

Project Pride representatives are busy with preparations for 1997 Christmas Village. Plans are in place and it is time for action. The entire city's cooperation is needed. Village activities are planned for Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 4, 5, and 6, from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. There will be no admission charge.

Project Pride has had a very successful year and has been able to fund a number of community projects. Beginning in January this year a benefit dinner was held to help pay for a new ambulance for the Cross Plains Emergency Medical Service. Project Pride paid all expenses and the entire \$2,500 in contributions went to the EMS. Restoration has continued on the Howard House, and the Butler house next door was removed, making room for a proposed park and parking area. A Cross Plains promotional advertisement was placed in Texas Travelers magazine. Assistance was given during the city's annual spring and fall cleanups.

The annual Howard Day observance, honoring the late Robert E.

Howard, was hosted in June with people from all over the United States attending. An ice cream booth was provided during the county July 4th celebration. Materials have been purchased for building new bleachers at the Little League park. Most recently a reception was given for new school personnel, and everyone is looking toward the school homecoming.

Project Pride has an established permanent fund and plans to use the interest generated plus continued community support for day to day operations and public service projects. The organization is non profit with over 200 members and has no paid employees. Membership is open to anyone who is interested in making the community a cleaner, more attractive place to live and preserving and documenting the history of the Cross Plains community. Annual dues are \$3.00 per person or \$5.00 per family. Meetings are held each second Tuesday at 6:00 p.m. at the Cross Plains Library. The public is always invited.

County Commissioners Met Sept. 22

Callahan County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, September 22nd at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird. County Judge Bill Johnson called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. with these officers present; Commissioners Harold Hicks, Precinct 1; Bryan Farmer, Precinct 2; Tommy Holland, Precinct 3; Charlie Grider, Precinct 4; County Clerk Darlene Walker; and County Treasurer Dora Hounshell.

Minutes from the previous meeting were reviewed and signed as read.

An outdoor burning ban was discussed and due to continuing dry conditions a county wide burn ban was unanimously approved. Hicks made the motion that was seconded by Grider. The ban will be reconsidered at the next meeting if conditions change.

The Central Texas Opportunities for Head Start Program had requested to lease a county owned vacant lot to set up a Head Start Program in Baird.

Johnson said the Head Start Program coming to town was endorsed by the Baird School System and the program would employee 3 full time employees and 1 part time worker. A modular building would be put on the lot and playground fenced.

Grider made a motion to lease the lot to Head Start Program for 10 years at \$1.00 a year. Holland seconded the motion and it passed unanimously. Judge Johnson will sign the lease on October 1st. A General Fund Budget was ap-

proved with a price tag of \$1,531,798.73. This is a \$71,321 increase over last year's budget and includes a \$50 a month pay raise for all employees and elected officials.

Precinct budgets were set as follows: Precinct 1, \$154,775; Precinct 2, \$196,259; Precinct 3, \$192,478; and Precinct 4 \$195 598

A General Fund Tax Rate was set at \$.2624 per hundred dollar valuation and the Road-Bridge Tax Fund Rate was set at \$.0817, both rates are the same as last year.

Grider made a motion, seconded by Hicks, to approve the budgets and taxing rates as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

Judge Johnson told Commissioners that last week a group of citizens from around the county had met and were making a proposal for a Texas Youth Council Facility in Baird. He said the Economic Development Corporation representatives from Clyde, Baird, and Cross Plains had representatives at the meeting and expressed support for the proposal that would bring up to 600 jobs to the

Johnson said he thought it was great that all 3 entities were working together and asked the commissioners to support the efforts of the group. Johnson made a motion seconded


Mrs. Browning was born in Dressy and moved to Brownwood in 1925. She owned and operated Southside Laundry and Dry Cleaner and also was a homemaker. She was a member of Central United Methodist Church and was the widow of Ressie C. Browning, whom she married in 1923 in Callahan County.

Survivors include one daughter, Regina Parker of Brownwood; one son, R. Cliff Browning of De Soto; six grandchildren; 14 great-grandchildren; and one great-greatgrandchild.

Look at the Cross Plains Public Library the next time you drive by. When you have time, go in. You'll be pleased. You might even say, "This place has come a long way since

At that time a group of interested citizens, among them Veda De Busk, Vivien Lee, O.B. Edmondson, Lyda Shults, and Betty Browning went to a town meeting to ask for community support in their effort to raise funds for a public library and an ambulance. Even then Cross Plains folks recognized a need when they saw one, and voted to help with both efforts. A fund-raising campaign soon raised enough funds to get an ambulance and to open a library.

