Billy Mayes Killed In Wreck Early Thursday

William Vestal (Billy) Mayes, 34, of Cross Plains was fatally injured in a one-vehicle accident early Thursday morning when the pickup truck he was driving struck a culvert on Highway 279 about 10 miles south of Cross Plains. Mr. Mayes was dead on arrival at a Brownwood hospital. Funeral service was held at 4 p.m. Friday, July 18 from Higginbotham Chapel in Cross Plains. Officiating was the Rev. V. D. Walters, pastor of the Elmwood Baptist Church in Abilene and former local pastor. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of this city.

According to investigating Department of Public Safety Patrolmen Homer Smith and Jay Lynn Moses of Brownwood Mayes' pickup was headed north on Highway 279 when it left the roadway, striking the culvert, overturning once throwing Mayes from the vehicle. The mishap occurred about 1 a.m. 2 1/2 miles north of Brownwood. union is usually held on Saturday after the second Friday in August. Preliminary plans were made, however, for a reunion to be held in 1976. Mrs. Cook reported.

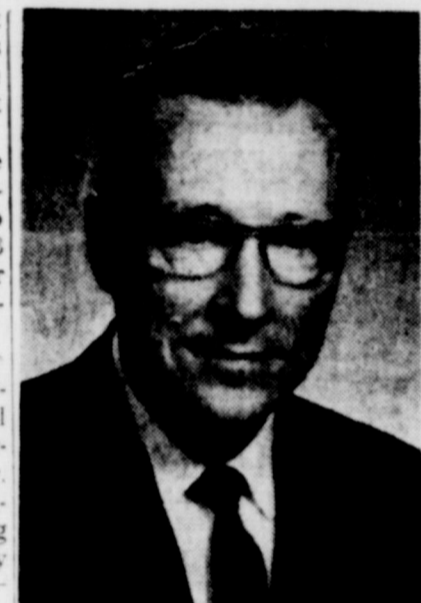

Showers Last Week Give City .55 Inch

Rain showers skipped across the Cross Plains area last week and dumped .52 of an inch of rain here on Thursday evening and another .03 on Friday. Skies threatened almost daily through Sunday, but no measurable amount of rain fell after Friday's light shower. The city received 1.05 inches of rain from July 2 through 4, and last week's .55 brought the month's total to 1.60 inches. Aggregate for year to noon Tuesday, stands at 11.36 inches. Month-by-month totals follow: January .89, February 1.61, March .38, April 2.65, May 3.75, June .48 and July 1.60. Many area pastures and crops are beginning to suffer for rain, while the showers have been heavier and more frequent in other areas.

The Clyde Bisons won the double-elimination Cross Plainsmen invitational tournament last week end by defeating three teams, one of them twice, without a loss. The Bisons defeated the Clyde Braves 10-0 on Friday night to start the tournery, which was shortened to Friday and Saturday after originally being scheduled for three days. Lonnie Dunn threw a no-hitter at the Braves. Second game Friday the Clyde Cougars defeated the Cross Plainsmen 5-4. Saturday at noon the Plainsmen lost to the Braves 11-3 thus becoming the first team to be eliminated. Bisons came back at 2 p.m. Saturday to beat the Cougars 8-0 behind the two-hit pitching of Steve Holcomb. In the 6 o'clock semi-final game Saturday, the Cougars beat the Braves 9-8 in extra innings to gain a berth in the finals opposite the Bisons. The Bisons defeated the

Cougars 7-4 for the championship and first place trophy. Larry Young was the starting pitcher for the Bisons with relief help from Holcomb. All-tournament players selected from the champion Bisons were Holcomb, Dunn, Young and Glenn Walker. Cougars making the elite unit were David Hicks, J. E. Holtz and Greg Hinson. All-tourney players from the Braves were Danny Ramos, Podie Ramos and Floyd Sellers. Plainsmen making the all-tournament unit were Trey Meiron and Glynn Nickerson. It was pointed out that the champion Bisons played the entire tournament making only three errors, better than average fielding for any team of this age group or older. Knox Waggoner, local team manager and organizer of the tournament, said that the tournament was a success, and the Plainsmen and coaches appreciate the support.

Burkett Neighborhood News Items

Well folks, it's Wednesday and time is running out. I still haven't a thing for the news that everyone expects next week. I can't seem to think of a thing, but the canning that has to be done. We country folks can't be like the old grasshopper that fiddled and sang while the ants worked or come winter we might have to buy every thing we eat and with prices what they are today. I shudder at the thought of that.

The past few years we have had trouble finding the canning needs that we have been used to. I have been out in the storeroom digging around trying to find some small-mouth fruit jars. You see I was one of the smart ones, who saved all wide-mouth and bought only products that were put in that type jar. I have got loads of them, but what the dickens am I going to seal them with? All you can find is the regular mouth lids, and they are not called lids. They are "closures" and have the sealer built in the ring. I know they are okay as we buy food sealed with them in the supermarkets, but getting folks to change to something new is hard to do. I just thought of something. I may not have to buy lids for the rest of my life, just small mouth jars.

It is 11:30 and I'm here typing. I've not a thing worthwhile to say, but I've got to do something to keep awake as there is a cooker of corn on the stove that will not be ready to come off until 1 a.m. "Why am I cooking off corn this late? Is it corn? Or is it corn dring? No, it is cream style corn, cooked in a pressure cooker not a vat on the Bayou. Now with that question all cleared up, I'll tell you why so late. My day started off at 7:30 a.m. We drag out of bed and Joe goes to the store. No we don't eat first as we choose to sleep as long as we can. I yell at Tamarah to get up and feed her show calf, Mr. Lee Roy, so she can get to Bible School on time.

