Constitutional Election Slated Tuesday, Nov. 4

Citizens of Callahan County and the remainder of Texas will go to the polls Tuesday, Nov. 4, to approve or veto a proposed new constitution for the state. Polls will be open at all seven voting boxes from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. in Callahan County.

The proposed constitutional

change will be offered as eight propositions on the ballot and if passed will be phased in beginning January 1, 1976 to January 1, 1981. If all articles pass a new constitution will be the result.

It was understood that any portion of the proposed eight articles could pass independently of the others.

Seemingly pro and cons of the proposition differs widely, even among the top state leaders. Gov. Dolph Briscoe has publicly opposed adoption of the article, while many other high officials have urged its passage in entirety.

Interest seems to be high in the election, and on Tuesday 11

absentee ballots had been cast with Mrs. Beatrice Deal, Callahan County Clerk, at Baird. Absentee voting continues through this week.

Voting in Tuesday's election will be carried out under the old precinct set-up. Voting boxes and presiding judges were revealed as follows.

Electors will vote in Cross Plains at the City Hall with Mrs. W. F. (Bill) Kilgore as judge.

In Baird C. W. Sutpen will serve as judge at the Community Center.

The Community Center in Clyde will be voting site with Allen Johnson presiding.

Putnam area voters will go to the Wagley Garage to cast ballots where the judge will be Mrs. John Doyle Isenhower.

Voting will be done at the school in Eula, and Reo Jolly will serve as judge.

J. Frank Carpenter will preside at the election in Denton Valley which will be held at the Baptist Church.

At Oplin voting will be done at the Community Center, and Albert Betcher will be election judge.

Bisons To Host Ranger In 10-A Battle Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will be seeking to get above the 500 mark on the season Friday night in hosting the Ranger Bulldogs in a District 10-A football contest. Kickoff is slated for 7:30 p.m.

The Herd defeated Dublin last Friday 19-7 to get to the break-even mark for the first time this season. Bisons own a 2-1 conference record. Ranger is 3-5 on the season and 1-3 in 10-A play.

Ranger has fared better than the Bisons in contests with two 10-A foes. The Bulldogs dropped a 40-0 decision to the tough De Leon Bearcats while the Buffs bowed to De Leon 55-0. Ranger defeated Goldthwaite 39-12 last Friday, and the Herd beat the Eagles 21-3.

Offensively Ranger has scored more than twice as many points this season as Cross

Plains, 139 to 65. On the other hand Buffaloes have a slight edge defensively, yielding 105 points to seven opponents, while the Bulldogs have given up 163 to eight foes.

Pre-season polls rated Ranger a strong second in the loop, but the Bulldogs started slowly. The team seems to have molded into a formidable foe in the past couple of weeks.

Ranger is long on experience and speed is also an asset the Bulldogs possess. Mark Lucky, fullback and linebacker, is back after all-district honors last season. He is a 195-pound senior. Manule Hernandez, 180-pound junior, is a capable runner and passer at quarterback. John Lebrede is a speedy 175-pound sophomore halfback. Some heavy weights up front include Bruce Elsom, 180-pound junior tackle, and Jay Rogers, 195-pound sophomore end.

First Class Mail Gets Air Treatment

The U. S. Postal Service first-class mail service improvement program went into effect at every post office on October 11. Under the program, first-class mail will receive service that is equal to or better than airmail.

The major new service step is extended to all first-class mail weighing 13 ounces or less. In practical terms, what this service improvement means is that domestic first-class postage now will purchase the level of service that previously only airmail could buy.

Under the new program, there will be an advantage in purchasing airmail postage for domestic delivery.

Priority mail (now starting at weight in excess of 13 ounces) which include air parcel service and international airmail. They can also be used in various combinations with other stamps for first-class mail.

Postal customers can exchange air mail stamps, and stamped envelopes and cards at full postage value for ordinary stamps, stamped envelopes and cards. Stationery bearing airmail indicia will be allowed to be mailed at the first-class rate.
