Screwworm Menace Prevalent Over Texas

According to the Mission Screwworm Control Laboratory report, June has been the worst month for screwworm outbreaks since 1972. A total of 1,164 cases of screwworms were confirmed in June and the outbreaks in July may be more than the June total if cases continue to appear says Greg Gerngross, county extension agent.

Livestock producers in the area are being asked again to submit all maggot larvae samples to the Mission Control Center for identification. In the event a screwworm case is confirmed on a ranch, sterile flies are being dropped to prevent a full scale outbreak.

Producers are also reminded to continue to make use of preventative practices and good management procedures to avert a major outbreak. Gerngross urged to delay all castration and dehorning practices until late fall if possible and check and treat all wounds and be sure and treat navels of newborn calves. Spray herds routinely.

Vials for submitting screwworm larva samples are available from most feed and seed supply businesses in Callahan County and also from the County Extension Office in the Courthouse at Baird.

Jaycee Softball Tourney Set Here August 1, 2, 3

A three-day slow-pitch softball tournament, sponsored by the Cross Plains Jaycee chapter, will be played here Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 1, 2 and 3, at the teenage baseball park.

The double-elimination tournament will feature 12 teams. Four of those squads are fielded by Jaycee chapters, Cross Plains, Rising Star, Baird and Eastland. The eight other teams are from Abilene and Brownwood, Hawley and Clyde. It was reported by local Jaycee President Elvin Hutchins.

Action will begin at 6 p.m.

Friday with five contests on tap, slated 90 minutes apart, with last game carded to begin at 12 midnight.

A feature of the initial day's play will be a contest between Cross Plains and Rising Star Jaycee chapter. That game is slated to begin at 9 p.m.

Admission for sessions of the tournament will be 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students.

"Proceeds from the tournament will be used by Jaycees for civic projects," Hutchins said, "and we hope the public will support the endeavor."

Concession stand will be open for all sessions Hutchins pointed out.

Friday's schedule calls for Baird Jaycees to play Jim's Auto at 6 p.m.; S.R.G. team to tangle with Gooch at 7:30; Cross Plains and Rising Star Jaycees to battle at 9 p.m.; Eastland and Hawley to play at 10:30 p.m., and Mac's Kawasaki tests Taylor County at 12 midnight.

Action will resume at 7 a.m. Saturday with Mavericks taking on Bandag in first round elimination completion. Other games are carded every hour and one-half through the day with last tilt scheduled to begin at 11:30 p.m. Saturday.

Play will resume at 1 p.m. Sunday with semifinals. Championship game is slated for 5:30 p.m. Sunday, immediately following the loser bracket championship at 4 o'clock.

Hutchins explained that trophies will be awarded to various winners after completion of the tournament.

The local event was originally scheduled earlier this summer, but had to be postponed.

Rain Showers Last Week Net Widely Varying Totals

Rain showers which fell over the Cross Plains section of Texas Thursday and Friday yielded widely varying amounts.

In Cross Plains the official two-day total was 1.34 inches, however, the Pioneer area received up to 5 inches. That amount was gauged at the J. T. Beggs farm in the eastern part of the community. The C. McDonald gauge showed 3.8 inches.

Most of the reports ranged from one to two inches. In the Rowden area the N. V. Gibbs farm received two inches, but in other sections of the community only about half that amount fell.

Cross Cut community also received an even inch.

Measurements in the Sabanno sector ranged around the two-inch mark, and Burkett community got 1.75 inches.

The Cottonwood area reported 1 inch to 2.80, with the heavier

amounts reportedly falling in the south and southeast parts of the community.

In the Atwell locality measurements ranged from 1.40 inches at the Alton and Roy Tatom places to about two inches at the Buster Black place.

The 1.34 inches measured in Cross Plains brings the month's aggregate to 2.94 inches, and the year's total to 12.70 inches.

The moisture was considered a boon to crops and pastures which were beginning to suffer from lack of moisture.

Pot Possession Nets Local Man Probation

Charge of possession of marijuana, a class a misdemeanor, cost a Cross Plains man a fine and probated jail term.

Allen Robert Barnett, 18, of Cross Plains entered a guilty plea to the charge last Friday in County Court before Judge A. E. Dyer, Jr.

Several peace officers seized a small amount of growing marijuana at a farm four miles northwest of Cross Plains last Thursday.

Judge Dyer assessed a fine of \$250, court costs of \$54, a 90-day jail term probated for 18 months. Barnett will also pay \$10 per month during the probation period.

