County Sheriff's annual rodeo championship will be held in Baird Friday and Saturday, May 2 and 3. The rodeo will begin at 8 p.m. on Friday and 7 p.m. on Saturday. history at West Texas State University at Canyon, who began his announcing career at the age of 16.

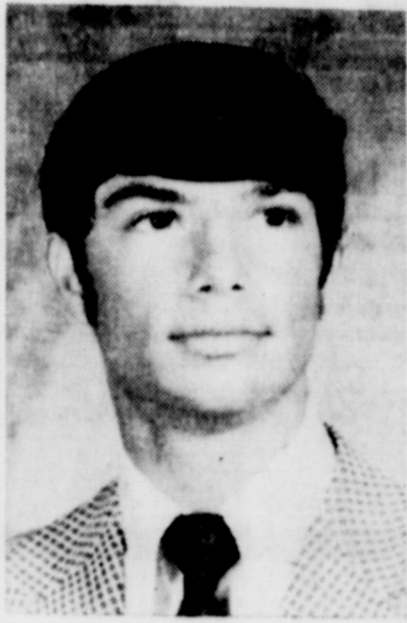

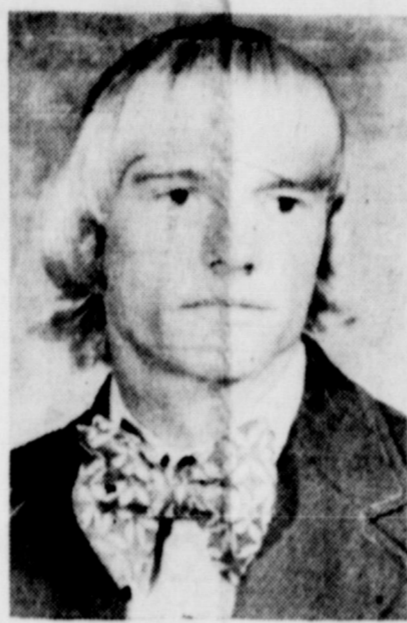

Heavy rain and pea to marble sized hail fell in Cross Plains briefly Tuesday afternoon about 3:30.

The rain measured .49 of an inch, according to the official weather gauge here.

The hail began small, but increased in size, up to about 1/2-inch in diameter. The larger stones were not numerous. Some damage to fruit and tender garden vegetation was reported. It was not thought to be extensive, however.

It was not believed that the hail was of sufficient size nor intensity to cause damage to house tops or automobiles.

The moisture raised the month's total rainfall to 2.67 inches, and the year's aggregate stood at 5.39 inches.

## County Split On Amendment Vote

Cross Plains voters mixed both proposed amendments to the state constitution in voting Tuesday of last week, but over Callahan County electors split decisions.

State-wide both proposed changes were approved.

In Cross Plains 117 persons voted. Locally the tabulations, reported by Mrs. W. F. Kilgore, judge, showed the first proposed change losing 64-52, and the second being nixed 70-46.

In Callahan County the first change was okayed 422-268, but voters turned down the second amendment 350-340. A total of 695 votes were counted in Callahan County.

The first proposed change concerned increased state funds in some pensions for retired persons, and the second dealt with increased salaries and expenses for state legislators.

## Need Crop Reports From State Farmers

During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service at Austin.

This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry—agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and county totals. It was pointed out.

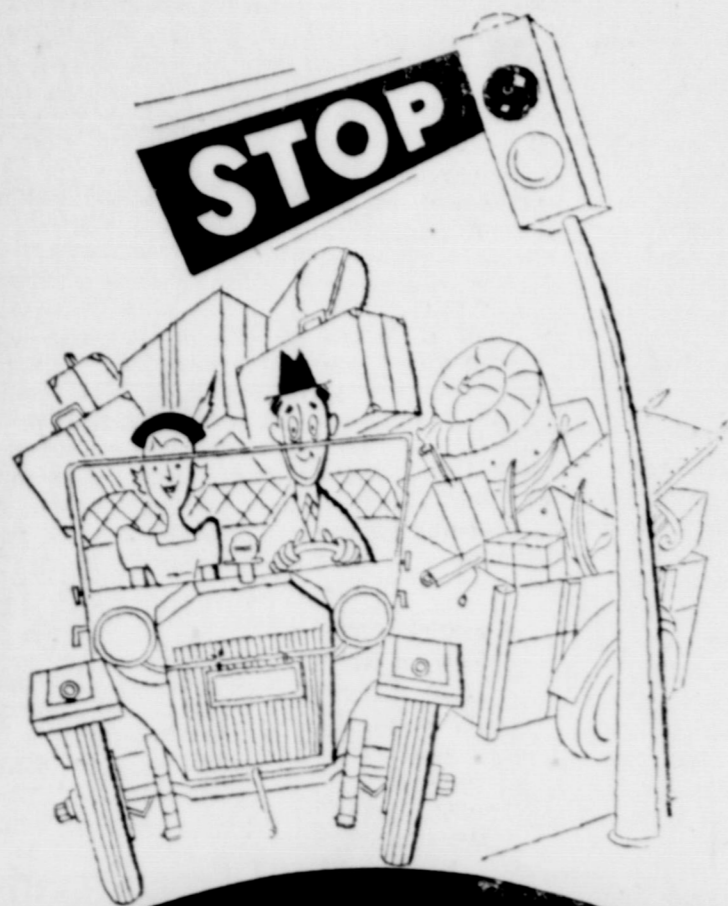

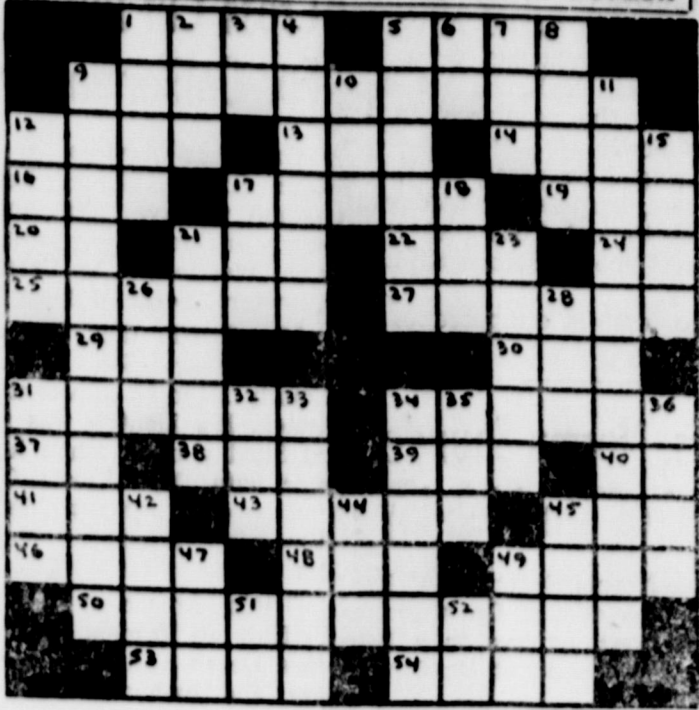
