Danny Lee Wise of Lake Brownwood and Doyle Wayne Howe of Grants Pass, Ore., remained in Callahan County jail at Baird Tuesday in lieu of \$25,000 bond charged with "bank robbery".

The pair are accused of robbing Citizens State Bank Tuesday of last week of a large amount of cash. Wise was the gunman in the bank, and Howe waited in the get-away car.

The pair was apprehended near Rowden 10 to 15 minutes after the robbery.

The pair is also facing charges in Brownwood, according to Callahan County officials.

It was learned Tuesday that jury commission was scheduled to meet in Baird Wednesday morning to select a grand jury to hear pending cases which is expected to include the bank robbery. It was not known immediately when the grand jury would convene.

Homestead Voting Set Here Dec. 3

City of Cross Plains voters will go to the polls Tuesday, Dec. 3, to approve or veto existing homesteads of persons 65 and over from ad valorem taxation by the city.

The election will be held in the City Halls, and polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Mrs. W. F. Kilgore will serve as election judge.

The election, second such balloting in Cross Plains in a year, was required when T. O. Powell presented a petition to the city

council asking the vote. Sixty-eight persons signed the document. In 1973 Powell also circulated a similar petition and the election was called for December 27. At that time the proposal was turned down 43-30, but Powell contended that the ballot was misleading, thereby requesting the second balloting.

If passed the city would not levy ad valorem taxes on an amount not less than 3,000 of the assessed value of home-

steads owned by persons 65 years of age or older.

The ballot to be marked Tuesday will consist of simple "FOR" and "AGAINST" boxes after which will be this statement: "The proposition that an amount not less than three thousand dollars (3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the City of Cross Plains, Texas".

If passed the exemptions from taxation by the city would go into effect for the year 1975.

Absentee voting is presently underway at the City Office. Ballots are available from City Secretary Mrs. Dale Bishop. Last day for absentee balloting is Friday, Nov. 29, by close of business day, 5 p.m.

Assisting Mrs. Kilgore in holding the election will be V. L. Hobdy, I. B. Loving, Mrs. L. D. Koenig and Mrs. Ray Jones.

Powell asked Secretary of State Mark White of the proper procedure to follow in requesting a second election on the homestead tax exemption. White advised the petition method.

A recent Texas Legislature passed a law allowing homestead exemptions for persons 65 or over by political subdivisions.

Thanksgiving Will Be Holiday In Cross Plains

Thanksgiving, Thursday, Nov. 28, will be observed as a holiday by most businesses in Cross Plains.

The entire downtown business portions of the city is expected to be closed for the one-day vacation, and several concerns along highways leading into Cross Plains are also planning to shut doors for the day.

All local grocery stores are planning to close, but at least one convenience store will remain open, according to a sampling of intentions taken by the Review Tuesday.

John Pruet, West Texas Utility Co. office manager here, announced that his office would be closed both Thursday and Friday. Cross Plains schools will also get a two-day holiday. Thursday and Friday. Classes will resume Monday morning on regular schedule. Callahan County courthouse will also take a two-day break. Thursday and Friday.

Citizens State Bank, Cross Plains Post Office and City Office will be closed just one day, as is the plans of most general retail stores here.

Downtown service stations are expected to be closed Thursday, but most of those on Highway 36 plan to be doing business as usual Thursday.

Restaurants and short-order eating places here are divided. Some will be closed on Thanksgiving while others will remain open.

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1975 Peanut Allotment, Vote, Changes Noted

The U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced a national marketing quota of 1,899,800 tons and a national acreage allotment of 1,610,000 for the 1975 peanut crop, advises J. C. Earp, Jr., ASCS director of Baird. USDA also announced a mail referendum will be held Dec. 9-13, 1974, to determine whether marketing quotas will be applicable to the 1975, 1976 and 1977 crops of peanuts.

Only those producers growing peanuts in calendar year 1974 will be eligible to vote in the December referendum, noted Earp. At least two-thirds of the growers voting must approve quotas if they are to be made effective.

Peanut marketing quotas have been in effect each year since 1949. The last referendum was held in December, 1971 when 97.4 per cent of the 43,641 growers voting favored marketing quotas for the 1972, 1973 and 1974 crops.

The national peanut acreage allotment is apportioned to states, and the state allotments are apportioned among individual peanut-producing farms within each state.

