Bank Robbers Caught 15 Minutes After Holdup

Local Bank Robbed By Youth Tuesday

Buff Ax Bangs; Post Best Mark In 18 Years

Cross Plains Buffaloes defeated the Buffaloes 13-6 in the football finale last Friday.

Capturing the District 10-A title in the 1974 Thundering Bisons was the best season of any group of Bisons since 1956 when that team was the head coach pointed out. "they displayed great team leadership."

In the 1974 season finale at Bangs Friday the Herd jumped to a quick 13-0 advantage in the first quarter. Bangs then changed the defense, and severely slowed the Buff attack.

Halfback Randy Pancake scored both Buffalo touchdowns, which came on the Herd's first possessions.

Pancake got the first score on a one-yard blast, and galloped 28 yards for the second. Tim Bishop added one bonus point from placement.

The lone Bangs tally came in the final canto when Dragon Charlie Smith blocked an attempted Greg Turner punt, and teammate Ron Young picked up the ball running 22 yards to score.

McBrierty said that the Buffalo offense was hampered by its inability to pass successfully after Bangs changed its defense in the second quarter. Buffs counted three penetrator to one for the hosts, and made 10 first downs to eight for Bangs.

The Dragons did not move the ball well against the Herd at any time. McBrierty praised the Bisons secondary and said that the line also did a fine job. Lynn Tatom was the Buffs' leading defender.

Bobby E. Johnston Wins Pearl Award

Bobby Earl Johnston of Weatherford, formerly of Cross Plains who is representative with Combined American Insurance Company of Dallas, has received an award for outstanding sales and service to the public.

Johnston, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Johnston of Cross Plains, lived with his family, his wife, the former Clovis Norris, and little daughter, Jami, in Cross Plains until a few months ago when they moved to Weatherford.

John Keefe, regional sales manager, said Johnston won the Pearl Award in the W. Clement Stone International Sale and Management Achievement Club. The international club is named after the company's founder and board chairman.

Combined American is a subsidiary of the Combined Insurance Company of America and specializes in accident, health, income protection and life insurance. Last year the group paid benefits in excess of \$96,000,000.

The group is unusual in that the needs of customers are under constant review, with representatives calling personally on policyholders at least every six months to provide individual service. A lone, shotgun wielding youth robbed Citizens State Bank in Cross Plains of an undetermined amount of cash Tuesday about 10:15 a.m.

The money, thought to be several thousand dollars, was recovered when two youths were apprehended about 15 minutes later just west of Rowden, 12 miles west of Cross Plains, just off State Highway 36.

Charged with "bank robbery" in the heist were Danny Lee Wise, thought to be from Santa Anna, and Doyle Wayne Howe believed to be from Calloway. It was thought by local lawmen that Howe was visiting Wise.

The two were charged in L. P. (Pender) Mitchell's justice court in Cross Plains. Mitchell set bonds at \$25,000 each.

The two, believed to be 18 and 19 years old, were taken to Baird by Jack Shields, an Abilene Department of Public Safety Patrolman, and C. S. (Hoot) McGowen, Cross Plains City Marshall, where they were lodged in Callahan County jail.

Actual apprehension of the robbers was made by several License and Weight DPS patrolmen, among who was Mack Kniffen of Clyde, who were en route to Temple for a funeral.

Local lawmen related the arrest of the robbers as follows: An unmarked license, weight patrol car met a red Mustang traveling extremely fast near Rowden. The patrolmen turned to pursue and as they did received word on the police radio that the Cross Plains bank had been robbed. A second black and white patrol car was following, and apparently the robbers tried to turn off Highway 36 upon seeing the second unit. As the robbers turned left onto the dirt road just west of Rowden store, the get-away car skidded into the ditch and became stuck.

The robbers offered no resistance to the officers.

At the time of the robbery all Cross Plains lawmen were in Baird, and when the radio alert was sounded DPS Patrolman Don Gosnell, Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox and Marshall McGowen were just leaving Baird. They were on the scene in a matter of minutes.

