Have you ever given an excuse for something because you didn't want to tell the eason? In the true sense of the word, "excuse" can mean "justification or reason something offered as justification or as grounds for being excused." But excuses have been so abused that the word has taken on a bad connotation and stands in opposition to a reason!

If the excuses given in regard to one situation were applied to another situation, the foolishness of them might be better seen.
