Cancer Related Deaths Said Higher In Callahan

The recent mastectomy operations on First Lady Betty Ford and Mrs. Rockefeller have drawn special attention in Callahan County to the incidence of cancer in the local area and to the progress being made in coping with it.

Figures compiled by the U. S. Public Health Service shed light on the size of the cancer problem locally and how it compares with the situation in other communities.

Based upon the Government's last three annual reports, the number of deaths in Callahan County caused by the various types of cancer has averaged 23 a year, with two of them attributed to breast cancer.

The figures relate to the resident population only. Deaths locally of non-residents are not included.

The overall cancer mortality in the area has been somewhat higher than in most parts of the country. The average has been 288 deaths per 100,000 population.

Throughout the United States as a whole, by way of comparison, the rate was 160 per 100,000. In the State of Texas it

We were without electricity (I forgot to fill my storm lamps with kerosene), our telephone system was a mess, lines were being changed over to the underground cable system. Right Claim Number Speeds Medicare Pay

People covered by Medicare medical insurance can assure faster payment of their claims if they make sure their correct claim number is on the claim form, according to Glyn Hammons, social security district manager in Abilene.

"About one of every three delays in payment of Medicare medical insurance claims is caused by use of a wrong claim number or omission of the number entirely," Hammons said.

The claim number identifies a claim for Medicare payment on bills for medical services. "If you put a wrong number—or don't enter a number—on a 'Request for Medicare Payment' form, a search for your correct number is necessary," Hammons said. "The search can delay your payment."

If itemized bills are sent in with a claim, the claim number also should be written on each separate bill.

The claim number appears on the health insurance card issued to everyone covered by Medicare. The number has nine digits and a symbol, such as A, B, or T. The number, including the symbol, should be copied onto the designated blank on the "Request for Medicare Payment" form.

The form is available at most doctor's offices and at any social security office. Claims should be sent to P. O. Box 22147, Group Medicare and Surgical, Medicare—Part B Dallas, Texas 75222.

Medicare medical insurance helps pay for doctor bills and many other medical expenses of almost everyone 65 and over, and disabled people under 65 who have been entitled to social security disability payments for 24 consecutive months or more.
