## Old Settlers Attend Reunion Here Saturday

Callahan County pioneers got together for the annual Pioneer Reunion at the Callahan County Pioneer Reunion Center Saturday.

Approximately 700 to 800 old settlers from Callahan County and surrounding areas gathered for the large live oak trees and picnic grounds after a year's absence. The old settler gathering was held last year due to a lack of interest.

It was reported that more than 100 pioneers registered for the day, most of whom were given ribbons to commemorate their arrival in the county.

Birthdays were recognized and two pioneers came to the special emphasis. The pioneers sang happy birthday songs. Lewis Coppinger of Cotulla, who attended, but had his car due to recent repairs. Mrs. Mattie of Abilene was presented with a lovely birthday cake decorated with red roses by the wife of Tye.

There were several ceremonies. James Shanks of Baird, Randall of Abilene and M. M. of Clyde, supervising the morning session. After the invocation, which was a highlight of the day, G. of Abilene gave the invocation. Matt Cross Plains mayor, the oldest settler, and Wiley of Putnam responded. John Berry gave an address in tribute to deceased pioneers.

After lunch, the afternoon session began at 2 o'clock. Three masters of ceremonies introduced and recognized pioneers in several different categories and presented them with certificates.

John Berry, the oldest settler in the county, was presented with a certificate by the first Callahan County Pioneer Reunion.

Purvis of Cross Plains was recognized as the earlier

pioneer man, arriving in Callahan in 1884.

Mrs. H. D. Driskill of Baird won two ribbons. She was honored as the earliest pioneer woman and the earliest pioneer woman with continuous residence in the county. She came to the county in 1889.

J. P. (Perry) Purvis of Cross Plains was also recognized twice. He was born in 1888 therefore being the oldest native born man with continuous residence in the county and the earliest pioneer man with continuous residence in the county.

W. O. Peevy of Cisco was the oldest native born man, 1887.

Mrs. V. E. Hill of Baird was also a double winner. She was recognized as the oldest native born woman in the county and the oldest native born woman with continuous residence in the county. She was born in 1893.

Mr. and Mrs. Raymond McCowan each won a ribbon for man and woman coming the greatest distance to attend the reunion. They live in San Diego, Calif.

Mr. and Mrs. J. P. Smedley of Baird were recognized as being the oldest married couple. They came to Callahan as man and wife in 1916.

Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Franke of Cross Plains was honored as the couple married longest with continuous residence in county. That year was 1920.

The following officers were elected to serve for the ensuing year: James Paul Shanks of Baird, re-elected as president; Burris Miller of Eula, first vice-president; Ben Atwood of Cross Plains, second vice-president; Wendell Smith of Abilene, third vice-president; and Mrs. Mike (Maggie) Cook of Baird, re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The reunion was concluded with old time dancing with exhibitors given by a group of (Continued on Page 8)

Classes will begin daily at 8:25 a.m., and the dismissal bell will ring at 3:38 p.m. Students enrolled in vocational

### Survey Shows Standard Of Living High In Callahan

How high is the standard of living in Callahan County?

How much have local residents been spending annually for big-ticket items such as cars, washing machines, dishwashers, furniture, carpeting and the like?

Some idea of the amount of money that has been going for such equipment may be gleaned from a new government study.

It is based upon data gathered from all areas of the country through a sampling survey conducted by the Department of Commerce.

The purpose was to determine just how much of the average family's income, locally and elsewhere, went for such durables in the five years ending January, 1973.

In Callahan County, according to these and other figures, it was a period of rising incomes and bigger spending. Families were upgrading their way of life, buying better homes, more expensive cars and spending more for household equipment and leisure-time pursuits than ever before.

With the purchasing power at their command, their outlay for durable goods in the five years averaged approximately \$4,419 per household, based upon the overall survey findings and upon local income and spending data.

This compares with \$4,319 per family in the United States and with \$4,125 in the Southern States.

Of the total, some \$3,077 was spent for new and used cars.

Furniture took another \$413 per local family, color television sets, \$194, and refrigerators and freezers, \$109.

The rest went for air conditioners, washing machines, clothes dryers, kitchen ranges, dishwashers and the like.

The enormity of the car market is indicated by the figures in the government report, which show that families throughout the United States spent no less than \$125 billion in the five years in the purchase of 40 million new cars and another

\$67 billion for 68 million used cars.

By way of comparison, all the 13 other kinds of durables covered in the survey totaled only \$83 billion.

