

Kids in the kitchen can make holiday baking fun, educational

HOUSTON—Holiday baking can be a fun way to help junior chefs learn about food preparation and

"Young children love to help, and they really take pride in showing adults how much they can do. By inviting them to assist with holiday baking, parents can help build their children's self-esteem, as well as skills, creativity and knowledge of food and nutrition," said Becky Gorham, a registered dietitian and research nutritionist with the USDA/ARS Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

According to Horham, children who learn to enjoy food preparation at a young age might be more inclined to cook for themselves and less dependent on convenience and fast foods as adults.

She offers these tips to help parents and their young assistants get

· Teach children to wash their food.

 Read recipes before starting and decide what tasks small hands can do. Assemble all ingredients and

equipment. · Small children have short attention spans, so choose recipes that are simple and offer lots of opportunities to stir, add ingredients and

· Keep nutrition in mind. Fruit and nut breads, oatmeal and peanut butter cookies, carrot and fresh apple cakes, and peanut-dense peanut brittle are more nutritious treats than high-fat brownies and fudge. Decorate cookies with dried fruits and nuts. It's also a good time to experiment with fat- and caloriecutting strategies, such as using egg whites or egg substitutes instead of whole eggs, replacing some solid shortening with applesauce, and replacing whole milk or cream with evaporated skim milk.

 Expect a mess. Place an old bed sheet or newspapers over the area where small chefs are working. Cut down on cleanup by teaching children to stay organized and "clean as you go."

· Give older children lessons on using the can opener, measuring ingredients, setting timers and reading recipes. Older children can also help locate and assemble ingredients and equipment before baking begins.

Kitchens can be dangerous if children are not well supervised. Children who cannot reach the counter should stand on a sturdy stepstool, not a chair. Teach young children to avoid touching hot baking pans, ovens and sharp knives. Instruct older children to turn pot handles toward the back of the stove, wipe up floor spills immediately and use padded potholders to remove hot pans from the over instead of damp

With these simple tips, junior chefs and parents alike can have a happy and healthy holiday baking experi-

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

BREAKTHRU

Last week I suggested that one thing we need to do in order to help our homes and families to be stronger is to realize our individual responsibilities toward one another. Paul shared some God-given guidelines, Ephesians 5:22 - 6:4 (even more briefly in Colossians 3:18-21). In essence, Paul says, "Exercise your individual responsibility to every other member of your family."

Another help is to learn how to live with each other -- enjoy one another -- help each other -- work together. A family needs to spend time together in order to know each other and appreciate one another. Some stress the "quality" of time over the "quantity" of it -- but I seriously doubt if you can have the "quality" without there being some "quantity!"

.Take mealtimes for instance. Is there anything wrong with all the members of a family eating together at least once or twice each day? Gingerbread Tree At Citizens State Bank Begins December 4



Credit by exam dates announced for Cross Plains ISD Students

Cross Plains ISD students may receive credit for an academic subject in which the student has had no prior instruction if the student scores 90 percent or above on a criterionreferenced examination for acceleration in the course. Credit by Exam is offered for all elementary grades K-6 as well as for all courses 7-12. If such credit is given, the examination score will be entered on the student's permanent record and transcript; and the score will be used to compute class rank.

State law requires that three days between January 1 and June 30 and three days between July 1 and December 31 will be scheduled annually for the administration of the examination for acceleration. The Cross Plains ISD school board has established the following dates as the days for credit by examination for acceleration:

June 28, 29, 30 and July 5, 6, 7

There is no fee for the credit for examination used for acceleration. The student interested in taking credit for examination must submit a request to Rondall Sanders, High School Principal; Margie Sowell, Elementary Principal; or Vickie Campbell, Counselor; by April 15, 1999 for either testing session. Request forms can be obtained at either principal's office or the counselor's

After submitting the application for credit by examination, the student will receive the examination's review sheet, which will list the competencies tested on the test.

Tests will be administered on the established days, and the tests will then be sent to Texas Tech University for grading. Students will be notified of test results. For further information, please contact the principals or counselor at 725-6121 or 725-6123.



National Goals Panel Recognizes Student **Achievement Gains**

AUSTIN-Texas has been recognized by the National Education Goals Panel as a national model for boosting student achievement. Along with North Carolina, Texas is highlighted for its "extraordinarily successful policies" in a new publication, Exploring Rapid Achievement Gains in North Carolina and

Additionally, in a recent report titled Mathematics and Science Achievement State by State, 1998, the Goals Panel gave Texas its two gold star (highest) rating for demonstrating significant improvement over time in both 4th and 8th grades on the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) math exams. Only six states received this designation.

In fact, Texas fourth graders tied for the largest gain (11 points) in the nation on NAEP math scores between 1992 and 1996, and their scale score (229) was only three points behind the highest score in the nation (Maine).

From 1990 to 1996, Texas eighth grade students had the second largest gain (12 points; national average gain-8 points) on the NAEP mathematics test.

"The NAEP is an important nationwide test of student achievement and a valuable tool to gauge how Texas compares to other states. Based on the analysis provided by the Goals Panel, Texas has been clearly identified as a role model for other states seeking to improve student performance," said George McShan, president of the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB).

After an analysis on the Goals Panel's 1997 report, two states-North Carolina and Texas-stood out for realizing positive gains on the greatest number of indicators. The Goals Panel commissioned Dr. David Grissmer, a research expert at the RAND Corporation, to study the

Central Nervous System Cancer **Drugs May Stop** Spread of Some Cancers

HOUSTON-New drugs, injected into the fluid that circulates around the brain and spinal cord, may stop the spread of specific cancers, says a researcher at Texas Children's Cancer Center and Hematology Service in Houston.

"These drugs are promising for tumors that tend to spread to the central nervous system as well as for the treatment of recurrent leukemia or leukemia resistant to treatment," said Dr. Susan Blaney, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine and principal investigator of the drugs' research

"We are hopeful that these drugs will result in improved treatments," she said.

Currently, there are only three drugs available to treat cancers that spread throughout the central nervous system. Cancers that use the fluid to spread include leukemia, lymphoma, brain tumors, lung cancer, breast cancer, and some childhood tumors.

"Ultimately, we hope that these drugs will not only treat patients whose cancers have already spread to their central nervous systems, but also prevent the development of such spread in cancer patients who have a high risk for it," Blaney said.

A team of researchers from Baylor College of Medicine, Texas Children's Cancer Center and Hematology Service, and Texas Children's Hospital developed the new drugs.

Texas Children's Cancer Center and Hematology Service is jointly affiliated with Barbor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital.

Phase II of the research study begins in 1999 and will be done in collaboration with institutions throughout the United States.

gains. The report he and Ann Flanagan wrote was released this month and confirms that gains in academic achievement in both states are significant and sustained.

"While we are very pleased by the attention Texas is getting from the Goals Panel," said McShan, "we should not lose sight of the fact that there is still much to be done to improve student achievement. We want our gains to continue."

The Goals Panel tracks and annually reports on 33 indicators linked to the eight national education goals. These data points provide a picture of the individual state's success in improving education for their chil-

NAEP is the only nationally representative and ongoing assessment that measures what students know and are able to do in different subject areas. It should be noted that statelevel data in science are available only for 1996, so state improvement cannot be measured until 2000, the year science performance will be tested again.

TASB is a nonprofit association established nearly 50 years ago to serve local Texas school districts. It includes 1,047 school districts and county school boards, 44 junior colleges, 51 tax appraisal systems, 159 cooperatives, and 20 education service centers. School board members are the largest group of publicly elected officials in the state. The districts they represent have a combined budget of \$20 billion and

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
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
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


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
