





The program gives recognition to those who have kep land in the family for 100 years or more maintaining continuou agricultural operations, Agr culture Commissioner John (White explained.

Last year over 500 families qualified for certificates and inclusion in the Family Land Heritage Registry, which contains brief histories of all the farms and ranches, the names of current owners, and pictures of
