Planning Continues For Re-Districting Of County

Callahan County Commissioners and the appointed Citizens Advisory Committee are continuing work on a proposed re-districting of County Commissioner Precinct lines in compliance with the one man, one vote court ruling.

The commissioners and committee met at Baird Monday, but did not attempt to make a decision on setting precinct

boundaries.

Both groups will meet again on September 23. In the meantime commissioners and committee members will attempt to get an accurate count on rural voters and population, as well as voter and resident count within the towns of the county.

It was explained by County Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr. that an attempt is being made to set

the lines of the four precincts in accordance with both population and registered voter counts. That would mean about 1,300 registered voters in each precinct and an estimated 2,000 to 2,500 persons in each subdivision, according to figures presently available.

It was also explained that the Texas Attorney General's office in Austin advised the

Callahan Commissioners that no definite ruling had been handed down by the Supreme Court as to whether precinct lines should be drawn according to registered voters or population.

Judge Dyer said that Callahan's new lines will take into consideration both aspects, that is voters and population. He also noted that the variance in the precincts must be under 10 per cent of population.

The judge added that the commissioners are hoping that when the population estimates are made in the next two weeks, that voter and population ratios will average to an acceptable proportion. He said that commissioners are assuming that a family unit in Callahan averages about three and one-half persons.

"At the present time we are trying to make close divisions of precincts on registered voters, which is an easier task," Judge Dyer explained. He added that an effort is being made to re-draw the commissioner precinct lines so they will not have to be moved for several years.

Presently the lines as explained last week seem to be fairly close, the judge pointed out, but changes may have to be made. "We now believe that the new lines will be finalized close to the proposed set-up," Judge Dyer explained. He added that the lines are now subject to adjustment as they will be when needed in future years.

The Citizens Advisory Committee is composed of Jack Scott of Cross Plains, Frank Chrane of Oplin, John D. Isenhower of Putnam and Weldon Edwards of Clyde.

Precinct 4 would be changed little under the redistricting proposal. It would simply be enlarged westward a few miles, to Highway 283, and take in the entire Rowden community.

The county now is divided into the following precincts: Baird, Clyde and Eula, Precinct 1; Adair and Putnam Precinct 2; Rowden, Cross Plains, Atwell and Cottonwood, Precinct 4, and Oplin, Dudley and Denton Valley, Precinct 3.

Proposed changes would be generally to make Clyde and Hamby Precinct 1; Baird, Putnam and portions of Adair, Precinct 2; Cross Plains, Rowden, Cottonwood, Atwell and part of Adair, Precinct 4; and Oplin, Eula, Denton Valley and Dudley, Precinct 3.

Richland Springs Due Here Friday

Buffaloes of Cross Plains High School will attempt to win number two of the young season Friday night as the District 6-B Richland Springs Coyotes come here for an 8 p.m. contest.

It is reported that the Coyotes, rated third in the west zone of 6-B behind powerful Eden and Rising Star, will be much stronger than the 3-7 team of 1973. Richland Springs has 19 lettermen returning with six offensive and seven defensive starters back. The Coyotes defeated Salado 36-14 last week.

Buffalo Head Coach Sam McBrierty said this week, "They are a balanced ball club, loaded with experience, and they will not be taken lightly by us (the Buffaloes)."

The Coyotes have an outstanding runner in big Fullback Kenneth Rankin who won all-district honors last year. Adding to the experience laden Coyotes are senior tackle Red Gibson, 190 pounds, junior tailback Jerry Willburn, 170, and several good linemen.

After a slow start, the Coyotes became stronger as the year progressed, making a 3-3 showing in the tough District 6-B competition.

Buffals came out of the Wylie scruff in good physical condition with only minor bruises, and McBrierty said that he hoped all starters would be ready for Friday.

City Street Coating Project Is Expanded

The seal coating project of selected already paved streets in Cross Plains has been expanded to include all hard surface city roads within the township.

Mayor Jack Scott announced the council's decision to coat all the streets with a coat of hot asphalt and gravel last week. He pointed out that it is believed that a saving of several thousand dollars can be made by coating all paved city streets at this time, due to projected rising costs in the next year or two.

