Those who do qualify by August 31 will be recognized in a special ceremony, at the State Fair year and short history of their family and land will be published in a land heritage directory. In addition, local recognition will be provided to the families for their long dedication to agriculture.

Old Settlers Will Reunite Here Next August 10th

Old settlers of Callahan County will have a reunion this summer.

Callahan County Pioneer Association met in the courthouse in Baird last Friday with about 20 persons present, and the group decided to re-instate the gathering of county old-timers after a one-year absence.

The reunion will again be held in Cross Plains' Treadaway Park on Saturday, August 10. Preliminary plans were made at last Friday's meeting, and work was being done on the program first of this week.

James Paul Shanks of Baird, Callahan County Attorney, is serving as acting president of the pioneer organization. The group named Mrs. Mike (Maggie) Cook of Baird, formerly of this city, as secretary. She had

been serving in that capacity on a temporary basis.

In other action at the meeting Friday, R. B. Taylor and I. G. Mobley of Putnam and Jim Smedley of Baird were named to a committee to nominate officers of the association for next year.

Mrs. Naomi Heyser, Mrs. Vida Hill and Mrs. H. D. Driskill, all of Baird, and Mrs.

Taylor were appointed to the program committee. Randall Jackson of Abilene, Shanks and M. M. Tabor of Clyde will serve as masters of ceremonies at the reunion.

Officers said they are not planning to get a speaker for the occasion but the committee will have free watermelons for all attending.

Numerous pioneers will be recognized at the reunion, which will start at 10 a.m.: oldest cowboy, earliest pioneer woman, earliest pioneer man, oldest man and woman with continued residence in the county, oldest native-born man and woman, oldest native man and woman coming the farthest for the reunion, oldest married couple and the couple married the longest who never left Callahan County.

The reunion was cancelled last year due to a lack of interest at organizational meetings. It was said at that time an effort would be made this year to re-instate the annual gathering of county pioneers. The two years prior to last year untimely rains dampened activities of the Callahan old settlers.

**Eastland Leads Area
Savings Bond Sales**

Eastland County is leader among the counties of this area in sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds, according to a release from the Department of the Treasury.

Eastland County had attained 31 per cent of its 1974 goal of \$320,000 with sales amounting to \$98,645 through April. The county has no bond chairman, but the report noted that sales during the fourth month totaled \$23,672.

Brown County was runner-up in the four-county competition with 29 per cent of its quota of \$400,000 reached with four-month sales totaling \$114,838. The report revealed that sales during April totaled \$25,218 three.

Callahan County was rated third with one-fourth of its 1974 goal reached. Howard E. Farmer of Baird, county bond chairman, reported sales during April amounted to \$4,533, bringing the aggregate for the four-month period to \$39,738. Quota for Callahan for 1974 is \$160,000.

Coleman County was a distant fourth with only 19 per cent of its \$140,000 standard achieved. Robert I. Bowen, Jr., bond chairman there, reported April sales as \$4,494 for a total of \$27,028.

Sales in Texas during the month amounted to \$19,212,748, while year-to-date sales totaled \$80,456,814 with 34 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$236.8 million goal achieved.

9 National Parks**

They "stood in awe" at the sight of the gigantic redwood and sequoia trees, some of which were taller than the length of a football field. One was 42 feet in diameter or more than 130 feet in circumference. Some are over 4,000 years old. Hobdy stated "they were middle-aged when Christ walked the earth."

The giant Sequoia grows in only two places, both on the west side of Sierra, Nevada Range, and on elevations from 6,500 to 6,700 feet, in Sequoia and Kings Canyon and Yosemite parks. Their bark is two feet thick. They never die of old age; just hazards like fire and storm. Mr. Hobdy quoted Joyce Kilmer who wrote "only God can make a tree."

Mrs. Boatright noted that the little lady only took the 20 minutes time to reach Dallas from home.



Crop Disaster Pay Requirements Told

Callahan County A.S.C.S. officials have revealed requirements under which producers participating in wheat, cotton or feed grain programs may be eligible for disaster payments.

It was noted that prevention of planting, is destroyed or produces a low yield due to natural disaster. It was emphasized that if natural disaster affects a crop, the county A.S.C.S. office should be notified immediately.

It was also noted that there will be no prevented planting approvals for wheat and feed grain for this county. It was also explained that if prevented planting credit for cotton is to be approved, an application must be filed before July 1, and prevented planting will cover a general area rather than individual farm. Weather conditions permitting, cotton is expected to be planted through June 15 and grain sorghum until July 10.

Other factors involved in the program may be obtained from the A.S.C.S. office in the courthouse at Baird.