By 1979 the library project was well on its way. Through bake sales, rummage sales, auctions and other fund-raisers the library soon had enough books and city backing to get started. Soon it was accepted as a member of the Big Country Library System. With help from the city and the county, it has been possible slowly to improve both the facilities and the book collection. However, in 1992, because the annual report did not show enough community support, the library was put on probation by the Big Country Library System for a year. The Library Board was not sure where to turn, but friends came through in every fund-raiser, and the library survived, thanks to a "Caring Community."

Then, in 1996, Alla Rae Morris, daughter of the Kuykendall family who inherited the Robert E. Howard Properties, passed away and left the library 5 percent of the reset and residue of her estate which amounted to \$54,000. The library group breathed a sigh of relief and began to dream about the future. After numerous consultations and much advice, they decided that (1) \$50,000 should be invested in order to insure the future of the library; so that never again would it be in danger of having to ciose; (2) \$4,000 should be used to repair and renovate the library, giving it a new look; and (3) only the earnings from the invested money would be used for book and supply purchases. To insure that the library would continue to thrive and grow, the bake sales and other fund-raisers will continue.

On October 3, the library is hosting a book-signing for Dr. Lou Rodenberger and Dr. Sylvia Grider, editors of a new history and antholobj, Tenas Women Writers. a in dition of their own. You are all invited to come by to visit and to enjoy the new facilities. The hours of the book signing are from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m.

NEWS FOR VETERANS

Office closed -- A reminder that the Callahan County Veterans Service Office will be closed September 29 and 30 for annual training as required by the State of Texas. This will also be the 50th annual conference of Texas County Veterans Service Of-

Korean War Memorial -- The 75th Texas Regular Session sent several bills to Governor Bush for signature. Senate Bill No. 463 related to the designation of State Highway 6 as the "Texas Korean War Veterans Memorial Highway." State Highway 6 is the longest state highway in Texas, running from Galveston to the Red River north of Quanah. Highway 6 enters the northeast corner of Callahan County from Eastland County, running through Moran and on through Shackelford County in its northward trek.

County Veterans like Carroll Gillit, Charnel McWhorter, Jack Hunter, James Eubanks, and James Reynolds were among those spending some very long days in Korea. It is fitting that the longest state highway be named to honor the "forgotten" survivors of that cold, terrible war.

some would try to tell you that it was the "Korean Conflict." In the Korean War 56,400 Americans died and 8,000 are still missing. It was a WAR all right!

Big Spring Veterans Home --Senate Bill 1060 of the 75th Texas Legislature authorized the creation of four Veteran's Homes. We have now learned that Gold Star Mothers and Fathers will be able to use the homes if they wish. It is still not certain which two homes will be built first. We will have news on that and other items on the home in future

More 75th Legislature -- Senate Bill 1202 directed the Texas Veterans Commission to determine the need for establishing State Cemeteries for Veterans. House Bill 827 exempted 60 percent service connected disabled Veterans from all hunting and fishing license fccs. Concurrent resolutions included Senate 59 recognizing March 26, 1997 as "Texas Women Veterans Day" and Senate 65 recognized April 9, 1997 as "Former Prisoners of War Recognition Day."

All Veterans are urged to stay in contact with our State and Federal representatives to insure that Veterans issues are ever on the agendas.



The division develops expertise on issues affecting the elderly, and provides information and assistance to the public, the Legislature and other state agencies.

The Elder Law and Public Health Division focuses its legal and educational efforts on:

*Ensuring quality treatment in nursing homes and personal care homes in cooperation with the Texas Department of Human Service

*Monitoring the advertising and sale of insurance and retirement oriented investments, financial plan-

ning service, estate planning and legal services directed at senior Texans *Monitoring the advertising and sale of home improvements, medical

COOPERATIVE CRIME PRE-VENTION PROGRAMS

The Office of the Attorney General participates in one of the more promising community policing movements for preventing crime against senior citizens: a program known as Triad. On the national level, it is a cooperative effort of the National Sheriff's Association, the International Association of Chiefs of Police and the AARP. On the local level, it brings together associations and agencies for seniors and police and sheriff's departments.