The entire project is expected to run in the neighborhood of \$28,000. The project will be about 90 per cent funded by federal revenue sharing funds, about half of which is already on hand.

Schwartz Construction Co. of Comanche was low bidder on the initial project and will complete the expanded project. The work is expected to be finished in about two weeks.

Buffaloes Whip Bulldogs 19-0 In Football Opener

Cross Plains Buffaloes put it all together in the second half Friday night for a 19-0 win over the visiting Wylie Bulldogs in the 1974 football season opener.

The Herd used ground ball control, spiced with an occasional aerial, and a tough defense when required for the season opening triumph under new coaching staff.

Cross Plains gained 308 yards rushing and another 60-odd yards passing en route to 33 first downs. Although Wylie appeared to have an adequate attack, the Bulldogs netted only four first downs most of which came on completed passes.

The 0-0 standoff which resulted in the first half was aided by turnovers on both sides. About mid-way of the first quarter Bulldog Bernie Strickland intercepted an errant Buff pass, but four plays later Buff Nickerson recovered a Wylie fumble. Neither team seriously threatened in the initial canto although the Herd moved into Wylie territory on short drives on each of its three possession.

The second period started on a somber note as Bulldog Gary Harris covered a bobbled punt by Buff Randy Hunter at the Herd's 18. Two running plays and a five yard penalty moved the pigskin to the Buffalo six. Following a five yard violation against Wylie, Buff Tim Bishop smothered a Wylie fumble

at the Herd's 15. From that point the Bisons drove to the visitors' 17 in 15 plays before surrendering the ball on downs.

In the waning seconds of the first half Bulldog Russell Denny stole a Buff pass returning it 10 yards to the Herd's 34. Two completions in three tries moved the ball to the Bison 20. On the last play of the first half Buff Greg Turner deflected a pass in the end zone.

After a brief offensive flurry following the second half kickoff, the Wylie attack was stilled by Herd defenders. That short-lived thrust moved from the Bulldog 36 to the Herd's 37 before a punt was forced.

Buffals took possession on their own nine and moved the 91 yards to paydirt in 11 plays, aided by two 15-yard penalties against the Bulldogs.

Halfback Randy Pancake scored the season's first touchdown over his right side from the five with 4:05 left in the third quarter. Bishops kick was good, but was nullified by a violation. His second attempt hit the cross-bar of the goalpost and fell back no good.

An effective Wylie effort was followed by a punt late in the third period, and from the Buffalo 47 Cross Plains began its second one goalward march. Four running plays moved the ball 21 yards and a 15-yard penalty against Wylie set the

ball deeper in Bulldog territory. Wylie defense stiffened, and it was fourth down before Bishop got a first on the Wylie 12.

Two plays by Halfback Rex Beggs and Quarterback Greg Turner netted six, but Turner then was spalled for a six-yard loss. On fourth down Turner found Split End in the left flat with a pass for the tally with 9:42 left in the final quarter. Bishops kick was blocked for a 12-0 Buffalo lead.

The Herd then took a Wylie punt on the Buff 28 and moved the 72 yards in 14 plays, all on the ground, for the final touchdown with 45 seconds left in the game. Halfback Beggs got the tally on a 21-yard romp off tackle. Bishop's kick split the upright for the final 19-0 score.

Rushing yardage as compiled by Buff statisticians showed Pancake with 96 yards, Hunter 86, Turner 41, Beggs 40, Fullback Jimmy Bates 37 and Bishop 8.