Between 10 and 10:15 a.m. the gunman, Wise, stepped through the side door at the Citizens State Bank, with 12-gauge shotgun pointed forward, saying, "This is a holdup. I want all your money."

Leonard Mosley, vice-president of the bank, was standing near the side door, but behind teller cages. He began taking the money from the tellers.

The robber, using profane language and making threats to kill if his instructions were not followed, told Mosley to put the money in a sack. Mosley replied, "We don't have a sack but I'll put it in this typewriter cover."

Upon cleaning the teller cages, the gunman, reported to be noticeably very nervous, told Mosley to get the money from the vault. Dick Wagner, cashier, went into the vault. After Mosley got into the vault he activated the silent alarm.

Upon returning from the vault, Mosley said, "Here it is!"

He demanded it be put on the floor, which Mosley did. The robber then demanded that Mosley, Wagner, Ted Souder and another bank employee, Mrs. J. H. (Vida) Balkum go into the vault and told Mrs. Clyde (Ethel) Sims to shut the door. Mosley shut inside doors and immediately called the Justice of the Peace office.

Mitchell immediately called the Abilene Department of Public Safety in Abilene to radio the alert.

Bank President Jack W. Tunnell ran out the front door to get a description of the get-away car as the robber left through the side door.

Description of a red Mustang was given over the DPS radio and the capture soon followed.

Tunnell and Mosley both commended the bank employees for their actions during the holdup which lasted five to 10 minutes.

Three customers were in the bank when the gunman entered, they are Mrs. J. H. Bradford, at the check counter near the gunman, Claude Joy who was near Tunnell's office in front of the bank, and Vera Pearl Bunnell at a teller's window, also near the robber.

In his hasty exit, the robber almost knocked down C. G. Burkett who was planning to come into the bank through the side door. Upon recovering his balance Mr. Burkett found \$250 in dollar bills the robber had dropped. He handed it to Mosley, who by that time had also come through the side door to try to catch sight of the get-away car.

Only Wise entered the bank, and Howe stayed in the auto which was parked along the south side of the building. No disguise attempt was made.

The get-away car, a 1970 red Mach I Mustang, was reportedly stolen from an auto dealership in Brownwood on Monday.

Several of the bank employees were at work in the rear of the bank and were not directly involved in the robbery. Mosley said they stayed where they were.

No additional customers entered the bank during the robbery, usually a busy time.

Depth investigations were being conducted by a team of F.B.I. agents, Texas Rangers and local and county lawmen Tuesday afternoon. All bank employees were being interviewed by the lawmen as were the customers, who had previously given statements.

The robbery was the first in history of the Cross Plains bank.