Out the back door I go, after stumbling over a kitten and stepping in the middle of a dog. I find my way to the feed buckets. Everything on this place

is waiting at the back gate and door for their feed. Little Friskies for the kittens that number four. Dog Chow for the two poodles, the cow dog and the English bull pup that belongs to my son. One bucket of grower for the 50 baby chicks, one bucket of maize for the laying hens. Back to the house for I forgot the water bucket. After putting out water to the chickens and yard animals, I head down the hill to the barn. I check to see if Mr. Lee Roy is eating his new feed. I get the three horses their oats and hay take off for the garden where we have been watering the melons, sweet potatoes, corn, and okra all night disconnect the huge sprinkler and run the hose over the garden fence. Take hose and climb over lot fence and fill the barn water tank. Back up the hill. I check the hen nest to see if there are any setting hen taking up the layers space in the nest. If there are I put them in a cage for a few days without feed or water.

When I reach the house again I either put on a load of wash or have some I washed the night before to hang out. I make the beds, and start to wash the supper dishes but Joe calls and I have to go to the store as he has business in Coleman.

While at the store I clean, as Joe says his hand does not fit a broom or mop. I fill the drink box and clean the meat cutter. When Joe returns he tells me he gathered corn from the garden. I rush home, and along with my son, we shuck the corn and put it from the cob. Mrs. Lvd. Harris wanders in, fills the dish pan with fresh dish water and finishes the dishes. Now with the canning ready to start, fill the jars with corn and place them in the cooker to be canned later as Tamarah is getting up her horse to go to Cross Plains to practice the barrel, flags and poles. After four runs on each pattern we hit the road home. fire up the cooker, get the pressure up good and even, then out the gate to the chicken house, and down the hill to the barn and the feeding bit happens all over again.

Back to the house to fix a

bite to eat, for Joe will be home at 10:30 from the store. After supper the family sleeps and here I sit waiting on that cooker of corn. So if any of you beautiful Burkett folks see me pass you by in sort of a daze, don't think I am unfriendly. Feel sure that I'm busy and have my mind on the next thing that has to be done. I have not reached retirement age yet, I do not live a normal life, or I might and just don't know that everyone is as busy as I. When the fall garden is planted and the shellies canned I will have time to sit back this winter and talk your arm off. My but I do love you all. Each day is a new experience. I can hardly wait to get up and start the day as I love every second of it.

Well this is Sunday. Didn't go to church as Tamarah's show calf, Mr. Lee Roy, got out and had to be rounded up and penned again. The black fillie has been lame since the trail ride to Coleman. We hunted and finally found a spot which we hope is her trouble, filled it full of drawing salve and turned her out to pasture.

You know talking about church made me think of what I herred in the store the other day. Several men were sitting around talking about how the rains have missed Burkett and one man said, well, "I guess you aren't paying the preacher". The answer, I'm paying, he just isn't delivering."

I sure wish we could get a good rain. Several are trying to get fields ready for the fall planting but some say they are digging up large chunks of ground is so dry and packed.

Charlie Howard Edington has bought himself a brand new tractor. He was waiting at the store the other day to show the men where to deliver it, then a few days later he was waiting again. What, another new tractor? "No, they are coming after the one I bought" said Charlie. you see I've blew off three filters in the week I've had it, pressure is building up somewhere and it has to be worked on. Well, Charlie, they don't make anything now days that is

to last. You know constant buying helps the economy but that is a little fast.

I would like to thank Mr. Virgil Burkett of Farmington, Mo. for renewing the Cross Plains Review, and to thank Mr. Preston Burkett of Bisbee, Ariz. for his renewal. You know when you send it to me I get a little extra. That is my pay for writing the news. Thanks again readers, and thank you Emma for telling your brothers.

All it takes is a glance at your own checkbook to know that in the long run you have to have more coming in than going out. The same principal works with nations as well. That's why an international trade surplus is more desirable than a trade deficit. American farmers last year did far more than any other segment of U. S. industry to reduce a trade deficit topped off by the high prices of mid-eastern oil. Agricultural exports last year were worth 22 billion dollars, producing an agricultural trade surplus of nearly 12 billion. This contribution by food and fiber producers brought our total deficit to 3 billion dollars. Still high, but much less than some economists thought it would be. Those figures from last year are considered by many to be the harbinger of agriculture's future importance to the U. S. position in world affairs. Farmers and ranchers are moving more directly into the limelight as they produce enough to keep us number one.

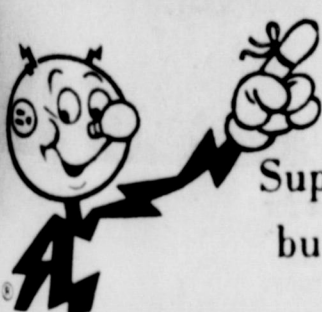

New Hunting Guide Available Soon

Information on game and fish laws for upcoming seasons is contained in the new "Guide to Texas Hunting Sport Fishing Regulations, 1975-76" soon to be available where hunting and fishing licenses are sold.

This year's 24-page booklet from the Texas Park and Wildlife Department features county-by-county listings of seasons and bag limits for popular game species along with fishing regulations.

Also included is a county locator map to pinpoint any one of the state's 254 counties with specific notes on special game animals and birds which may be hunted in the counties under the Parks and Wildlife Department's regulatory authority.

More detailed information is listed for licenses, tags and permits, minnows, fur-bearing animals and general freshwater sport fishing and hunting rules.

Regulations for migratory game birds and commercial and saltwater fishing have yet to be established by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission and are not included in the "Guide."
