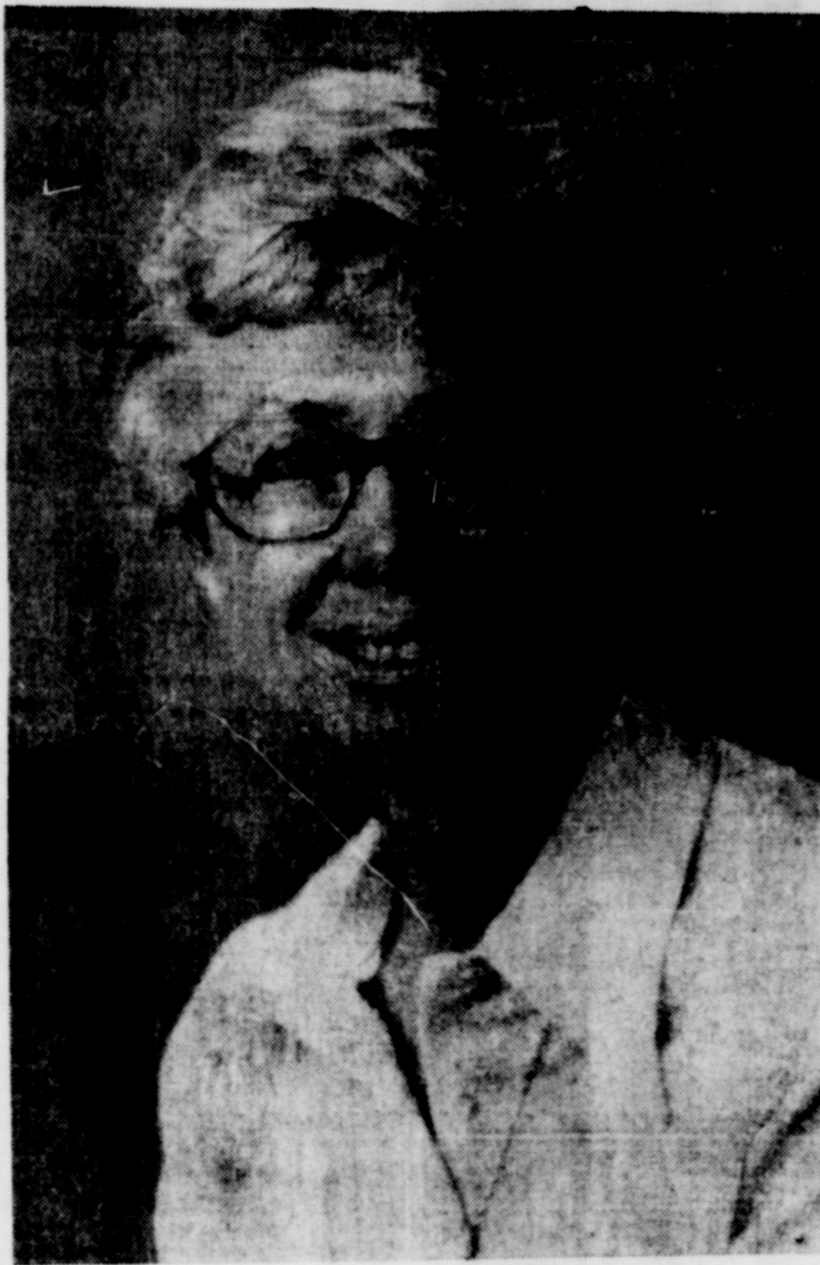
Street Dance Sited Here On Labor Day

Molcie Lou Halsell Rodenberger, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Halsell of Cross Plains, recently received a Doctor of Philosophy degree in English at the summer commencement exercises of Texas A&M University.

Mrs. Rodenberger attended Cross Plains High School the first three years of her high school training, and graduated from Anson High School in 1943. She received B.A. and B.S. degrees in journalism from Texas Women's University in 1947, and an M.A. in English from Texas A&M in 1967. Mrs. Rodenberger's dissertation is a study of folk narrative as it is used in the works of Southern novelist Caroline Gordon. Regional literature, particularly Southern, Southwestern and Western, is her special field in research and study.