Certify Crop Acreage Says ASCS Official

J. C. Earp, Jr. of Baird, county executive director of Callahan County ASCS office in the courthouse, says that one of the most important things a farmer will do this year is to timely report planted acreage of all crops, including permanent grasses.

He noted that program changes now provide that planted acreage of conserving and non-conserving crops may protect the farms future allotments. All acreages are to be certified by not later than July 15, 1974, he pointed out.

Wheat and barley crops were to be reported before harvest or by July 15, and cotton, peanuts and feed grains are to be reported after planting but before July 15.

He added, "where acreage planted to permanent grasses and sudan type grasses are to be used for allotment history protection, they also must be certified by the above date.

"When an allotment is lost or reduced for failure to timely certify crop acreages, it cannot be reinstated.

"At the time of certification an intention to participate in the 1974 cotton, wheat, or feed grain programs may be signed."

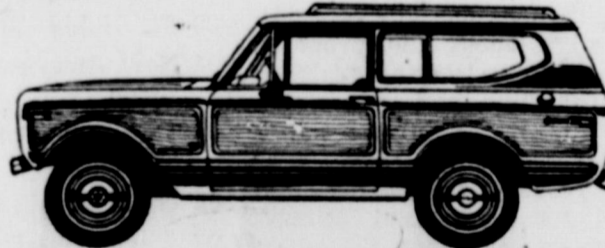

PARTY HONORS COUNTY SCHOOLS LIBRARIAN

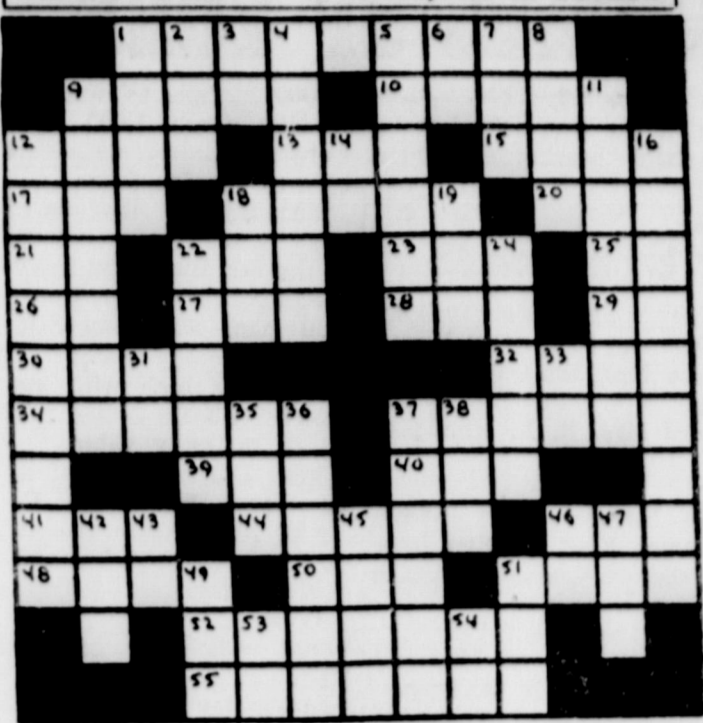

Low Volume Aerial Spray Effective Mesquite Control

Low volume aerial application of herbicides can cut costs and still be just as effective as standard dosages in controlling mesquite brush.

That conclusion came out of a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station project in which an estimated 30,000 acres were treated with 20 locations in the Rolling Plains, High Plains, Trans Pecos and South Texas.

C. H. Meadors of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Chillicothe-Vernon said the goal of the continuing research program is to combine economics with safer, more dependable brush control methods. The result should be better and cheaper forage production along with easier livestock handling.

The study so far has involved herbicide rate varying from 1-8 to 1 pound per acre in volumes of 1-8, 1/2 and 1 and 4 gallons an acre. Carriers have been oil-water emulsions, diesel oil, special oils and pre-packaged formulations.

Meadors said applications of 1/2-lb 2, 4, 5-T combinations of 2, 4, 5-T and picloram, and 2, 4, 5-T and dicamba, in 1 gallon of a 1 to 6 diesel oil-water emulsion have been as effective for mesquite control

as 1/2-pound of the herbicides in 4 gallons a 1 to 3 diesel oil-water emulsion per acre.

Low volume, low pressure aerial spray equipment was used in 42-foot swaths.

This low volume system is a reduction of 6 pints of diesel oil per acre and 18 pints of water per acre compared to conventional 4-gallon volumes, Meadors pointed out.

"It also means a 200-gallon load would treat 200 acres using 1 gallon an acre, whereas only 50 acres could be treated using 4 gallons per acre. This would appear to influence economics of brush control," he said.

Further Experiment Station research is aimed at developing more efficient low pressure spraying equipment, optimum swath widths, chemical formulations, carriers and more precision flagging.
