ASCS Committee Election Explained By Director

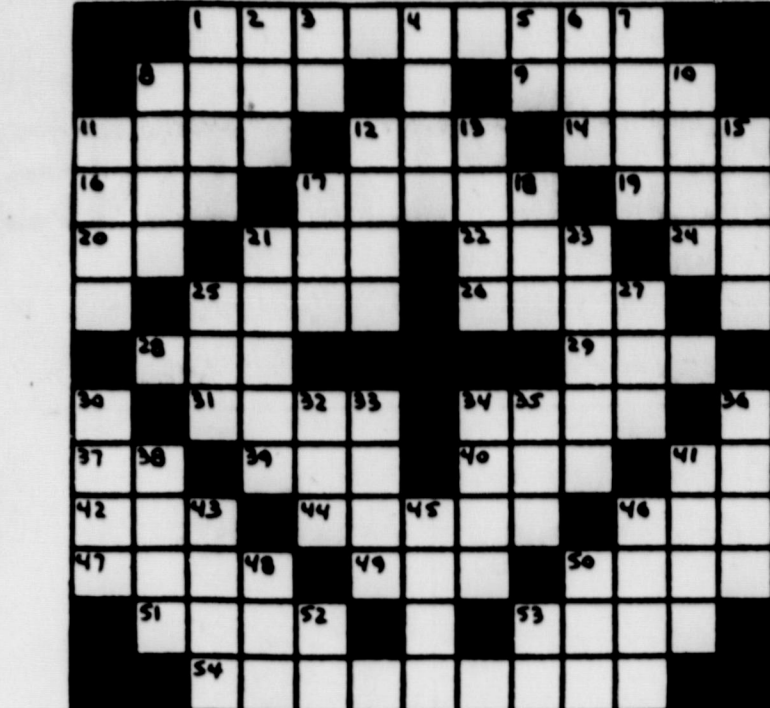

NORTHWEST CLYDE SECTOR GETS FLIPPEN FIELD WELL

A well has been completed 4 1/2 miles northwest of Clyde in the Dyer (Flippen) Field.

The oiler is Estoril Producing Corp. of Abilene No. 5-B A. E. Dyer. Site is 150 feet from the south and 784 feet from the west lines of Section 55, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 13 barrels of 45 gravity oil, plus 60 barrels of water, it is pumping from perforations at 1,682-86 feet, fractured with 50 sacks of sand and 170 barrels of salt water.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,715 feet, total depth.

Food Stamp Program Changes Proposed

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today proposed amendments to food stamp program regulations which provide permanent procedures for retroactively restoring a household's benefits wrongfully, delayed or terminated through administrative error. Since January 1974, interim procedures have been in effect.

In the proposed regulations USDA asks comments on three methods for restoring lost benefits. All of the methods involve offsetting the householder's purchase requirement with the lost benefit entitlement.

The proposed regulations differ from the interim procedures in these areas.

Recipients can receive lost benefits without going through the fair hearing process if the client, food stamp caseworker, and supervisor agree.

Lost benefits will be restored only for the 12 months preceding the discovery of the error.

Recipients lost benefits will be reduced by the amount of any outstanding claims against them.

Require a standard format for the authorization to purchase card.

Make the administering state agencies liable when their failure to cooperate with USDA has resulted in an adverse court decision.

The proposed regulations are scheduled for publication in the Federal Register on Monday, September 30. Written comments may be mailed or delivered to Royal Shipp, Acting Director, Food Stamp Division, Food and Nutrition Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington D. C. 20250. Comments must be received by October 30, and will be open to public inspection.
