Gene Hicks Ends Long Service With Marines

Howard Gene Hicks has ended over 20 years service with the U. S. Marine Corps. He officially retired on September 30, 1975, with the rank of Master Sergeant.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Hicks of Cross Plains. During his 24-year, 6-month and 5-day tenure with the Marines, he served eight years in the Military Police. A former resident of the Sabanno community, Hicks earned a high school diploma through the Marine Corps, but attended Scranton schools except for his first year at Cross Plains.

He entered the armed services in 1951, taking a discharge in 1954. During his absence from the military, he served as City Marshal in Cross Plains two years. The sergeant re-enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1958 and served through Sept. 30, 1975 without interruption. He has had tours of duty in Korea, Okinawa, Japan, Vietnam, Philippine Islands, Thailand and Cuba and many bases in the United States.

During this long military career M-Sgt. Hicks earned numerous decorations. Some of them are: Combat Action Medal with Bronze Star, Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Device, Navy Commendation Medal with Bronze Star, Marine Commendation Medal with Bronze Star, Presidential Commendation Medal with Bronze Star, Vietnam Service Medal with 6 Campaign Stars, Armed Forces Expedition Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Reserve Medal, Expert Rifleman Badge and Expert Pistol Badge.

He also attended many schools while in the Marines, five of them in the last 14 years of his duty.

Possibly his most prized award is a Certificate of Appreciation earned July 16, 1971. It is in recognition of exceptional effort and devotion in a Marine Corps Career Planning Program and signed only by Brigadier General V. A. Armstrong, then commander of the 1st Marine Brigade, and the Commandant of the Marine Corps at that time.

Special Events Set For Last Grid Tilt

Special recognitions and show is planned for the football finale of 1975 Friday night at Buffalo Stadium when the Buffaloes host the Bangs Dragons in a District 10-A contest.

Friday has been designated as Fathers Night. All high school football players and their fathers will be introduced in pre-game activities starting about 7 p.m., according to Head Coach Donnie McMillian. The complete 1975 Buffalo roster, varsity and junior varsity players, will be presented.

The actual game will get underway at 7:30 p.m.

Three specials are on tap during the halftime show.

The Cross Plains Buffalo Marching Band will present a special halftime program. The musicians say they have marched so much this year, they can do a show "with their eyes closed", and that is just about what they will be doing, according to director Carroll Rhodes. They will perform with all the lights out, with only flashlights attached to their ankles, so spectators will see only their feet.

Also during the halftime football action break, the Band Sweetheart will be presented in special ceremonies. Football team members and bandmen recently elected the sweetheart in secret ballots.

Visitors for Friday's grid fi-

nale are considered a well balanced team, capable of scoring suddenly through the air or on the ground.

Bangs boasts a 6-2-1 overall season record. Both losses and the tie have come in District 10-A competition. Early nipped the Dragons 8-7, and De Leon blanked Bangs 41-0. Cross Plains almost lost to both of the 10-A schools, bowing to Early 18-0 last Friday and dropping a 55-0 decision to the Bearcats. The tie came last week end to Bangs, a 21-21 deadlock with improving Goldthwaite. Bisons beat the Eagles 21-3.

Statistics on the season show Bangs better offensively and defensively. Dragons have scored

134 points in nine outings, an average of almost 15 points per game, while the Herd has tallied 72 points, a mean of 8 points. Dragon defenders have surrendered 104 points to nine foes, norm of just over 11 points per contest. Figures for district play are similar in percentage to the season aggregates.

Dragon to prunner seems to be Tailback Bill Bush, a speedy 165-pound junior. He is aided capably by Fullback Mike Yancey, a 143-pound junior. Among top linemen are Mark Newton, 165-pound senior end, Tim Stephens, 160-pound senior center, and John Koen, 198-pound senior tackle. Dragons boast a strong and experienced offensive line.

Liquor Election Set For Dec. 2

Residents of the City of Baird will vote on Tuesday in an election to allow the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption.

A meeting Monday morning in Callahan County Commission Court set the December 2 election after being presented with 135 qualified signatures by Mrs. Beulah county clerk. Only 100 signatures were required.

It is reported that it is the first time in 13 years that a liquor election has been called in the county. The last election was held in 1942. There have been two unsuccessful elections held in Baird since that time, one in 1942 and again in 1954. A third attempt is being made due to lack of adequate number of signatures on the petition.

