Reduced Cost School Meal Program Begun

A reduced price program on meals served at Cross Plains schools was begun October 1, according to an announcement by Frank Rundell, superintendent.

It was noted that the program is state funded, and considerable savings are available to a family which qualifies. Price of lunch under the program is 20 cents and 10 cents for breakfast. Regular cost of lunch is 60 cents for grades 6-12, 50 cents for grades 4 and 5 and 45 cents for kindergarten through third grade.

Supt. Rundell explained that families who can qualify may secure forms at offices of the principals.

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Cross Plains Area United Fund was still \$44.23 short of the budgeted \$3,300 at mid-morning Tuesday, but officials opined that the goal would be reached in a few more days.

Total donations received to mid-morning Tuesday amounted to \$2,855.77, according to a report from employees of the Cit-

izens State Bank who are keeping track of amounts for the United Fund.

Mrs. Veda DeBusk, chairman of this year's campaign, and her assistant, Mrs. Vera Baum, both voiced the opinion that the goal would be reached, but emphasized to volunteer workers to keep on the job until the goal is achieved. Mrs. DeBusk stated, "We must not give up until our budget is achieved."

John Pruet, president of the local United Fund, echoed the sentiment of the ladies. He noted that with the good start and larger than expected amount received early, it would be easy

to relax and not reach the required total.

Pruet, Mrs. DeBusk and Mrs. Baum expressed sincere appreciation to each person who gave so generously of time and money during the first few days of the drive. Pruet emphasized that without the wonderful cooperation of all persons working in the campaign and especially the ladies who make the door-to-door canvass, re-arranging schedules and letting other things go to help, a successful drive would be impossible.

Mrs. DeBusk pointed out that some persons may have been missed by workers the first day. Many workers are making return calls, and it was thought that some workers had not reported total receipts by Tuesday, which would boost total receipts.

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Late De Leon Scores Dump Herd 14-0 In 10-A Opener

It took more than three quarters for the high-gear De Leon Bearcat offense to overcome a stout Cross Plains Buffalo defense last Friday night in District 10-A opener for both teams in De Leon.

The fourth quarter touchdowns finally spelled doom for the Herd which entered the contest the underdog in minds of most everyone except the Bisons.

The first half featured little excitement offensively. De Leon earned only four first downs and netted 58 yards rushing in the first 24 minutes of play. Cross Plains had two first downs and 36 yards on the ground. The first quarter also featured lost fumbles.

The third quarter belonged to De Leon, moving the ball well, but being unable to crack the still strong Bison defense. An attempted De Leon field goal in that canto was the closest to a score to that point in the game.

During the contest the Herd defense stopped the potent Bearcat offense three times inside the Buff 20-yard line.

Cross Plains could not generate a sustained offense the entire game, and in the third stanza had bad field position. De Leon played a ball control game, converting on several key third and fourth down situations.

Final statistics point out the De Leon superiority in the second half. The Bearcats finished the game with 13 first downs to three for Buffaloes. The hosts gained almost 100 yards

on the ground in the second half for a total of 155 to just 51 for the Bisons. The passing game also favored the Bearcats, gaining 56 yards to three for the Buffaloes. De Leon intercepted two of five Buff aerials, one set up the final touchdown.

With eight minutes left in the fourth period, Bearcat Quarterback Craig Smith, starting signal caller who had been injured the week before and was used sparingly until this point, threw a perfect strike to Split-End Marney Wilkerson for a 34-yard tally. Toby Hare added the extra point after for a 7-0 score.

