Reader aren't born they're made. Reading aloud to your child from a very early age can help him or her achieve more at school and enrich your family life

Experts say that the major reason more than half the children in America can't read, is that they don't want to read. How do you instill a desire to read in children? You, as the parent, are the prime model for your child's language development. The daily practice of reading aloud is the oldest and most successful promotion of reading, says a leading journalist and the author of the published newly "Read-Aloud Handbook."

According to author Jim Trelease, reading interesting stories to your children before they can read themselves plants the desire to read. It builds listening comprehension, enlarges vocabulary and stimulates their imaginations. Even infants benefit from hearing stories read to them. They learn to conditioned to the sound of your voice.

Reading aloud, reading often, and choosing books carefully are critical factors in how much children will get out of the reading experience, Trelease points out in his book, published by Penguin Books.

Reading aloud may make your child brighter, and it may even brighten up your family life as well, Trelease suggests. Reading aloud provokes questions and discussions. It can be a wonderful way for you and your child to find out more about each

## Carolyn's Corner Headcount For First Day Of School Up 11 For Total Of 462 In Attendance

First day enrollment at Cross Plains Schools on Tuesday showed a slight increase, according to figures released by school officials mid-week.

First day total student count was 462 students, 11 more than showed up for classes the first day last year. That was the second greatest enrollment on first day in eight years. Only in 1983 when 480 students were tabulation greater. That was 480 pupils, and in 1984 the count was 451.

All of the growth show was . in the high school portion of the local schools. Eighteen more students drew books Tuesday than records show did so on the first day of school in 1984. That was caused by a 70-member freshman class which reported for opening day.

Always a large class, this year's ninth grade increased 12 students over the first day

last year. Enrollment decreased slightly in the elementary portion, kindergarten through eighth grade, according to first day figures. The 312 students accounted for in the nine divisions of the school trailed last year's total by 6, due mainly to the loss of the large eighth grade

and a kindergarten enrollment of just 32.

Elementary Principal Ray Womack released the following class by class headcount of first day enrollment: kindergarten 32, first grade 38, second grade 32, third grade 35, fourth grade 36, fifth grade 32, sixth grade 41, seventh grade 30 and eighth grade 36. The 312 total compares to 318 last year.

### Construction Underway On New Park Facilities

Construction began about two weeks ago on the new Cross Plains City Park located on a small acreage adjacent to the new Cross Plains Community Center on Beech Street.

George Lee Construction Co. of Abilene is the bidder of the job which calls for a 60 work day finish. The firm is a park specialist, and has constructed many such facilities in Abilene and other communities in this section of Texas.

Work was delayed getting started due to necessary materials being delayed.

Although construction was delayed, a local city officer believes that the company will finish the job early. Cross Plains Council finally let a contract on the job for over \$86,000. The job was redesigned a number of times to keep costs within the amount of money left for that projet in a federal grant received a few years ago.

Major facilities at the installation are a pavillion for gatherings, and a multi-use tennis-baskethall and such court. Play equipment for children is also planned.


### Recruit Training

Granville "Toby" and Parlee Gibbs hosted musician friends for a "jam session" on Saturday, Aug. 31. The gathering was held at the East Caddo Peak home of Sam and Lois Henderson. Sam's garage and shop provided a perfect area for musicians with plenty of room for visitors and guests. Bright ribbons and signs directed guest to the jam session. Combined effort by Toby and Parlee, Sam and Lois, and Joe and Pauniece Oglesby gave the guests an air-cooled place with lots of tables, chairs, and good food to enjoy the music.

The musicians included Toby Gibbs on electric keyboard, Harley Brooks guitar and bass, Charles Walton lead guitarist, J.L. Jones on rhythm guitar and lead. Troy Jordan on fiddle, Bill McAdoo as vocalist along with guitar and drums, Bill Ruthledge on drums, W.M. Stansbury on steel guitar, Lefty Houston plays fiddle (with left hand), Hop Elam on bass, harmonica and vocalist, Archie Jefferies guitarist, Archie also recorded songwriter, C.W. "Cozy" Musler on steel guitar. Most of these are vocalists in addition to their instruments. Three of these, Archie Jefferies, Cozy Musler, and Toby Gibbs are well remembered as being the original Fraley Butane Boys on KRBC Radio in Abilene during the late 1940 and 1950 years of radio from the old Winter Hotel station.

This group of musicians represent about 300 collective years as professional musicians in all areas from small bands, combos, and big band groups through these years. Most have retired from other careers and now play for benefits, community musicals and their own pleasure as the opportunity permits. They are considering, with some tenative planning, forming an association of retired musicians. Such a group with regular sessions might encourage young musicians and keep and propagate their kind of music. Cross Plains Buffaloes initiated the 1985 football season Friday night by absorbing a 42-6 defeat at the hands of host Dublin Lions.

Although the Class AA Lions scored very quickly after the kickoff to set the tone of the contest, Buffalo defenders limited Dublin to 14 points in the first half. In fact, at the halfway mark the Herd trailed the hosts by just eight points having counted its lone tally in the second quarter, cutting the deficit to 14-6. Bison quarterback Devin Koenig got the

touchdown on an 11-year run. The ball was bobbled on the planned placement kick conversion, and the ensuing forced run was cut short.

Athletic Director Mark

Davidson said of the Buffaloes, "We played pretty good ball the first half, but got worn down in the second half." The Lions tallied 14 points in each of the second half quarters while the Herd went scoreless. He continued, "There is a lot of room for improvement, but they are coming along." CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1985** 

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Develop-

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund. with \$190 million of those bor ceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proeeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood con-

trol projects. The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will

not be affected by such expiration. The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control. agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance pro-

#### ment Bonds may be issued." PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

gram, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Develop-

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million. if authorized to do so by a twothirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

### **PROPOSITION NO. 3**

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 prooses a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 6** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 prooses a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other

pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agree-

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 7** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice

The proposed amendment will apear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This. amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances

The proposed amendment will apear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legis-lature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 9** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 pro-oses a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to at-tach a rider to the General Appropriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expendior emergency transfer of state appropriations."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 10** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from trea-

sury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due. The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 13** ON THE BALLOT

The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. "The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

#### **PROPOSTION NO. 14** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of

the office. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for: (1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews

County and El Paso County; (2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."