Legislation under which the Peanut Price Support Program is administered provides the Secretary of Agriculture with discretion regarding certain portions of the program. In view of this discretion, some administrative changes are being considered for the 1975 program.

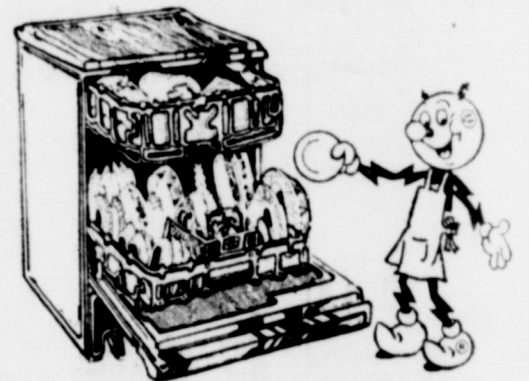

DISHWASHER SAVER-TIPS

A dishwasher will usually hold a whole day's dishes. It takes as much hot water and energy to wash 1 dish as it does a full load. Stack your dishes out of sight in your dishwasher and wait until you have a full load to turn it on.

Use only detergents manufactured specifically for dishwashers. A wetting agent helps prevent water spots on glasses and silverware.

Clean the filter screen often. A clogged filter can reduce the efficiency of your dishwasher.

WATER HEATER SAVER-TIPS

It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute will waste 300 gallons per month.

To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.

The thermostat controlling the water temperature is usually preset at the factory to deliver hot water at 150° F. This setting has proven satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.

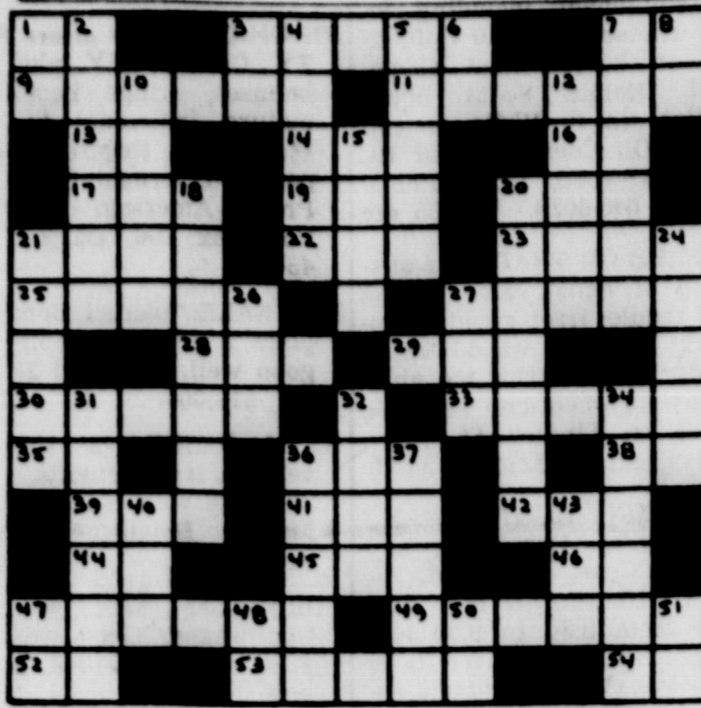

Post Office Offers 2 Yuletide Stamps

Two 10-cent traditional Christmas postage stamps are presently on sale at the Cross Plains post office. Joe Hanke, postmaster announces.

This year's Christmas Masterpiece stamp is based upon a detail from "The Perussis Altarpiece," a large oil painting which hangs in the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York. Designer of the stamp is Bradbury Thompson of Riverside, Conn.

The stamp features an angel taken from the central of the five panels making up the large altarpiece painting. The angel is one of two in the central panel—one is depicted in flight on either side of the upright portion of the cross that dominates the panel.

The identity of the artist who painted the altarpiece is unknown. The painting is known to have been done in 1480, although it is not known where it was hung upon completion.

Second Christmas stamp is taken from an 1855 lithographic print, "The Road,—Winter," by the firm Currier and Ives. The drawing was one on the lithography stone by Otto Knirsch, one of the celebrated American artists Nathaniel Currier employed to produce drawings that were to be colored on an assembly line of girls, each of whom applied a single color.
