CC Riding Club To Meet Sunday

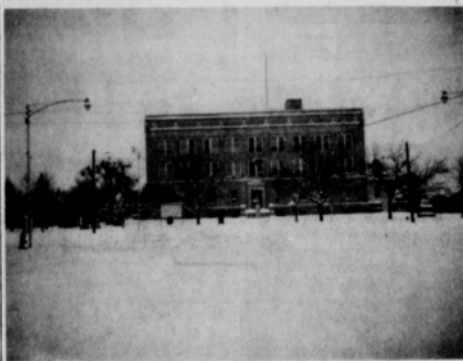

Nine Area Farmers Complete Conservation Practices Contracts

BAIRD — Nine landowners have completed Great Plains Conservation in the Baird Field office, according to Les Etherton, of the local Soil Conservation Service. The contracts expired December 31, 1972.

The contracts represent a wide variety of conservation practices which were applied to the land to reduce soil and water erosion while providing for a more stable farming and ranching operation. The practices included acres of brush control and grass seeding, miles of water pipelines, numerous ponds and wells, and two cross-fences to improve grazing management. These are but a few of

Former Baird Teacher Named Outstanding Elementary Teacher

GRAND PRAIRIE — Roberta Alice Ross, Remedial Reading Teacher, Shady Grove Elementary School, has been honored by her selection as an outstanding elementary teacher and appears in the 1972 edition of Outstanding Elementary Teachers of America.

More than nine thousand elementary teachers throughout the United States were selected to appear in this publication after being nominated by their principal or superintendent and screened by the Board of Editors. Some of the elements involving in making the selections include: contributions to their professional field; appreciation by the community for their contributions; published works; and civic endeavors.

Roberta Ross has taught in Baird from 1942 to 1962; in El Paso from 1963 to 1966; and in Grand Prairie Public Schools from 1967 to the present time. Her published works include: Wings of Thought, 1938; Over 40 Visual Aids for Teachers; Easy to Make, 1965; and Patriotic Visual Aids, 1969. She won the Freedom Foundations award in 1968.

Mrs. Ross is well known locally for her use of visual aids to assist in the teaching of remedial reading. At each holiday time her classroom will be surrounded with pictures and posters which brings the student into work projects which relate to the holiday but have a purpose in the learning process, Roberta states, "I never put up a poster without a purpose in mind." Bulletin boards which furnish work projects for students; games which help to develop the vocabulary; and awards for early completion of work are just some of the devices used to make the learning process seem like a game to the student while he is advancing his reading ability.

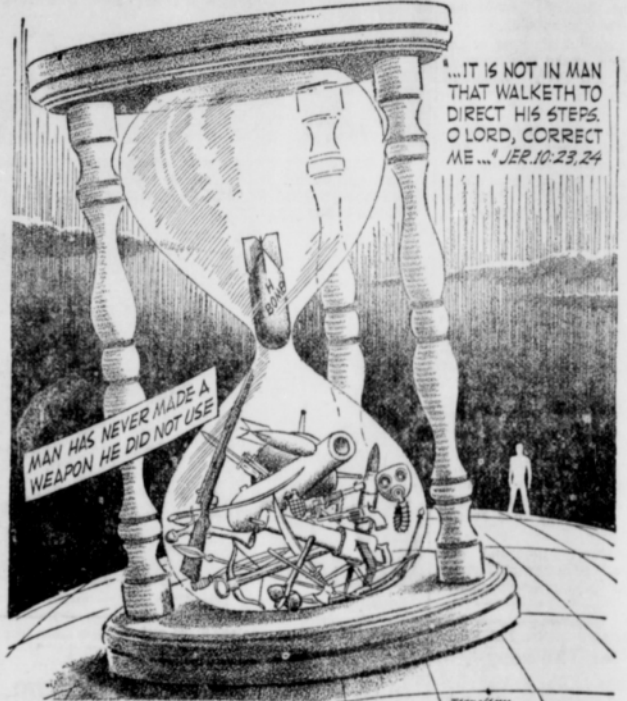

Farmer's Tax Guides Are Now Available at Co. Agent's Office

BAIRD — The new Farmer's Tax Guide is now available at the county Extension offices, announces County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross. The publication gives information on filing farm and ranch income tax returns.

Written in easily understood language, the guide gives a number of examples of completed forms.

Gerngross points out that the guide contains a new section on investment credit which explains what property qualifies, the amount of credit available, limitations, and how to complete credit on used property and recapture information.

The guide also has a chapter on credit for gasoline and fuels used on a farm for farming purposes. Another chapter deals with self-employment taxes for Social Security. It explains what income is and is not taxable for Social Security.

The tax guide is indexed so

producers can easily find information on specific subjects such as selling a farm, sale of breeding animals, depreciation, involuntary conversion and other topics.

Whether you have your return filed by a tax practitioner or do it yourself, Gerngross believes the new publication will be useful.

Callahan County Library Has Very Successful Year; New Books Added

BAIRD — Callahan County Library and Pioneer Museum, sponsored since 1937 by the Wednesday Club of Baird, has had a successful year.

Mrs. Rosa Ryan, librarian, reports that in 1972, 749 books were added. Of these, 76 were given in memory of Callahan County citizens, and the remainder were purchased or donated by interested friends.

The number of books now totals 12,677, and the number circulated was 5,369.

Memorial books given in the last two months to the Library are the following: The American Nation, a History of the United States, by John A. Garraty, given in memory of George Fred Walls of Baird.

In memory of Mrs. Laura Bell Swagerty of Throckmorton, who was the grandmother of Mrs. James Paul Shanks of Baird, is the title, The Road to Bithynia (a story based on the life of Luke), by Frank G. Slaughter.

Honoring the late Bill Windham of Baird, are five books: The New American Revolution, by Jean F. Revel; The Last Boom (a story of Texas oil) by J. Clark and M. Halbouty; After the Civil War, by John S. Blay; Harry S. Truman, a Biography by Margaret Truman; and Historic Sites of Texas, by June R. Welch.

In memory of W. J. (Jeff) Maltby of Baird, is the title Jimmy Doolittle, a Biography, by Carrol V. Gilnes.

One unusual feature of the Memorial Section is a collection of 325 books given by relatives and friends of the late Linda Dill of Baird, Miss Dill had carried on an extensive correspondence with pen pals in various

states and even in foreign lands. Upon her death in 1968, many of these honored her memory by sending books for adults and for children also. Most well-known authors of children's literature are represented in the collection.

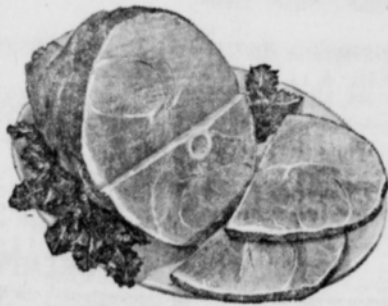

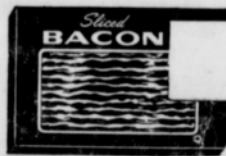
