Local Students Listed On School's First Honor Roster

Twenty students in Cross Plains earned places on the honor roll for the first six weeks of the 1974-75 school year. The list of elite pupils was announced Monday by Scot H. Boyle, elementary school principal.

To earn a spot on the honor roll a student must have a grade average of 90 or better in all classes during the first six weeks of the school year.

Classroom stars for the first six weeks period represent over 19 per cent of the enrollment of 428 students.

The reported 27 honor students in the four high schools are:

Buffaloes Take Rest From Gridiron Wars

Buffaloes of Cross Plains High School will take the upcoming week end off from gridiron action.

Next game for the Herd will be Friday, Oct. 25, when the Dublin Lions will invade Buffalo Stadium in a District 10-A contest.

Through six contests the Thundering Herd has compiled a season record of 3-2-1. All three wins have come on the home field. In two District 10-A clashes Bisons are 1-1, having opened the league warfare with a 14-0 loss to strong De Leon and last week having ripped Goldthwaite 39-0.

Herd Thumps Goldthwaite

Cross Plains Buffaloes got it all together last Friday and 'thundered' past District 10-A rival Goldthwaite Eagles 39-0.

A stout defense complimented a high-geared offense which, according to individual statistics, romped for 565 yards on the ground. It was the most powerful showing the Herd has made this year.

Buffaloes recorded 23 first downs, and the visiting Eagles got 11. Goldthwaite also got 110 yards on the ground and 62 through the air. Bisons kept mistakes at a minimum, while Buffs made several breaks and took advantage of most of them.

The win puts the Bison season record at 3-2-1 in six games. The Herd is 1-1 in District 10-A action.

Buffaloes gained a 13-0 first quarter advantage, scoring on first two possessions.

Goldthwaite took the opening kick and after a first down punted. From the Herd's 22 Cross Plains marched 58 yards in seven plays with Fullback Jimmy Bates galloping the final 25 yards over his left side. Tim Bishop's kick was wide, but Buffs owned a 6-0 edge at mid-point of the first stanza.

Goldthwaite began a determined counter attack which carried 55 yards to the Buff 1' before Buff Lynn Tatom recovered an Eagle fumble. Bates got three yards and Halfback Rex Beggs gained eight to the 25. From that point Quarterback Greg Turner circled right end for 75 yards, crossing the goal-

line with nine seconds left in the first quarter Bishop's placement kick was true for a 13-0 tally.

Cross Plains again went to the attack after Halfback Randy Hunter returned a punt about 20 yards to midfield. The Herd drove to the Goldthwaite six when Bishops field goal attempt was off to the right.

Goldthwaite again gave Cross Plains possession later in the second period when Buff Joe Simpson covered an Eagle fumble at the Goldthwaite 42. It took the Herd eight plays, aided by a seven yard penalty against the Eagles to hit paydirt. Bates got the last two yards over the right side with 1:20 left in the first half. Bishop's kick was true for a 26-0 lead.

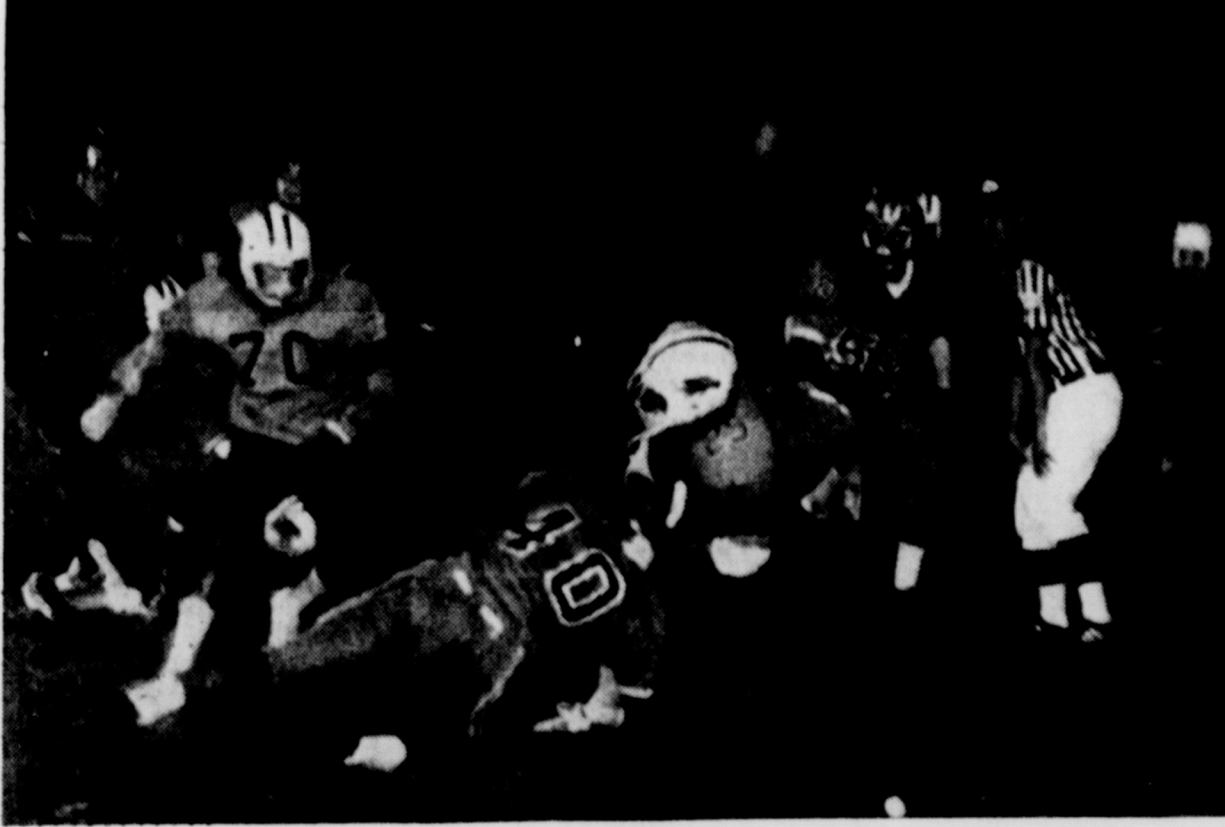
Finalizing of the lines require a tremendous amount of work by various offices he pointed out. He noted that cross-county district division lines will be made along section-