Callahan County Electors Vote On Charter Changes

Callahan County voters are to vote on eight proposed changes to the Texas Constitution on November 12, 1975.

The changes are: 1. To amend Article I, Section 1, to provide that the state in the election of its officers shall be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of each year.

2. To amend Article I, Section 2, to provide that the salary of the governor shall be fixed by the legislature.

3. To amend Article I, Section 3, to provide that the salary of the lieutenant governor shall be fixed by the legislature.

4. To amend Article I, Section 4, to provide that the salary of the judges of the supreme court shall be fixed by the legislature.

5. To amend Article I, Section 5, to provide that the salary of the judges of the appellate courts shall be fixed by the legislature.

6. To amend Article I, Section 6, to provide that the salary of the judges of the district courts shall be fixed by the legislature.

7. To amend Article I, Section 7, to provide that the salary of the judges of the county courts shall be fixed by the legislature.

8. To amend Article I, Section 8, to provide that the salary of the judges of the probate courts shall be fixed by the legislature.

Judge Don Lane Is Certified Specialist

42nd District Judge Don Lane has been certified by the State Bar of Texas as one of fewer than 100 lawyers in the state to be presently designated as a Criminal Law Specialist.

Judge Lane is a former lecturer in State Government at McMurry College. Wheat Yield Proof Steps Are Listed

Producers desiring to prove wheat yields for 1975 will be required to submit production data for all farms in which an interest is owned, according to Callahan County ASCS official Baird.

Requirements are that the farm must have wheat acreage in each year of the base period and acceptable production evidence furnished. The base period for next year's crop is 1970 through 1974. Those electing to prove their yields will have 15 days from November 7, 1975 to file a request. Where the yield is not proven, it will be established as it has been in the past by the county committee. The yield will be based on the county wheat yield as furnished by the state office.

General Guidelines Change Election Holding Methods

Adjustments, if any, will be made in Callahan County to conform with federal changes in election procedures, enacted this year, which have caused difficulties?

There are many who have trouble voting, especially because of an inability to grasp English. The problems that led to amendments to the Voting Rights Act stemmed from the relaxation of immigration laws in 1965. It resulted in a big increase in the number of foreign-born in this area. Many of them have adapted to their new surroundings, but still need help, however, the special assistance into play states the Department of Justice, in places where more than five percent of the voting age are of a single language and where the illiteracy rate is higher than the national average.

In some cases, the community is being required to furnish election materials in languages spoken by the voters. The latest figures for Callahan County show that 1.8 percent of the local population is foreign-born. In other parts of the country, the percentage is 4.9 per cent and the illiteracy rate is 2.8 per cent.

HOW TO STUDY THE BIBLE ... Continued

Number six: We should study the Bible realizing that the Bible divides itself most naturally into fifteen different periods. Let me encourage you to take the time to memorize these periods, and the index events of each period. The periods, together with the index events, are as follows:

- The antediluvian period — from the creation to the flood;
- The postdiluvian period — from the flood to the call of Abram;
- The Patriarchal period — from the call of Abram to the descent of Jacob's family into Egypt;
- The Egyptian period — from the descent into Egypt to the crossing of the Red Sea;
- The period of Wanderings — from the crossing of the Red Sea to the crossing of the Jordan;
- The period of Conquest — from the crossing of the Jordan to the appointment of the first judge;
- The period of the Judges — from the appointment of the first judge to the establishment of the Kingdom;
- The period of the United Kingdom — from the establishment of the Kingdom to the division of the Kingdom;
- The period of the Divided Kingdom — from the division of the Kingdom to the fall of Samaria, 722 B.C.;
- The period of Judah alone — from the fall of Samaria to the fall of Jerusalem, 586 B.C.;
- The period of the Captivity — from the fall of Jerusalem to the decree of Cyrus the Great;
- The period of Restoration — from the decree of Cyrus to the end of Nehemiah's work, with which the Old Testament closes;
- The period between the Testaments — from the end of Nehemiah's work to the coming of John the Baptist;
- The period of the Christ — from the coming of John the Baptist to Pentecost of Acts 2;
- The period of the Church — from Pentecost of Acts 2 to the close of the Revelation.

These fifteen periods constitute the framework upon which is fastened every Biblical personage and every Biblical event. To have these periods in mind is to have a tremendously valuable tool for effective Bible study.
