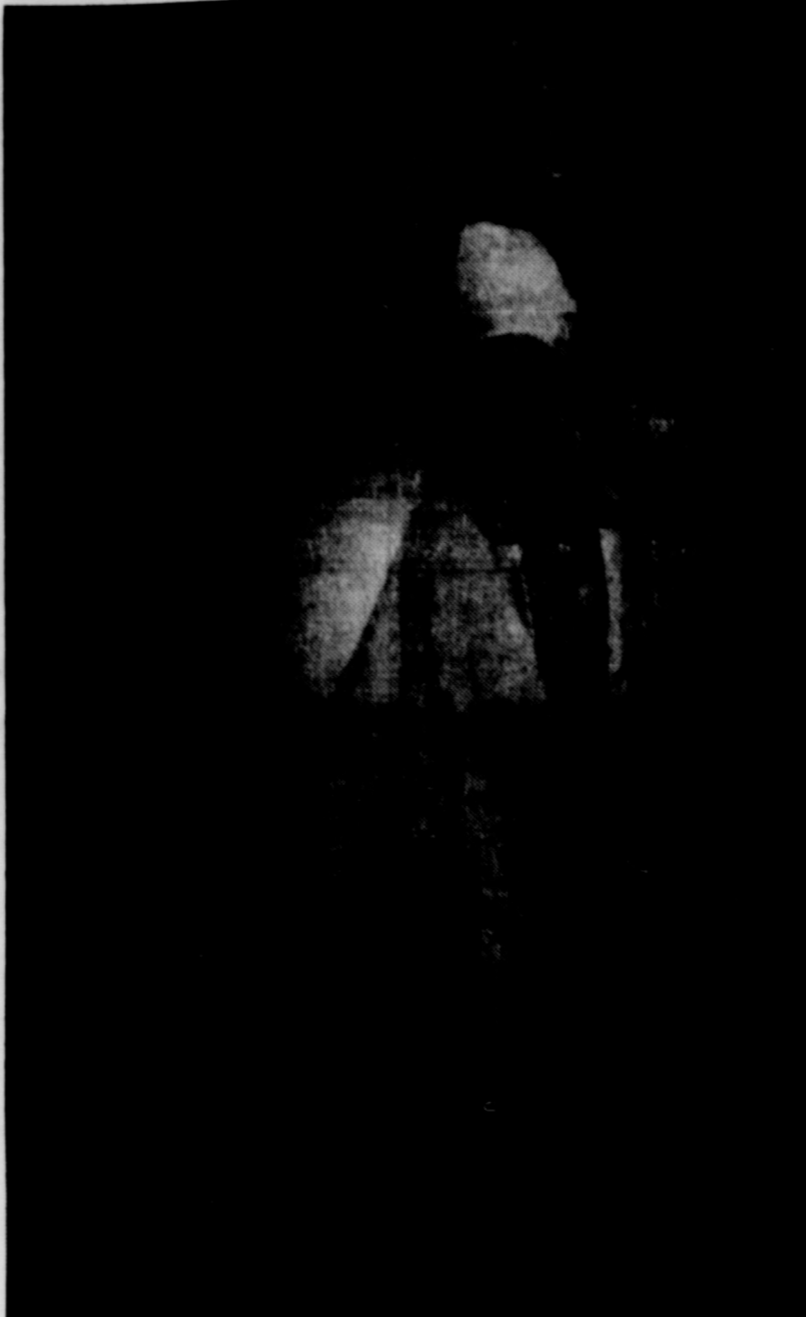
After retiring at the end of 1968, Griffin has been called on by state officials to serve as a special Texas Court of Criminal Appeals judge to serve as an aide to the late Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin.

He was active in the American Legion, bar associations and civic clubs in Tullia and Plainview.

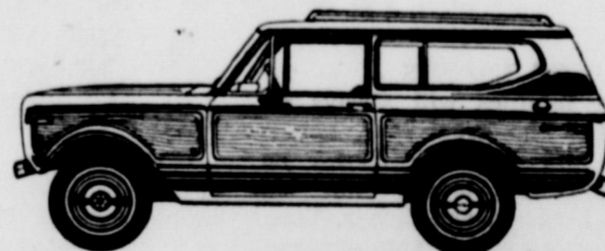

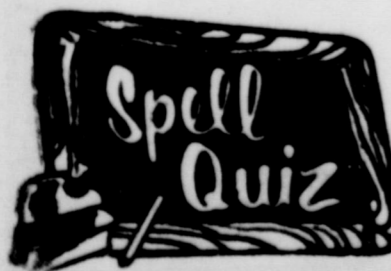
