## Mixed Drink Tax Nets City \$386.00

City of Cross Plains was one of 422 cities and Callahan County was one of 221 counties which recently received checks from State Comptroller Bob Bullock as their share of the 12.5 per cent mixed drink tax for the second quarter of 1985.

The city's share was \$382.06 and county's portion

was \$636.54 when combined with Baird's rebate of \$254.48.

Texas cities and counties now receive a 12.5 per cent share of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries instead of the old 10 per cent rate.

## Local Cafe Invites Classes To Display Posters

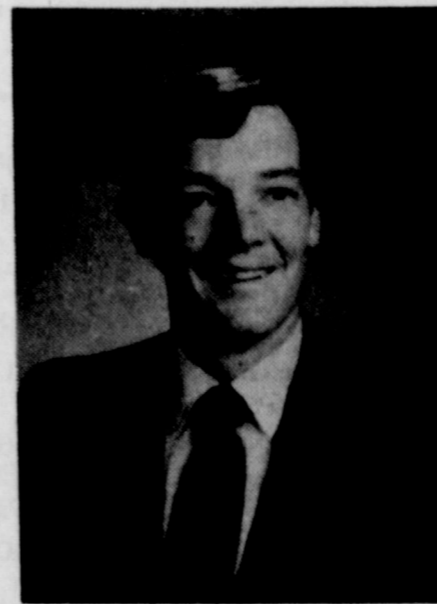