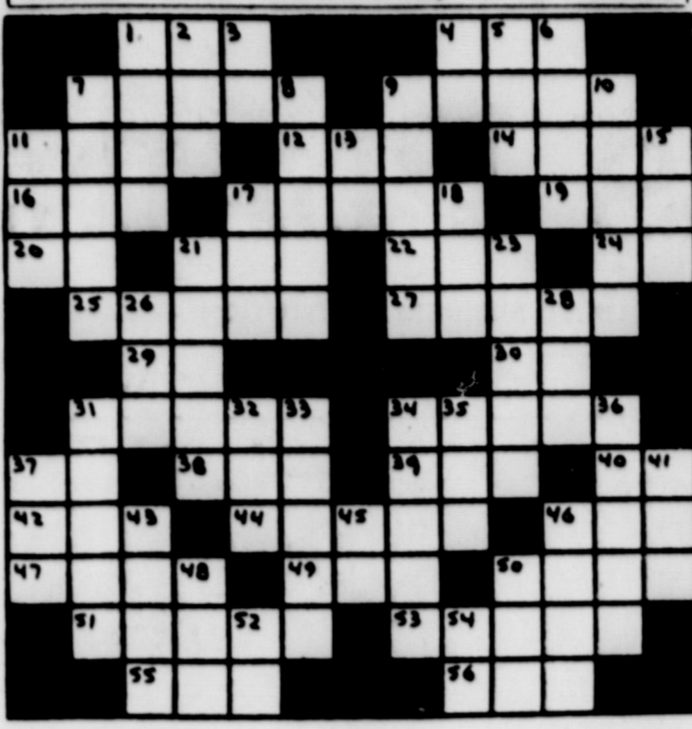
LUKE WESTERMAN SAID SOMEWHAT IMPROVED

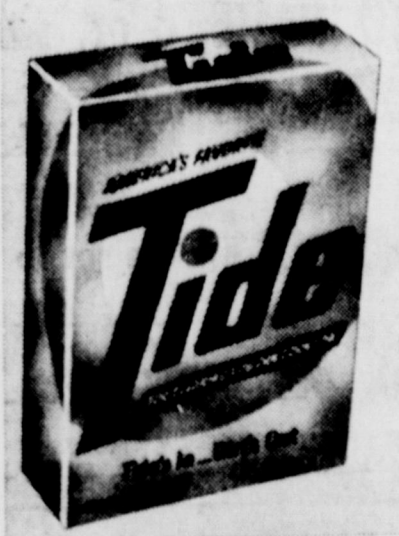

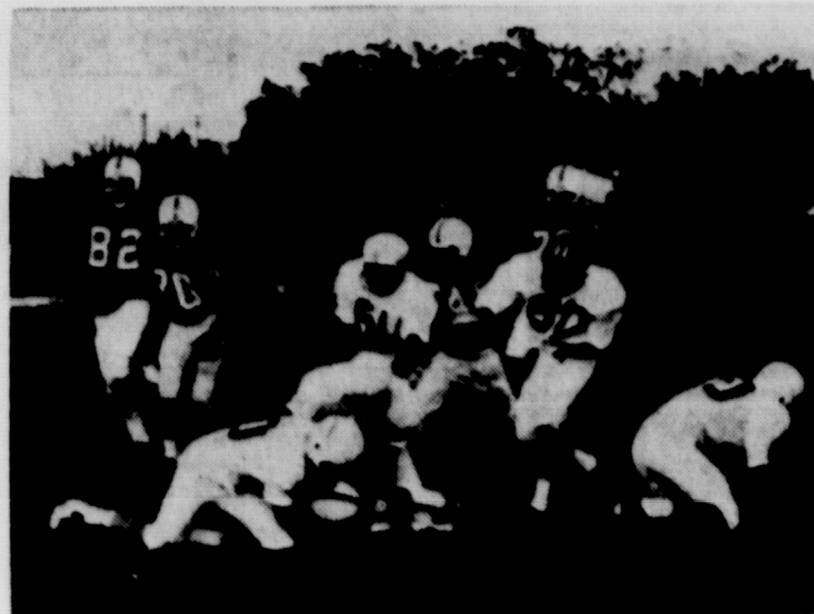
LADY KNOWN LOCALLY HAS MAJOR SURGERY

Absentee Vote Dates, Rules Are Revealed

Secretary of State Mark W. White, Jr., has announced that all voters wishing to cast an absentee ballot for the November 5 General Election may do so beginning October 16. According to Secretary White, the proper absentee voting procedure will depend upon each individual voter's situation.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence only on the day of the election may vote by personal appearance during regular office hours at the county clerk's office. In Callahan County that is in the courthouse at Baird.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence both during the time for voting by personal appearance and on election day can make application to their county clerk requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed to them at an address outside the county.

In addition, those persons residing within the county but unable to vote on election day due to sickness within the county but unable to vote on election day due to sickness, physical disability, religious belief, or incarceration for less than a felony, can also make application to their county clerk requesting an absentee ballot by mail.

White noted that the absentee voting period for the November 5 General Election will continue through Friday, Nov. 1.

White Grubs May Damage Small Grains

Producers planning to plant small grains when fields dry up, should check the soil for the presence of the "C" shaped white grubs according to Greg Gerngross, County Agent of Callahan County, of Baird.

The white grub caused varying amounts of damage last year and could be a possible problem this season. According to Area Entomologist Mike McWhorter, "The only sure method of determining if a potential white grub problem exists in a field is to take soil samples in several areas of the intended small grain acreage." One square foot samples should be taken and if an average of two or more white grubs per square foot of soil are found, then a preplant, incorporated insecticide application will probably be economically justified. Granular or liquid applications of diazinon have proven effective for white grub control when incorporated in the upper three to five inches of top soil.