Heavy Rains Fall In Area

Heavy rains fell over the Cross Plains area beginning late afternoon and extending through most of Monday. Rainfall began in Cross Plains with a Spring-like downpour but the moisture tapered to a Winter-like type rain Tuesday night and Monday. Cool showers also accompanied the rain.

Top rainfall totals in the area were at Burkett where 4.25 inches were recorded. The Cross Plains community got about four inches.

Most other sections averaged over three inches. Cottonwood averaged about 3.70 inches as did one point in Pioneer and the Lake Brownwood area. Alton Tatom at Atwell measured 3.10 inches, and the Rowden sector reported over three inches. About three inches also fell in the Sabanno locality.

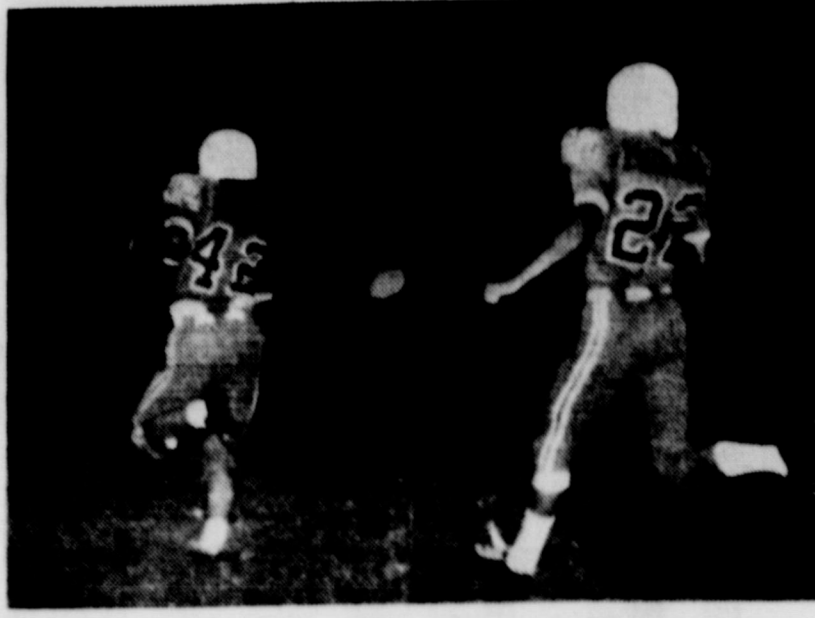

Baird Jury Assesses Man 10-Year Term

A 42nd District Court Jury set a maximum, 10-year prison term and recommended probation for a young San Antonio man who pleaded guilty to felony cattle theft charges at Baird Thursday.

William Samuel Kinsler, 20, wasn't released from custody immediately, however, as he faces similar stock theft charges in two other counties, as well as charges of being AWOL (absent without leave) from the Army at Fort Hood.

Kinsler was returned to Callahan County Jail, where he has been held for eight months, following the trial. Callahan County Sheriff Grayson Miller indicated that Kinsler will be transferred soon to either Bell County (Belton) or Atascosa County (Jourdanton).

A second man, Sammy Garcia, 30, of San Marcos, had been slated to stand trial with Kinsler Thursday, but Judge Don Lane postponed Garcia's trial for two weeks when Kinsler decided to change his plea to guilty.

The two were charged with the Feb. 10 theft of a 700-pound heifer from the Warren Price ranch in the Rowden Community. Price and Miller testified that a lock on a gate had been broken to allow someone access to the cattle.

Kinsler later admitted that he lured the heifer into a pen with a sack of feed, then took the animal to Marlin and sold it at a livestock auction for \$331. Kinsler said he got only \$40 of the money.

Under cross-examination by Criminal Dist. Atty. Ed Paynter, Kinsler admitted that he had made two trips to Abilene to sell cattle stolen in Bell County at two Abilene auction companies.

He also told of stealing a horse trailer and two saddles in Atascosa County.

Judge Lane instructed jurors to set Kinsler's punishment at two to 10 years in prison and to recommend or deny probation.