Annually, on the average, one family out of eight bought a new car during the period and slightly more than one out of five bought a used car.

The exact nature of his illness is not known by the Review. He is in Room A-7.

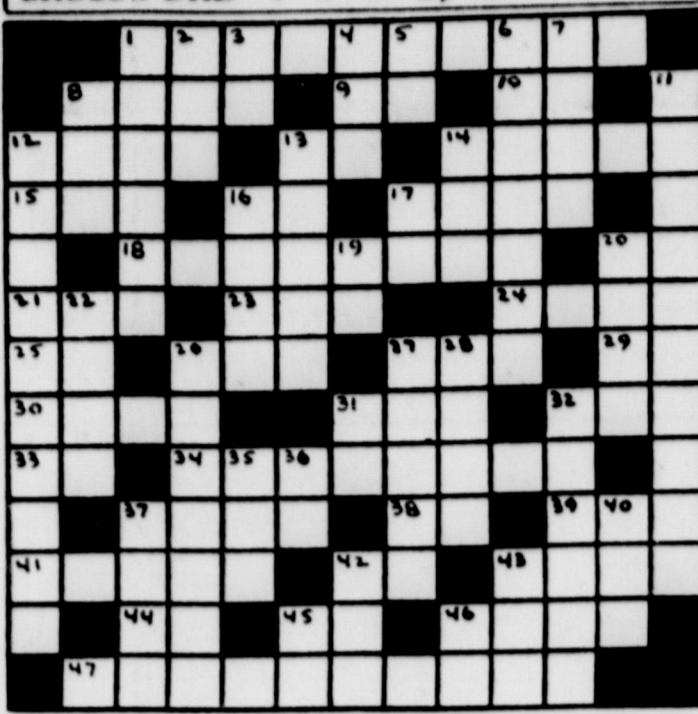
### DEEP WILDCAT OIL TEST SET EAST OF PUTNAM

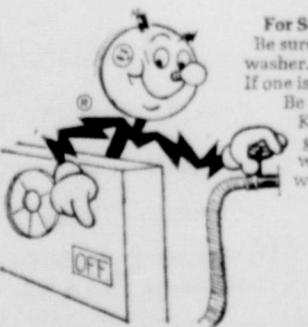

## County's Food, Auto Stores Show Sales Gains

How are residents of Callahan County using the bigger incomes they are now receiving? How much of it are they spending per year in local retail stores?

According to figures for the past year, which have just become available through a new market study, consumer outlays for goods and services were at a high level locally. To a great extent, however, it was a reflection of higher prices.

The findings are contained in a survey made by the Standard Rate and Data Service. It shows how the average family in each part of the country has been spending its money and how much of it has been going for food, clothing, household equipment, cars and other articles.

In Callahan County, food was a major item. Approximately 25 cents of every dollar was spent in the area's supermarkets, butcher shops, bakeries, grocery stores, delicatessens and the like.

Elsewhere in the United States, 21 cents went for food and, in the State of Texas, 20 cents.

The report shows that expenditures in local food stores in the year came to \$3,572,000, as compared with the previous year's total of \$2,999,000.

This was solely for food bought for home consumption. Not included was the sum spent in restaurants, at lunch counters and in other dine and drink places.

If the outlay for take-home food were to be divided equally among all local families, each of them would have a bill of \$1,116 for the year.

The figure for other retail lines indicate relatively strong consumer buying locally.

Outlets for cars, motorcycles, trailers, boats and other automotive equipment had receipts totaling \$3,670,000, as against the previous year's \$3,013,000.

Sales of general merchandise, in variety and department stores, came to \$759,000. In 1972 it was \$645,000.

Stores carrying coats, dresses, shoes, hats and other wearing apparel reported a sales volume of \$212,000 compared with the prior \$187,000.

Furniture stores, including those selling home furnishings and appliances, accounted for \$301,600. Their total, a year earlier, was \$256,000.

Eastland County Regular Field has gained a new well in the area two miles north of Pioneer.

The oiler is George L. Buckles Co. of Monahans No. 1 Jackson, 2,272 feet from the north and 1,659 feet from the east lines of Thomas Benson Survey A-21.

Daily potential was 14 barrels of 40 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water. It is pumping

from perforations at 2,528-46 feet, treated with 3,000 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 5 1/2 inch casing at 2,528 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 2,560 feet and plugged back to 2,546 feet.

The well is producing from the Caddo.