Raid on the farm was conducted by Sheriff Grayson Miller, Deputy J. H. Cox of Cross Plains, Deputy Bernis Fellmon of the County, DPS Patrolman Don Gosnell and Benny Callaway and City Marshall L. D. Brown of Cross Plains, Howard Bredehoff, game management officer, of Baird, and Hatton Moore, cattle raiser's agent, of Clyde.

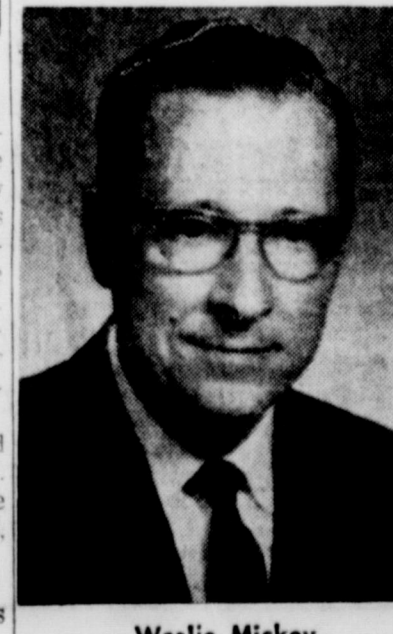

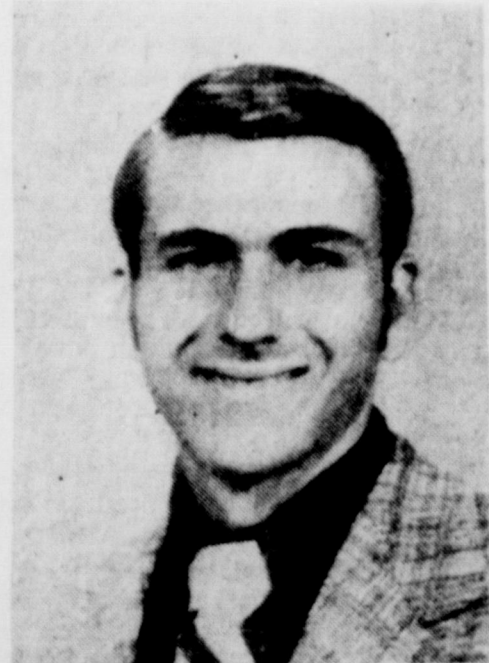

TEXAS TALK

By Glenn Winfrey

Officials are predicting a decrease of no more than 20 percent in domestic purchase of feed grains during the current marketing year. Others are saying that an improved livestock market will cut the decrease to even less. USDA projections are for the production of about 220 million short tons of feed grains with about 165 million tons sold in the United States and another 42 million tons exported to foreign countries. According to the figures released by the Department of Agriculture, total carryover of feed grains by the end of the marketing year should not exceed 30 million tons. Although that's a lot of grain, records show it to be only about 60 percent as much as the carryover at the end of 1971. Officials citing these figures are predicting relatively stable prices for grain sorghum. Major factors which could produce a change in the situation include the extent of recovery of the cattle market and, as always, the most variable of all, the weather.