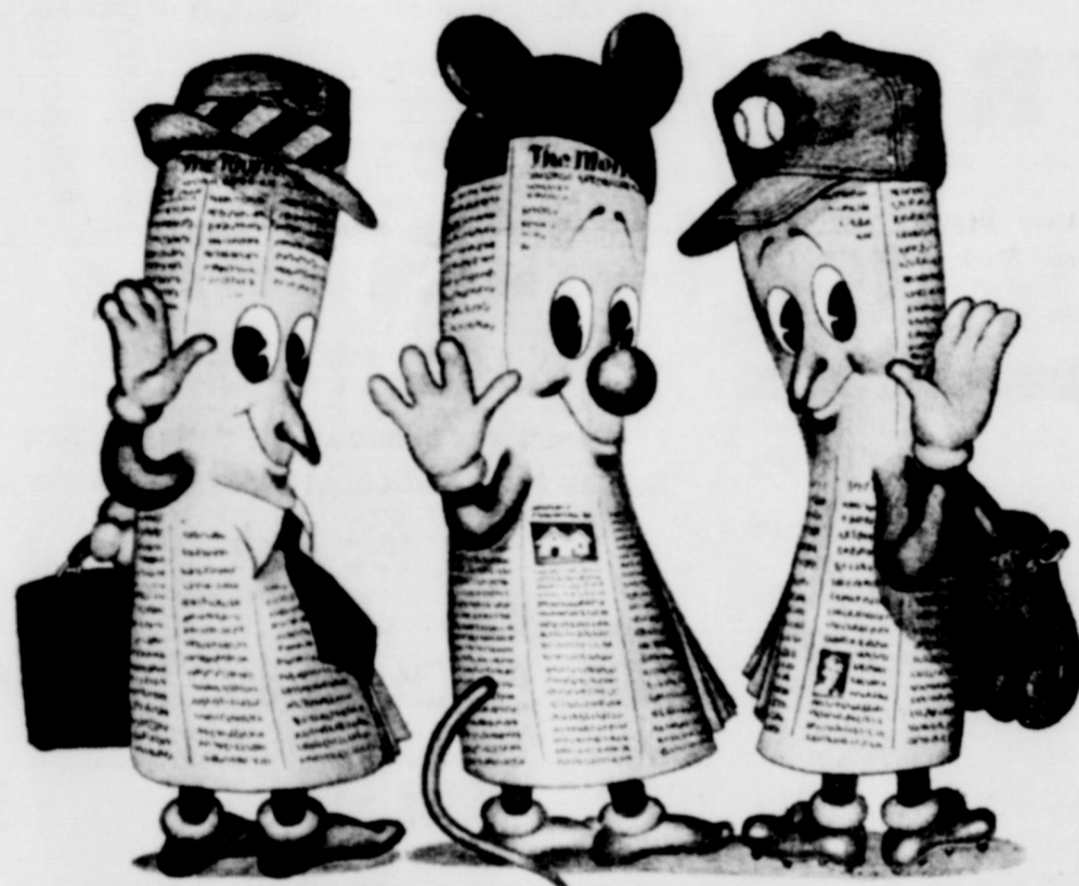

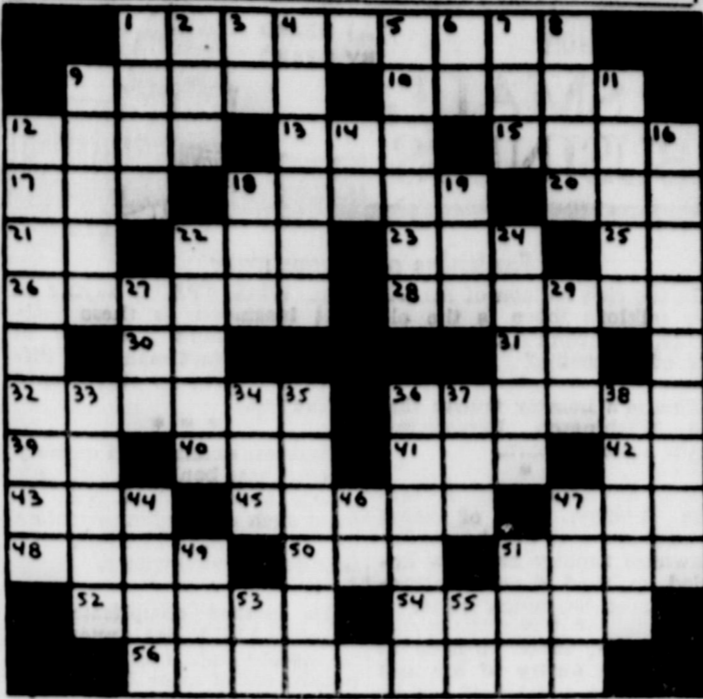