Each partnership of a law enforcement agency and senior citizens' group is guided by a volunteer council called SALT (Seniors and Lawmen Together). The SALT Council decides what services or programs the Triad will offer, recruits volunteers and oversees the results. The program is flexible, adaptable, low-cost, simple—but effective.

Is it possible to be told a lie, then believe it, and believe it so long that when the truth of the matter is disclosed, it will not be believed?

You remember the story of Joseph -- you know, "the Christian before the time" (ref. last week's BREAKTHRU)? You remember, then, how Joseph was sold by his brothers to the Ishmaelites, and how they took his "coat of many colors" and added the color of blood by dipping it in a goat's blood -- then telling their father, Jacob: "We have found this. Do you know whether it is your son's tunic or not?" Jacob did recognize it, and answered: "It is my son's. A wild beast has devoured him. Without doubt Joseph is torn to pieces." Jacob believed the lie so strongly that he "tore his clothes, put on sackcloth and mourned for his son many days." (Gen. 37:12-36)

"Fast-forward" eight chapters and twenty-three years -- during which time Jacob continues to believe that Joseph is dead (42:36, 38; 44:28 -- and Joseph's brothers seemingly began to believe their own lie, 42:13!) A lot has transpired (read chapters 39-45 for details). Joseph's brothers have found him alive, and return to share the good news with their father: "Joseph is still alive, and he is governor over all the land of Egypt," 45:26a. But look at Jacob's response: "And Jacob's heart stood still, because he did not believe them." And it was only after shown enough evidence







Lottery Sales Topped \$2.8M in 1997

Texas Lottery sales in Callahan County topped \$2.8 million in fiscal year 1997, according to a Texas Lottery Commission official in :Austin.

Lottery sales in Callahan County, which included scratch-off games, Pick 3, Cash 5 and Lotto Texas, rose 13 percent in fiscal year 1997.

Lottery sales in the county for the fiscal year ending August 31, 1997 was \$2,852,665. Lottery sales in the county for 1996 were \$2,516,313 and lottery sales in Callahan County were \$2,097,895 in fiscal year 1995.

Instant scratch-off lottery ticket sales totalled \$1.891.626 in 1997. Lotto Texas sales totalled \$641,120, Pick 3 sales were \$99,851 and Cash 5 lottery sales amounted to \$220,068

Thrifty's Food Mart, located at I-20 and Cherry Lane in Clyde, continued its hold as the top lottery retailer in 1997 with sales of \$521,341.

Thrifty's Food Mart has held the top spot as the county's top retail for the past three straight years.

Thrifty's sold more instant scratch tickets and Lotto Texas sales than any other county retailer. Thrifty's breakdown for lottery ticket sales include: Instant \$353,375, Lotto \$115,993, Pick 3 \$17,940, and Cash 5 \$34,033.

Howle's Kountry Store overtook Lakeway Store in Cross Plains as the number two lottery retailer in the county in 1997. Howle's, located at 105 South 1st Street West in Clyde, had combined lottery sales of \$444,318 in 1997. Howle's led the county's top retailers in the number of Cash 5 and Pick 3 lottery sales. Howle's lottery ticket sales breakdown includes: Instant \$287,625, Lotto \$98,548, Pick 3 \$22,959, and Cash 5 \$35,185.

Lakeway Store, located at 114 South Main Street in Cross Plains,

fell from the number two to number three retailer position in lottery sales. Lakeway had total lottery sales of \$431,044 in 1997. Lakeway's breakdown in individual ticket sales include: Instant \$263,625, Lotto \$112,005, Pick 3 \$9,932, and Cash 5 \$45,481.

Skinny's in Cross Plains held on to the number four retailer spot in 1997 with total lottery sales of \$216,156. Skinny's, located at Ave. F and 4th Street, had lottery breakdowns of: Instant \$176,250, Lotto \$63,537, Pick 3 \$2,618, and Cash 5 \$18,760.

Wes-T-Go, located at 1033 Cherry in Baird, replaced the Allsup's Convenience Store in Baird as the county's number five retailer. Wes-T-Go had total lottery sales of \$250,351 in 1997. The store's individual ticket sales include: Instant \$189,500, Lotto \$41,908, Pick 3 \$7,771, and Cash 5 \$11,172.

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
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