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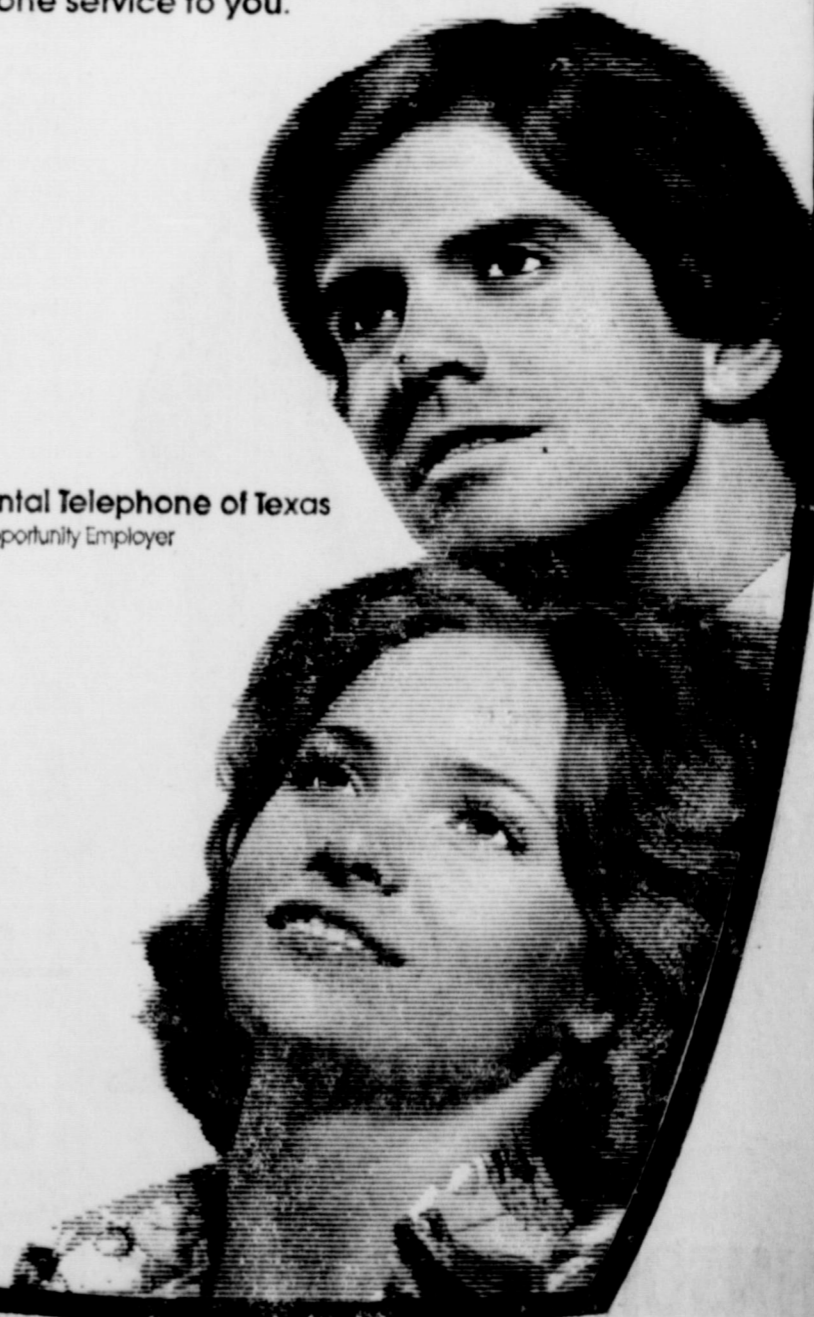
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CJC Hosts Drive-Inn Band Camp Aug. 4-8

Gosnell stopped the car on a traffic violation on Highway 36 near here, and in a subsequent search discovered the LSD.

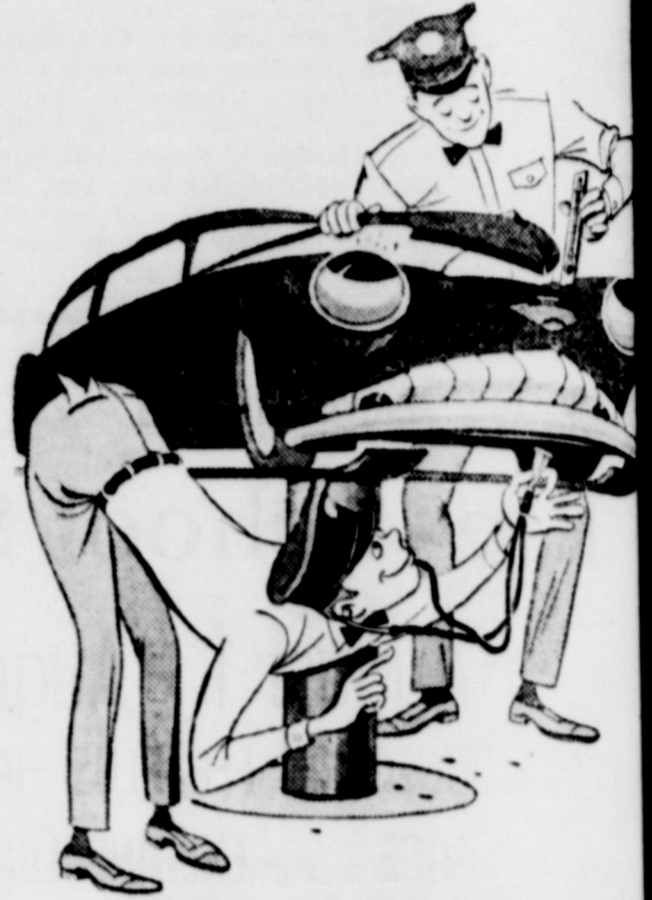
