Juice from 6 limes (about 34

1 T. grated lime peel 1 T. lemon juice

1 tsp. grated lemon peel 2 tsp. peach extract

(optional) 2½ C. sugar

1/2 scant tsp. salt

1 qt. half and half cream 1 pt. whipping cream

2 T. vanilla extract Few drops green food color-

ing (optional) Combine in a medium bowl peaches, lime juice, lime peel, lemon juice, lemon peel, and peach extract. Set aside. Combine sugar and salt; add eggs and beat until frothy. Add half and half. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture begins to thicken. Cool. Add whipping cream, vanilla, and food coloring to custard mixture; mix well. With a rubber spatula, add thepeach mixture to the custard mixture. Pour combined mixture into freezer container. Freeze according to manufacturer's directions. Makes 1 gallon. A 1931 polio epidemic in New York City changed the course of history. Dr. Albert B. Sabin had just received his medical degree from New York University and was already engaged in biomedical research. The city's crisis prompted him to begin a lifelong battle against polio.

For 24 years, this battle took place in the laboratory where Sabin painstakingly bred the virulence out of polio viruses to develop a unique vaccine. His oral, live-virus vaccine could not only immunize those who received it but also spread the protection to others.

Sabin has said of himself: "I'm not like the scientist who quits when he gets the knowledge. I'm concerned with human welfare. I've got to go from the beginning to

the end." When distribution was stalled in official channels, Sabin set out on a series of international missions to persuade health officials to use his vaccine in mass im-

Finally, in the 1960's, some 200 million people in Europe and the United States received the Sabin vaccine. Where it was used, piloio was quickly controlled. In the past 25 years, some 2 billion people, primarily in developed countries, have received the vaccine. It has prevented an estimated 5 million cases of paralytic polio.

Some 75 million children born in developing countries every year never receive the polio vaccine. The World Health Organization estimates that polio cripples nearly half a million children every year.

This infuriates Sabin. "For every day that passes," he said, "we have another 1,000 cripples."

Social Security Provides Old And Young Benefits

It's true that Social Security provides monthly benefits and Medicare protection for most older Americans. But it also has much to offer younger people. Since 1985 is the International Year of Youth, it is particularly appropriate to take a closer look at the program.

look at the program.

Social Security pays benefits to about 3.4 million sons and daughters of insured workers. Payments are made when a parent dies or received disability or retirement checks after having worked long enough under Social Security. The worker's unmarried children under 18 (19 if in high school full time) or who have been severely disabled since before age 22 are eligible for benefits.

When young people start working, they earn work credits so that some day benefits can be paid on their Social Security record. Since most jobs are covered by Social Security today, any and all credits earned count toward future benefits. In the case of a younger worker, as little as 1½ years of work credits are required to be insured.

Benefits are payable when a worker becomes disabled and cannot do any substantial gainful work for at least a year. A worker's dependents can get benefits when the worker dies or receives disability checks. Social Security only partially replaces earnings that are lost or reduced due to death, disability, or retirement. Therefore, workers should begin early to build additional protection through savings, insurance, pensions, IRA's, or other methods.

If you wish more information about the program, need a Social Security card, or feel you are eligible for benefits, contact the nearest Social Security office. The people there will be glad to help you. The Abilene office is located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is (915) 698-1360.

Eddie Heard Is Killed In **Auto-Truck Mishap**

Edgar Houston (Eddie) Heard, 51, of Cross Plains was killed instantly in an automobile-truck crash on Interstate 20 east of Elmdale Friday evening.

Heard, former local City Marshal and Precinct 6 (Cross Plains) Justice of the Peace, apparently died instantly about 6:40 p.m. Friday when his vehicle reportedly came across the median and collided with a large tractor-trailer rig. according to the Department of Public Safety.

Graveside services for Heard were held at 10 a.m. Monday at Burkett Cemetery, under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home. Burlie W. Taylor,

pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains, officiated at the graveside ser-

Born August 19, 1933, in Miller County Georgia, he was a former city policeman and deputy sheriff in Coleman. He had also been a professional wrestler, using the name "Heard the Hermit". He had most recently worked in the oil fields.

Survivors include a brother, Brisco, of Donalsonville, Ga.; and a sister of Georgia.

The DPS reported that the driver of the truck, Jim Webber of Akron, Ohio, was not injured in the mishap, suffering only a few minor cuts and scratches.

Refunds, Some Lower Rates Loom For WTU Customers

West Texas Utilities Co. customers may receive refunds as well as slightly lower fuel rates as early as next month.

A tentative agreement was reached this past week in meetings with the Public Utility Commission staff in Austin, and the matter was expected to go before the Commission July 26 for a final order hearing. That would be just in time for the refunds to go on the August bills for all of WTU's retail customers.

The full amount to be refunded now stands at \$17.6 million. This is an increase of \$3.9 million over the amount in WTU's original request, which included only fuel costs savings achieved from August 1984 through May 1985.

The new figure includes savings made in June and an additional \$2.3 million representing a lump refund of fuel costs savings balance, plus interest, realized before last August. Refund of those total savings had begun in mid-November and were scheduled to be completed in November 1985.

WTU estimates that the total refund now will result in a \$41 credit to the average residential customer's bill. The refund is made possible by WTU being able to spend less for power plant boiler fuel than was anticipated when fuel cost factors were set by the PUC last fall.

Former customers will not receive refunds. The reasoning is that if the former customers had been undercharged for fuel, they could not be billed in the future to make up the difference.

Any refunds will vary with the amount of electricity a customer used during the period from August 1984 :hrough June 1965. Interest will be included.

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
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
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