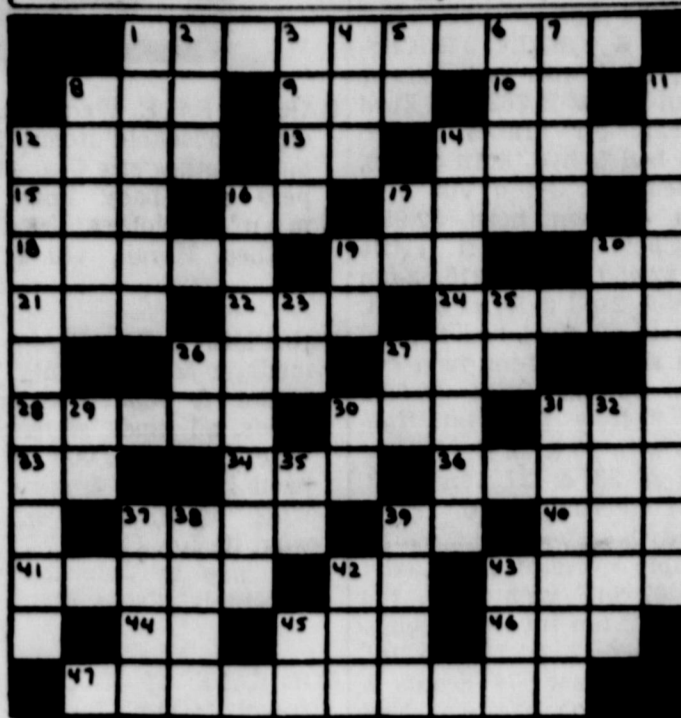

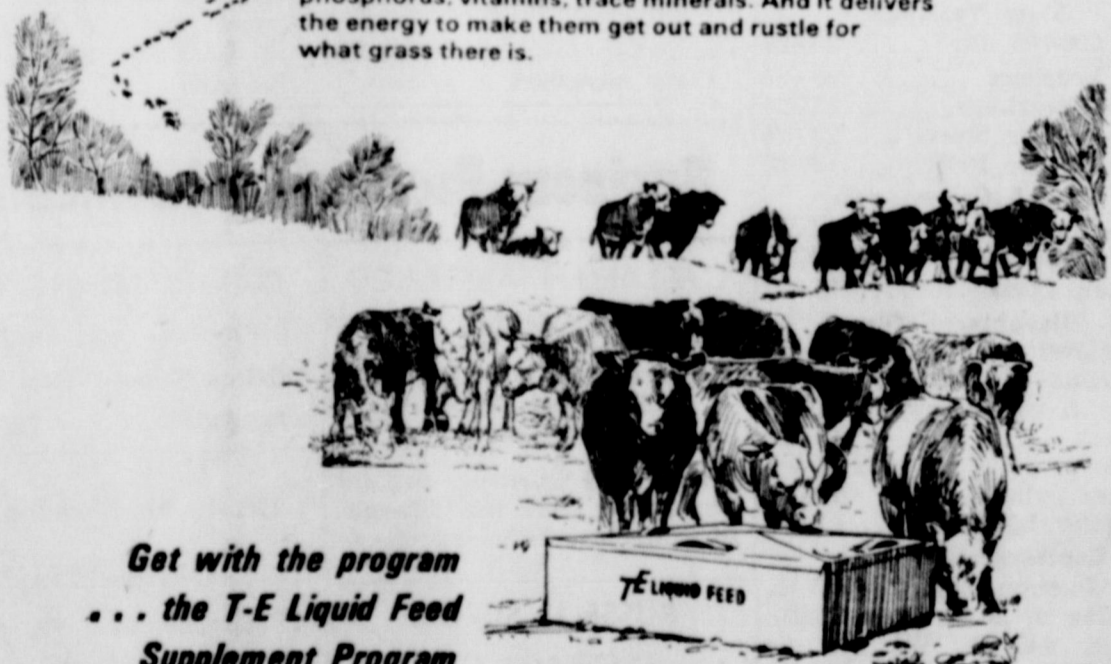

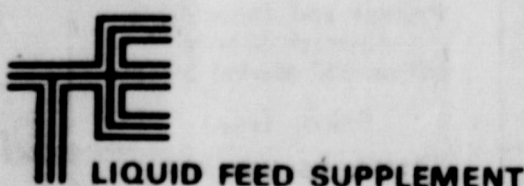

Dr. E. L. Knox of near Burkett died Wednesday evening of last week in a Coleman hospital after a brief illness. He expired at 7 p.m. Wednesday after becoming ill Tuesday afternoon at his ranch home.

Funeral for the 85-year-old retired dentist and prominent rancher, was held at 10:30 a.m. Saturday from the First Presbyterian Church in Coleman of which Dr. Knox was a member elder and trustee.

Officiating the final rites was the Rev. Dr. Harry Sarles, minister of the church. Burial was in Coleman City Cemetery.

Born March 24, 1889, in Ottawa, Kan., Dr. Knox had lived in Coleman County since 1937. He was a 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner.

Dr. Knox was one of the first dentists in Texas to receive first lieutenant commission in World War I. He graduated from Northwestern University Dental School in June, 1911.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Eldon Knox of Coleman; four grandsons, Beck, Jack, Chris and Nicky Knox, all of Coleman; and a granddaughter, Mrs. Nan Knox Markland of Coleman.
