



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

Right Claim Number Speeds Medicare Pay

People covered by Medicare medical insurance can assure faster payment of their claims if they make sure their correct claim number is on the claim form, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene.

"About one of every three delays in payment of Medicare medical insurance claims is caused by use of a wrong claim number or omission of the number entirely," Hammons said. The claim number identifies a claim for Medicare payment on bills for medical services. "If you put a wrong numberor don't enter a number-on a Request for Medicare Payment form, a search for your correct number is necessary, Hammons said. "The search can delay your payment."

If itemized bills are sent in with a claim, the claim number site for a wildcat four miles also should be written on each separate bill.