For five years Mrs. Rodenberger taught journalism and English at Levelland High School. She was also Society Editor of the Kerrville Times for two years after her graduation from TWC. Since 1966, she has taught freshman English at Texas A&M University.

Mrs. Rodenberger's husband, Charles, is Assistant Dean of Engineering at Texas A&M, where

both of their children are students. Their daughter, Kathy Wilcox will graduate in December with a degree in English, and their son, Mark, is a sophomore majoring in Mechanical Engineering.

Among those concerns which will be open are J.R.B. Supermarket, Randall's Super Market, Cross Plains Review and most service stations, convenience stores and restaurants along highway leading into Cross Plains.

Texans usually take to the highways in great numbers during the Labor Day week end, and this year is expected to be no exception. Local peace officers will be working longer hours during the three-day period in an effort to prevent traffic accidents in this region.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has predicted that 42 persons will die in mishaps on Texas highways during the holiday period which will begin at 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 29, and continue through midnight on Labor Day, Sept. 1.

With one farm bill dead as a result of veto, Washington lawmakers are now at work on a second one. Members of the Senate and House Agricultural committees are predicting early fall as the time the new bill should be ready for formal consideration. From reports which have come out so far the consensus is that the measure will be pretty much a rewrite of the emergency bill earlier this year. Higher dairy, grain and cotton supports are considered a priority along with a target price program for rice. Some sort of new approach for a commodity reserve system is reported to be under consideration and there may be some changes in the disaster payment program. Perhaps the most extensive part of the bill will be indirectly related to agriculture since support is said to be heavy for an expanded food stamp program.

After a while they decided they had better get back up with the bunch or the traders would catch them off by themselves, and really give them a whipping; so here they went going in a high lope. When the boys got up the road a way they saw that the traders were out in bed yet. They were sitting around the campfire. Some of the horses were hobbled, some were tied to trees or fence posts. Those horses began to pull back as they heard the riders come near. The traders began to run to the road yelling, "Hold up there boys, hold up there." Old Johnny Gains yelled, "Hold up boys we are about to make these boys' horses break loose," just like it was an accident and that it wasn't what we meant to do. The men went back to their fire, and we rode up to them real slow then began to throw those rocks at them. I don't don't know says Raymond if we ever hit one of them or not, but they sure took cover behind the wagon and trees. Off we went in a hard run two or three hundred yards up the road. The moon was shining brightly it was easy to see all around us and we said, well guess that will learn them traders something. They won't be kidding the next boys who come along. About that time one of the boys said do you hear something? The traders were coming after them. Then the race was on. We kicked our horses out in a dead run. Rector DeBusk was one who didn't want to rock the traders. He was riding a big long-legged horse, a fine horse and he was fast, so fast that Rector didn't like to run him. I'd swapped him that horse I had owned once said Raymond. I hardly ever lost a race on him so I knew what the big horse could do. But Rector was afraid to turn him loose and let him run. He was afraid that the horse would fall down with him. So Rector was getting a little behind and those fellows were coming up behind and getting closer to Rector. The traders began to fire a little old six shooter, they were just firing it in the air and yelling, "Hold up there you so and so's." When they began to fire and yell, old Rector turned that big horse loose and here he came. He began to pass us one at a time, just going on out. When that race was over old Rector and that big horse were 50 yards ahead of the whole works. The traders had stopped the pursuit, but that horse and Rector wouldn't stop. They just kept on going.

Raymond DeBusk is sure a top-notch story teller, and I have enjoyed the use of his tapes. Thanks, Raymond.



New Food Stamps For Old August 31

Food stamp recipients will be able to exchange old food stamps for new ones after the old stamps expire on August 31, 1975, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced.

Until August 31, food stamp recipients may use their old stamps in authorized retail food stores. After that date, recipients will be able to exchange the old stamps at local food stamp offices designated by state agencies. The exchange will be dollar for dollar, new food stamps for old.

USDA introduced the new food stamp series on March 1, 1975. The new \$1, \$5 and \$10 denominations replace the 50c, \$2 and old \$5 stamps.

The amendment to the Food Stamp Program, regulations were to be published in the Federal Register of Friday, Aug. 22 and will be effective immediately upon publication.
